




OLD CENTRE

DEAN OF WOMEN



RESUME OF SEASON

All Centre adherents, proud as they might have been at the showing of the "Prayin' Colonels" last year, had even more to brag about this season as Coach Ed. Kubale's eleven compiled the very enviable record of six victories, two defeats, and one tie. This record becomes even more to be proud of when it is taken into consideration that the first of the two defeats came at the hands of the powerful Indiana University eleven and the second was administered by the undefeated "Thundering Herd" of Marshall College. The victims of the Gold and White onslaught were Oglethorpe, Transylvania, Davidson, Xavier, Louisville, and Southwestern, and the University of Chattanooga managed to keep the Colonels from crossing its goal line by holding them to a scoreless tie.

The opening assignment for "Ku's" boys was against "Bo" McMillian's Indiana University on September 25 at Bloomington. The Hoosiers, led by their All-American fullback, Corby Davis, were expected to win by a wide margin, but were completely surprised as a courageous Centre eleven held them to a hard-fought 12-0 victory. Had it not been for the unstoppable line smashes of Davis and an unfortunate Gold and White fumble in the second quarter, the score might have been entirely different. As it was, the Colonels confined all the Indiana scoring to the first half, and completely outplayed them in the second, having the ball on the Indiana 14-yard line when the final gun sounded.

After such a grand beginning for a hard schedule, the Colonels made their first

appearance in Farris Stadium on October 2, and defeated a much weaker Oglethorpe University eleven by a 19-0 score. The Gold and White took the lead in the first few moments of the game when Quarterback Jimmy German slipped off right tackle and galloped 31 yards for a touchdown. Dennis Van Huss placekicked the point to give the Colonels a 7-0 margin, which was increased to 13-0 at the end of the first quarter by virtue of an 11-yard touchdown smash by Van Huss. There was no further scoring until the closing minutes of the game, when Thompson crashed from the one-yard line to give the Colonels their final six points. On October 8th, the Colonels journeved to Chattanooga for the second of their seven road games and their only night en-

counter of the season. This test brought out the true spirit of the Centre eleven, for, although being held to a scoreless tie, it completely outplayed the Moccasins. Nine times the Colonels fought their way inside the Chattanooga 20-yard line, only to be thwarted in its scoring attempts. The most disheartening break came when Centre fumbled on the Chattanooga 3yard line late in the fourth quarter and were thus deprived of a well-earned victory. Only once did the Gold and White permit the Moccasins to venture into its territory and then only as far as the 43yard line. Lee Stivers, Paul Coop, and Dick Stahl were the mainstays in the Colonel offensive.

The next week a greater part of the student body journeyed to Lexington to see









the Gold and White in its annual battle with Transvlvania, and were deeply gratified when the Pioneers were handed a stiff 38-0 drubbing. The highlights of the game were the two touchdown jaunts by Billy Harrington of 46 and 68 yards respectively, the expert juggling of the ball by the Centre team on several occasions. Transy's lone threat came after Coach Kubale had substituted his entire squad, but it was of no avail.

Saturday, October 23rd, about 3,000 homecoming fans shivered in a chill wind as they watched the Colonels tally eight points while holding a powerful Davidson team scoreless and thus revenged themselves for the 27-0 drubbing handed them by the Wildcats last season. The Gold and White again surprised by completely bottling up the highly touted Davidson running attack, headed by the brilliant Martin "Twinkletoes" Lafferty. Centre's first score was made when Bernard Whitehouse broke through to down Lafferty behind his own goal for a safety and two points, and her second was made in the last period when Glenn Davis took a perfect pass from German on the two-yard line and stepped over for the score. Eight Colonels played their last game in Farris for the Gold and White.

On October 30th, the Colonels took to the Pullmans again and wound up in Cincinnati, where the powerful Xavier eleven was met and trampled over by the tune of 21-0. Xavier, after holding the Gold and White scoreless during the first half, weakened in the second and allowed the


Colonels to push over three well-earned touchdowns. Davis tallied two of the three markers after receiving passes from Dick Stahl, and Van Huss streaked 52 yards through center to add the third. Stahl also added strength to a department which had previously been very weak by booting three perfect points after touchdown.

Then came the disaster! The Centre team, hopelessly out of condition and lacking the spirit and fire which had marked its play all season, journeyed to Huntington, West Virginia, to meet the "Thundering Herd" of Marshall College, only to go down to a crushing 36-0 defeat. This was the only time in all of its nine games that the Gold and White never really held a chance of victory. Marshall

held the advantage from the very first and were never headed. The Colonels emerged from this encounter with a list of injured which included half the squad. Never had there been such wholesale "slaughter." The little favorable comment on the game must be given to Bobby Steakley, who, in spite of his meager 128 pounds, played almost the entire game in the Gold and White backfield.

With only a four-day interval between the Marshall game, the Kubalemen, battered and bruised as they were, came to Louisville on Armistice Day and defeated the University of Louisville for their fifth victory of the season by a score of 20-7. Although using a makeshift lineup, the Colonels were able to pile up a 13-0 advantage at the half, and eased up the re-

mainder of the game. The final Centre touchdown was made by Jimmy German on a 96-yard dash from kickoff, aided by perfect blocking on the part of Billy Harrington. In this test, however, the Gold and White lost the services of Bobby Steakley, who suffered a slight concussion of the brain in the first few minutes of play.

On November 20, the Colonels played their last game, under Mr. Kubale, against Southwestern University in Memphis and ended a great season in a blaze of glory by taking a hard-fought 7-6 victory. Centre scored its margin of victory early in the second quarter when German took Harrington's pass in the end zone for a touchdown and Ed. Dance booted a perfect placement to give the Gold and

White a lead which it never relinquished. With the final gun the college football careers of eight of the Centre men came to a close, and all of them will be missed next season. Those who donned a Colonel uniform for the last time were Bell, Martin, Dance, Whitehouse, Bible, Davis, Gravitt, and Colson.

And thus was brought to an end one of the greatest seasons on the gridiron since 1924. Certainly we should be proud of the record of the Gold and White in 1937. Yet, what will 1938 bring? Will it bring even more glory? We feel that each succeeding year will see the "Prayin' Colonels" from Olde Centre College in the heart of Kentucky's bluegrass climbing closer to the place that is rightfully theirs, the top!

This year, under the splendid coaching of Coach Waddle, the "Looies" had a most successful season. They completed their three-game schedule undefeated and untied.



Another basketball season has come to an end, and the Gold and White basketeers finished a rather unsuccessful season with a record of three victories against eight defeats. Playing a light schedule with games at long intervals gave Decker's five little chance to really find itself, and as a result a great many of the losses were by one or two points.


After two weeks of practice, Centre met Transylvania on December 13th, in the Boyle gym and went down to a last minute 40-39 defeat. The Deckermen did remarkably well in their first encounter and indicated that they might have a great deal of potential power. Wellington Cooper, the high scoring ace of the team who was destined to be lost by graduation in February, paced the Colonels with 14 points.

This ended the play until the new year, when on January 8, the Colonels journeyed to Louisville to take on the high-flying Cardinals of the University of Louisville. Again the Colonels were subjected to a heart-breaking defeat when Si Monen connected with seven points in the last five minutes and led his team to a 37-33 victory.

Two nights later, a sudden reversal of form resulted in a decisive 41-34 victory over Berea on their opponents' floor. Centre took the lead in the first few minutes and were never on the short end of the score. Decker substituted his entire squad during the fray.

On January 15, the Colonels made their first 1938 appearance on the home floor and lost another heart-breaker, this time to Eastern, by a score of 31-29. With the score tied at 29-29 at the end of the regular playing time, Captain Roy King of the Maroons broke through to sink a one-hander and gave his team an overtime victory. The lead changed hands seventeen times in this thrill-packed battle.

Three nights later, the Colonels added another victory, which proved to be their last, to their total by defeating Wesleyan on the home floor by 40-31.

The Gold and White, behind at the close of the first half, went to the front with a sudden burst of scoring and were going away at the final gun. Cooper, in his last home appearance, was the star of the contest, scoring seventeen points, fifteen in the second half.

In the last game before examinations, the Deckermen journeyed to Richmond to play a return test with the Eastern Maroons, in which the scarlet-jerseyed lads captured another hard-fought game. Centre was not up to the form which it had displayed against Wesleyan and, although fighting hard all the way, never were able to overtake the flying Maroons. With this game, the Colonels lost the service of Cooper, who was to be sorely missed.

After a two-week period of inactivity, the Colonels took to the road again and wound up in the Wesleyan gym, where the Colonels made the Wesleyan homecoming complete by dropping a close 37-35 test. A desperate rally by the Deckermen almost brought victory, but it was of no avail.


On February 7, the Colonels went down to a crushing 62-26 defeat at the hands of an extremely powerful Loyola University quintette at Chicago. There was nothing to say about the game, except that the Colonels were completely baffled by the tall rangy Chicagoans.

Playing their last home game against Georgetown, the Colonels lost another close one by 44-40, after pulling up from a 15 point deficit. Captain Royalty closed his college career by going on a grand scoring spree of 16 points. Others who played their last on the home floor were Bell, Gravitt, Alexander, and Patton.

The last of the season saw the Pioneers of Transy completely upset the Colonels by a 38-21 count. Never once were the Centre boys in the ball game. With Stahl, Coop, Foster, Allen, and Fulton back to form the nucleus of next year's team, the prospects are fairly bright.


