


FOREWORD
















a battery of professors and being approved by assorted Deans and councilors we emerge—clutching a receipt, a schedule card, and a triumphant, if weary grin. School has officially started!


A regular part of Centre's program is "Centre College Day" at the bloodmobile. Here fraternities and dormitories compete to see who can have the largest percentage of members giving blood.


AT LAST...





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
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
