## Shakertown Archaeological Field School



The Shaker Dig, a four year summer archaeological project, was begun in 1975 by Dr. Janzen of the anthropology department. Although the project is open to other schools, the majority of the participants have been Centre students. The students have been excavating the industrial area of the Shakertown village, which is located about thirteen miles from Centre's campus. The purpose of the project has been to locate the mills and dependencies built for the Shakertown community around 1820 , and to make a detailed map of the area. The excavation is scheduled to be completed by August of 1978.

## Football



The 1976 Centre College football Colonels finished the season with a $5-4$ record, placing second in the College Athletic Conference. It was the first winning season for head coach Herb McGuire and the most wins for the football team in seven years.

The football team depended on a solid defense. Ranking nationally midway through the season, the defense shut out two opponents, and only once allowed more than two touchdowns in a game.

A potent offensive attack made the Colonels the top rushing team in the conference, with six different backs gaining more than 200 yards.



The 1976 season exlemplified team football as well as any for Centre. Three offensive players, two defensive players, and the team punter made All Conference. The Colonels won many games with inspired third quarter outbursts, outscoring the opposition 49-13 overall. Although Centre did not produce an All American, the two from Washington \& Lee and Southwestern were held in check by the Colonels.

The soccer team completed its second full campaign with Varsity status, ringing up its best record yet. The Centre booters ended the regular season $8-3$ and finished post-season play with an $8-5$ record overall.

The team chalked up notable 2-1 wins in consecutive games against University of Kentucky and Eastern Kentucky University. Centre also won 6-0 over Transylvania and Southern Baptist.

The soccer team was led by a high scoring front line attack and a solid defense anchored by first year goalie Charlie Upton. The Colonels outscored their opponents by an approximate 3-1 margin.

## Field Hockey



The women's field hockey team improved their record to $4-5$ during the regular season action, closing out at 4-7 after the Kentucky post-season tournament. The women were especially strong in their play at mid-season, winning three of four games.

After beating Transylvania 7-1 early in the season, Coach Bunnell's squad faced the state champions, Eastern, and matched them evenly for three quarters of the game. On a trip south the women hit their hot streak, shutting out Vanderbilt $1-0$, and returning the defeat Midway $8-0$. Though falling to Louisville $6-0$, they bounced back to conquer Asbury 5-0 and to record a suprising tie against perrennial southern power Kentucky (1-1). All-in-all, it was a rewarding season for a young squad.

Early in 1977 the team was struggling along at $1-5$ when Coach Johns pointed to the need for balanced scoring. Then, with high scoring from all five starters, the team won seven of the next eight games, averaging 70 points to their opponents 59 .

In March Centre hosted the Women's Small College State Tournament. Although two larger universities, Northern and Kentucky State, vied for the championship, Centre placed third, defeating Cumberland 62-55 in the consolation game.

The Swimming Colonels, a young team in 1977, brought their season to a successful close with their 5th place finish against all scholarship competition at the Kentucky Intercollegiate Swimming Championships.

The team, dominated by eleven lettering underclassmen, highlighted the season by posting their best times at the K.I.S.C. Bill Duncan twice broke the Centre record for the 200 yd . butterfly.
