## Phi Beta Kappa

Phi Beta Kappa is the oldest fraternity in the land, founded on December 5, 1776 in Williamsburg, Virginia by a group of young scholars at the College of William and Mary. Today there are 240 chapters nationwide, but only two in Kentucky. One, the alpha of Kentucky was founded in the 1920's at the University of Kentucky. The other, our Centre chapter, is the beta of Kentucky and was established in 1971.
Phi Beta Kappa is probably the most prestigious honorary fraternity. Members are chosen on the basis of broad cultural interests, scholarly achievement, and high moral character. To be elected as seniors, students must be in the top ten percent of their class, must have demonstrated breadth of interests, and must be recommended by several faculty members of good character. The same criteria apply to juniors, except that to be elected as juniors, students must be at the very top of their class and have close to a 4.00 average.

The Football Colonels were an impressive 6-3 in 1988. Centre finished the season ranked in the top ten in the South Region for Division III teams.
A high point for the season was a thrilling 19-13 victory over a strong Emory and Henry team. John Gohmann set the single game record for tackles with 19 in the thriller.
Gohmann had an outstanding year on defense for the Colonels. He was named the "Defensive Player of the Year" in the College Athletic Conference (CAC). His career at Centre was highlighted with his selection to the first team Kodak All-America football team as a defensive lineman. This was the fourth time in five years that a Colonel has been so honored.
Berry Hayes ended the season ranked 8 th in the nation in punt returns with a 15.1 yard average and an amazing 30.5 yards on kick-off returns.

All-CAC performers included: Dale Matherly (offensive lineman), Keith Tarter (wide receiver), John Gohmann (defensive line), Robert Fuller (linebacker) and Berry Hayes (defensive back).
Team award winners were: Most Valuable Non-starter, Mark Brown; Most Valuable Offensive Lineman, Richard Ford; Most Valuable Offensive Back, Greg Lawson; Most Valuable Defensive Lineman, John Gohmann; Most Valuable Defensive Back and Special Teams, Berry Hayes; and Whatever is Necessary Award, Ken Klusman.
It will be difficult to replace the ten senior starters who will be lost to graduation since they have contributed greatly to the Centre teams that have gone 24-12 over the last four years.

## Colonels Go Final Four

## A Dream Becomes Reality

"Whoever wants to reach a distant goal must take many small steps." - Helmut Schmidt. Those many small steps taken to reach Centre's goals of (1) winning the CAC championship (2) winning twenty games and (3) making it to the Final Four included taking each game one at a time, never underestimating their opponents, and always coming onto the court with a "never say die" attitude.
These steps began as the season started with an unexpected $90-69$ win over Lindsey Wilson, who at that time was undefeated and averaging over 100 points per game. Then again, one important factor many have made that win inevitable. Centre boasted an experienced and talented lineup of returning senior starters consisting of Tim Brack, Danny Johnson, Mat Slechter, Bo Wyenandt, and Mike Yates. They, along with fellow seniors Trey Griffin and Brent Smith were the nucleus, strength, and support of the Colonel team.
The remainder of the season proved to be as successful as that first game. An undefeated season in the CAC gave the Colonels their seventh straight conference championship and an NCAA tournament bid. They won the South Region with victories over Rose-Hulman and Washington University. California State-Stanislaus, was the next victim in the Quarterfinals. With an unforgettable 124-123 double overtime victory over Stanislaus, the Colonels found their dream of making it to the Final Four a reality.
Centre ended its season with an overall record of 24 wins and 7 losses after being defeated in the National Championship by the University of Warren Wilson $88-81$ in the first round and Southern Maine in the consolation game (81-70). However, the Colonels' goals were reached and Centre's basketball recordbook had to be almost totally rewritten due to the Colonel's outstanding accomplishments.
Centre became the first Division III school to have both its men's and women's teams in the Final Four. Fourteen team records and five individual records were broken.
Danny Johnson, having been at Centre only three years, is now third all time leading scorer, 19th leading rebounder and 8th assist leader. Bo Wyenandt is 7th leading scorer, 7th rebounder, and 14 th assist leader. Mike Yates is 10th leading scorer, and 7th assist leader. Tim Brack is second all time assist leader and had the most assists in a game ( 16 , against Stanislaus). Tim also had the highest three point field goal percentage ( 1.000 ) in a game and made the most 3 point field goals in a game, ( 7 for 7 against Rose-Hulman). Mat Slechter is 24th assist leader. While not an official numerical record, Centre's men's team had its first female managers, Anne Ellison and Sherri Hammons, who began working with the team last season.
Danny Johnson was named to the National Championship All Tournament Team, the South Region's All-Tourney Team, and was MVP of the CAC All Conference Team. David Hicks and Bo Wyenandt were also named to the South Region All-Tournament Team. Tim Brack, Bo Wyenandt, and Mike Yates joined Johnson on the CAC All-Conference Team.
The coaches and members of the 1988-89 Colonels are too be commended for an outstanding and truly unforgettable season. They have proven that goals set may indeed be reached . . . that winners are those who believe in themselves and never give up. They have proven themselves winners.
