


VIRGALEEN BYRON Owingsville, Ky.


VIRGINIA REEVES Owensboro, Ky.







Nannie Wesley liked Φ K T so well that she now owns one. She is very happy and lives in Louisville, Ky.


Emily Vanarsdale is Latin teacher at K. C. W., and only last year Joan Robinson was chosen first Congresswoman from Kentucky.


I was in B. F. Keith's the other night, and Opal Land was at the piano and Evalee Green took the leading part in the vaudeville.

The K. C. W. girl who is the possessor of the golden Old English "K" can well be proud, for to earn this beautiful letter is not an easy task. To win this prize awarded by the Athletic Association, a girl must earn three K's, which are obtained through proficiency in at least three different sports. K's and numerals are given in swimming, hiking, tennis, basketball and baseball. The "K" is given to any girl who plays at least five halves of the match games in basketball, three-fourths of the total number of innings played in baseball, to the two girls who play in the tennis finals, to all who pass the advanced swimming test, and to all who complete one hundred and seventy-five miles in hiking. The class numeral is granted to all those who play at least five halves of the class games in basketball, one-half of the total number of innings played in baseball, to the class champion in tennis, to those who pass the first swimming test and to all who complete one hundred and twenty-eight miles in hiking.

Although the club was just organized in the fall of the year, one girl has already won her three K's. Mary Carlisle Bird, having earned a "K" in basketball, hiking and swimming, has the distinction and honor of being the first member of this athletic club. But by the close of the baseball season many more will have won the necessary "K's" and the club will be a truly active body of girls.

Kentucky College for Women

DANVILLE, KENTUCKY

Kentucky College for Women is a standard Junior College. The College Preparatory Course corresponds to the four years' course in an A class high school. By this course a student is prepared for the comprehensive examinations required by Wellesley, Vassar, Mt. Holyoke, and Smith, and from this course any student who has a satisfactory record may enter without examination the Freshman year at Kentucky College for Women, at Chicago University, and other northern college, as well as Kentucky State University, and other colleges in the Southern Association of Women's Colleges.

Excellent work is done in all the special departments, art, music and expression. To the student in music whose work, in the judgment of the department, merits it, a diploma is given after a prescribed course has been completed.

For the student who is a high school graduate and who does not wish to take up college work a domestic science course is given. This is a two-year college course in Home Economics and comprises the same work as that offered in the freshman and sophomore years at Kentucky State University.

In the college course two full years of college work are offered. Graduates from this course may receive, for this work, advance credit, without examination, at various northern colleges, such as the University of Wisconsin, University of Chicago, Oberlin College, also at Kentucky State University and other colleges in the Southern Association of Women's colleges.

To keep up the high standard of work at Kentucky College for Women an excellent faculty is necessary. The faculty at Kentucky College have been trained in the best colleges and universities in the country, and have personality and intellectual ability without which even the fine equipment of the college would be useless.

The broad campus at Kentucky College for Women affords ample opportunity for tennis, field day sports, plays and pageants, while in gymnasium the student may bowl, play basketball, swim, etc.



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
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
