## Student Faculty Congress

The Student Faculty Congress has a relatively short history which is rich in accomplishments. This year, in addition to its traditional functions, S.F.C. has developed some new policies which clearly mark a transition period in Centre's student government.

Among the first of S.F.C.'s traditional responsibilities this year was obtaining a band for the Homecoming Dance. Kai Winding was the choice of the Congress, and apparently of the crowd, because the dance was the most successful one there has been for years. Encouraged by their achievement, the Congress broke with tradition at Gardenia festival time. They provided the Brothers Four in a three hour concert at Jennie Rogers instead of the usual dance. In addition to these duties, the Congress was responsible for the Carnival Dance and commissioned a portrait of the late Dr. Knott to be hung in the new library.

As for innovations, early in the fall the S.F.C. revised the requirements for automobile registration to permit sophomores with a 3.0 average to have cars. The second major accomplishment of the S.F.C. was the execution of an idea which had been voted on by students in the spring of 1959-a student judiciary board. The details of operation were worked out, and at Thanksgiving time it was announced that the judiciary system and the newly adopted rules on drinking would go into effect after Christmas.

These innovations are the beginning of a new regime for Centre, for they focus responsibility for personal conduct on the individual and also provide for enforcement by students. The general opinion is that they have had a good beginning. But in an effort to more accurately determine the results, the Congress has appointed a threemember committee to work with Dr. Hornell Hart. They will poll students and evaluate their results.

## Judiciary

The Student Judiciary is a new form of student government which was initiated at Centre College this year. The Judiciary is composed of two boards, the Men's Judicial Board and the Women's Judicial Board. The boards are each composed of a chairman, two seniors, two juniors, and a faculty advisor. There are eight lower councils consisting of the Women's Student Council, the Men's Dormitory Council, and one from each of the six fraternities. Each of the Councils has the responsibility to investigate reported offenses and to give penalties when guilt is established. The Council may refer serious cases to the appropriate Judicial Board if unable to reach a decision.

Every member of the student body, faculty, and administration has a personal responsibility to cooperate with the Student Judiciary in order for it to function properly.

It is hoped that the Student Judiciary will become an integral part of life at Centre College. Only with the help of all concerned will it prove successful in the years to come.

Omicron Delta Kappa, national leadership fraternity, has a threefold purpose. A suggestion to issue a quarterly similar to Phi Beta Kappa quarterly was made by a member of Centre's delegation and was seriously discussed. The organization is also involved in a long range evaluation of school spirit at Centre.

physics, biology or chemistry and also who had achieved and maintained a certain scholastic standing in their major courses as well as in their total program in the College.

During the decade of the Thirties the group affiliated itself with a national organization known as Chi Beta Phi, which had similar aims. But after a few years the group of Centre College voted to withdraw because of the restrictions on eligibility for membership imposed by the national organization. It was agreed by the chapter at Centre College that the value of the local group to the student body was greater under the rules of the former group than under those of the national organization. The Colonels opened the season against Wilmington and won 20-7. After the second period there wasn't any question as to who was the better team. Kern Alexander climaxed a 46 yard drive with a yard plunge into paydirt. Late in the third quarter Gene Tassie drove over from six yards out. McKee again converted and the score read 14-0. With 8:13 remaining to be played freshman fullback, Tom Milton, plunged over from the one. Late in the game Wilmington scored their lone tally on a 14 yard pass play.

It was "a bad day at Black Rock" in Lexington, Va. for the Colonels. The W\&L Generals hit paydirt early, but Centre, showing a lot of drive and spirit, retaliated with a T.D. and a 2 point conversion effort. 'The remainder of the game was played on the Colonels' side of the 50 yard line as the Generals ground out 5 more touchdowns.


The Colonels amassed 328 yards rushing and 18 first downs, which helped to bring home 3 T.D.s as the Maryville Scotties went down in defeat 23-6. Centre didn't waste any time. Led by quarterback Kern Alexander, the "Big Gold" scored twice in the first quarter, and were in no trouble the rest of the game.

In one of the most thrilling games of the year Centre, after holding a 20-7 halftime lead, saw it vanish and had to fight from behind for a hard earned 26-21 victory. Mark Day scored twice and Ray Kaelin once in the first half. Southwestern tallied in the 2nd quarter on a 67 yard pass play.

After a 3 rd period T.D., the Lynx went ahead on an intercepted pass which set up their 3rd T.D. Centre finally went ahead late

in the game when Alexander swept end from seven yards out on a keeper play which climaxed a 52 yard drive.

Centre's 5 th game of the season ended in a tie with Hanover on a cold, wet October Saturday afternoon at Hanover. The Panthers had no trouble moving the ball in the 1 st quarter as they marched for a tally and then in the middle of the second period scored again for a $14-0$ lead. Late in the first half Centre started rolling and reached paydirt on an Alexander-to-Day pass covering 35 yards. The Colonels tied the score in the 3 rd stanza when Alexander romped 40 yards.
