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## Remember When?

"In south central Kentucky, there exists a small liberal arts college ... "We've heard that phrase so many times that it has grown worn and almost commonplace. What is not commonplace is the interesting history of Centre College. One cannot attempt to tell this history in even one book, much less a single page. The face of Centre has changed dramatically since it opened its doors in 1819 , but some of the more prominent buildings have remained.

Breck, built in 1892, originally served as the theological school. After the theological school merged with the Louisville Theological Seminary, Breck became a dormitory for students and, despite a disastrous fire in 1908, has survived as one of Centre's oldest buildings.

Olde Centre, built in 1821, is the only building older than Breck. It has been used as a dormitory, cafeteria, and even a partial recreation hall for the students. Olde Centre transferred these functions to a new building, Olde Main, which was completed in 1871. Olde Main stood on the present site of Young Hall and was razed in 1964 to make way for the new science building.

Such construction and changed occurred largely under Tom Spragens' presidency. Though change is an essential element of progress, a large price was paid through the loss of these beautiful, old buildings.

The 1982-83 Men's Basketball season was a source of excitement and entertainment for the annual drudgery of wintertime. For the second time in the past five years, the team advanced to post season play in the NCAA Tournament while capturing the CAC crown and posting a 16-9 record in season play. That .563 regular season winning percentage ranks second best in recent basketball fortune.

The season appeared to be comprised of three distinct periods. The first half of the regular season saw the team unable to sustain any type of winning combination and post a dismal 3-7 record. In the second half, however, things started falling into place as they went on to win 13 out of the last 15 regular season games. Included in that streak was a 9-1 record against conference foes and an eight game winning streak. The final part of the season involved the return of the NCAA Division III Basketball Tournament to the cam-
pus. This spurred the interest of the college and residential communities which resulted in an exciting and successful event. The Colonels, however, did not fare as well while losing the opening round game 69-58 to St. Andrews College and falling 59-58 to Rust College in the consolation game the following night.

The team derived its leadership from its co-captains and only two seniors Dave Levich and Mark Doerger. Both achieved individual honors as Levich was named 2nd Team AllAmerican in the III District, All Conference, and was given the MVP and Most Efficient Player Awards. Doerger was named to the South Region-All Tournament Team and was given the Most Improved Player Award by the team. Other individual awards included: Doug Stoug, Best Defensive Player; Coby DeVary, Best Foul Shooter; and Tom Cowens, All Conference Team.

## The First

Q: Let's start off with administration changes. We've seen many this year, such as Hal Smith leaving with Eric Mount taking his place as Dean of Students. How has this move fit into your plans?

M: When I first met Hal, he mentioned that he didn't see his role at Centre College as Dean of Students lasting much longer than a few years. It wasn't the career that he wanted to follow.

Q: It seems that we've had quite a few Deans of Students in the past 10 years since Max Caunes. What about stability in this position?

M : There have been three or four Deans since then, yes. It seems that we need more stability along with shaping a whole new philosophy of student life.

Q: What have you seen as this philosophy since Max Cavnes, and where are we going now?

M: We've gone from a philosophy of close supervision of student life to the acceptance of considerable autonomy by students. I don't think our rules and philosophy were always consistent. So, I wanted to have a whole new look at the assumptions about student life.

Q: You say that Dean Smith thought he would be here a few years, yet he left earlier than that. How did this affect your plan?
M: His early departure emphasized the basic needs in this office. That is, the need for stability there as well as someone who could take a long look with me and with students. Though we didn't have the luxury of time to search for a new Dean, we felt that we didn't need to go outside the college to find the man to fill the job. In Dean Mount, we found a man who had played several key roles in both teaching and administration, not to mention a brief stint as Dean of Students before.

Q: What about him as a person? What qualifications other than experience made you ask him to step in?
M. He was very able to, I think, help develop and articulate a philosophy of student life. He's sensitive to questions of students' rights and responsibilities. His field is philosophy and ethies which explore those questions often with particular depth and insight. So based upon his training, his background, his experience at Centre, as well as his personal sensitivities, I felt that he was just the right person and he was already here, so it was a smooth transition.

Q: Well, how do you think this past year in Student Affairs has gone?

M: Everything, I think, this year has gone extremely well in student life, at least from my perspectives. We have been able to articulate a philosophy emphasizing a kind of development of personal potential which occurs through all of the different dimensions of student life.

Q: As a symbol of this new philosophy, you and Dean Mount have set up the Student Life Commission, composed of Faculty, Administrators, and student leaders. How did it fare?

M : I was very pleased with what we accomplished in what was a short period of time. The Commission was able to bring together two committees to give a lot of concentrated attention to both immediate issues that needed a fresh look as well as develop some longer range ideas about student life. So I was very pleased with what the two committees accomplished. I think it gives us both a base on which to work with in the future as well as some immediate changes to problems that had been hanging over people's heads for the last several years.

Q: What gave you the incentive to establish such a commission, and have its accomplishments been those which you had hoped?

## 100 Days, Etc

M: When I first came here, I was very disappointed that there was no vehicle for students to use to make recommendations about changes in policies, about residential policies, alcohol policies, the nature of the overall relationship of the student and the institution. The SLC filled this vacuum. Some of its recommendations were intended to develop mechanisms within Congress, and other organizations, so that opportunity for student participation in decision making in the future will be clarified and strengthened. I feel that its accomplishments were important and as I said before I was pleased with what it has done. Most importantly, however, I am happy that it has shown the potential that exists for student life here, in terms of participation, in terms of active roles in setting college policy and all the educational benefits which accrue to students from such roles.

Q: To veer auay from this, what about Centre's future in regards to the large freshman enrollment for 1983-8.? Do you plan on continuing this to increase the population of Centre?

M: This class is a little larger than we were anticipating. The size of Centre's student body is one of the critical variables for determining our future. The optimum size of Centre given present facilities and resources is probably around 775 or 800 , and next year, with this entering class, will probably be 750 or 760 . For the future, the democraphic changes make the admissions area the single most important institution variable facing Centre College.

Q: What about the future in terms other than size, such as academic profiles of the entering elasses?

M: The last two years have seen class profiles that are very strong, with a majority of the students being in the top $10^{\prime}$, of their class, with ACT scores a couple of points higher than in the past. In demographics. most of our students are from Kentuck:, which presents no problem in itself, except that if the trend continues in that direction, we would probably worry about becoming too geographically centralized so were wondering and worring a lot students are from Kentucky, which presents no problem in itself, except that if the trend continues in that direction, we would probably worrs about becoming too geographically centralized. So we re wondering and worrying a lot
now about how can we continue to maintain the size of our entering class, the academic quality and economic and geographic diversity. What we plan to do is to make admissions a top priority and devote some of our best thinking and action toit. As long as the demographic conditions exist the wat thev do, we will continue to press on i) dominate the environment rather than being dominated by it. We want to have the choice about the size of college. the diversity of the student body and the quality represented in it.

Q: Sil wo think that this will lead to a further ". ll-riunded schoul with competitive students. Where do whe see these characteristics putting Centre: in a decades

M: I would say that within a decade, we should be

able to increase all basic measures of institutional strength. Centre is very strong, without question, yet strength is always a question of with whom you wish to compare yourself. I think we are in a position to compare ourselves, within a decade, with the very strongest colleges anywhere in the country, and that would really be our goal. That means that everything one touches in the college environment has to be what I call a model of quality. That may not be that within a decade we will have the geographic diversity that some of the colleges in America do, but we have to be moving in that direction.

## Q: What about Centre's rank in 10 years? Where uill we be?

M: One of our goals is to be about the best of the truly small colleges under 1000 anywhere in the country. We're already in that league, and we should within 10 years strive to be right at the top in the, let's say, under 1000 enrollment group. So it is time when, I think, we can be ambitious, but our ability to be so really depends in creating the most model environment for education of young people that you can find just about anywhere. A lot of work to be done, but at the same time, a lot of work has been done and very successfully.
Q: In the past year, what do you think have been the most significant events to achieve that goal?

M: I've been thrilled with the year. It really has been a more satisfying year than I have ever spent in education. Everything has gone very well. Certainly the success of our admissions work ranks very high. I hope that the students understand a kind of concern for them as individuals, and for them as participants in the community and if we've been able to communicate our respect for
the students and our high confidence in them, then a lot will have been accomplished as well. Our financial picture brightened during this past year. The transitions in the major administrative offices have all seemed to have worked out very smoothly and very happily. An awful lot has happened in a very positive way. And my hope would be that we can continue to articulate the purpose of the college with the kind of accuracy that leads to a constant sense of clarity of direction.

Q: Where do you, as President, go from this starting point?

M: My job is to continue to try constantly now and in the future to listen to what is different about this college. To what makes it the powerful place that it is in helping to create people who are both well educated and constructive achievers for the wider society.

## Mount Back on Top Again

"An enabler: I feel I am here to enable students to grow, govern, organize, contribute, and expand in every way," the new Dean of Students, Dr. Eric Mount, describes his position. "There are times when an authority person is needed, but for the most part I want to be able to work with students to help them assume leadership positions.

In February 1983 Dr. Mount, college pastor and a member of the Centre faculty since 1966 , replaced Hal Smith, who resigned to take a fund-raising position at Muskingum College in New Concord, Ohio. A Versailles native, Dr. Mount holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Southwestern at Memphis and a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Union Theological Seminary. He received his Ph.D from Duke University in 1966 and a STM degree from Yale Divinity School in 1961. Before his appointment at Centre as college pastor and assistant professor of religion, Dr. Mount served as assistant to the minister at the Trinity Avenue Presbyterian Church in Durham, NC, and as pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Crossett,


## Arkansas.

One of the areas that claimed Dr. Mount's attention was the instruction of RA's. Before, they were trained a few days prior to the first day of classes. The new plan involved the choice of RA's being made early; a training session once a week would be held. The main concern was student participation in decision making. He stated, "Students should take the initiative to see what needs to be corrected and through contact of student organizations follow through." He was also interested in enhancing the Centre community. "Too often students can be too interested in grades or their own friends or interests to enjoy the larger community."

Although Dr. Mount's major field is religion, he has lectured locally and across the state on biomedical ethics, death and dying, and professional ethics. He has written several articles and two books, Conscience and Responsibility and The Feminine Factor.
Dr. Mount and his wife, Truly, have four children. They enjoy activities which involve family members, such as piano recitals and basketball games. They are also avid theatre enthusiasts. In his spare time, Dr. Mount enjoys a match of tennis, volleyball or racquetball. He also sings in the church choir.
