## President Spragens Retires

In the fall of 1957, at age forty, Thomas A. Spragens took over the office of president at Centre College. When he arrived, Spragens noted that although the college had a good academic reputation, it was suffering from an undersized enrollment and outdated facilities. Spragens was determined that Centre would overcome these shortcomings and become the fine liberal arts institution it had the potential of being. This being the case, for nearly twenty-five years Thomas A. Spragens worked toward this goal, and through his efforts Centre has seen major improvements in several areas.

The first of these advancements came when the former women's campus located on the north side of town joined with the main campus downtown. After this, the campus underwent much reconstruction and renovation, including the $\$ 5.4$ million Regional Arts Center in 1973. In the mid 1960's the curriculum was completely revised to require all students to fulfill proficiency in four major areas of study. Then finally, at the end of 1981, Centre's Fund for the Future passed its goal of $\$ 30$ million. Thus, with Spragens' guidance one can surely see that Centre has come a long way. President Spragens, upon his retirement at age 64, had this to say about his years at Centre: "I feel fully satisfied. Indeed I feel that a lot of good luck along the way has enabled us to come to a point a little farther down the road than I might have hoped for on coming here." 하 82

President Spragens has been a vital factor influencing Centre College, its people and campus. He leaves behind him an exceptional record which serves as a mirror reflecting his integrity and vitality. His vitality stimulated changes on campus, such as the construction of Young Hall, Doherty library and the Regional Arts Center and renovations of Sutcliffe Student Center and Cowan Dining Commons. These changes will continue to symbolize the progressiveness of President Spragens and Centre College ideals.

Next came honorary degrees to four deserving men: William Dorris, Frank Heck, James H. Rucker (who conducted an outstanding Baccalaureate service), and Thomas Spragens. Dean DiLillo began to call names and all the graduates put on their hats and became nervous again. When I was actually standing on the steps, hearing my name being called, however, I was surprisingly relaxed. I slid cooly across the stage (no one fell - aren't you proud of us?), received my diploma and shook hands with three Centre presidents, a unique experience.

The Message to the Graduates, after everyone had received his degree, was the last event on the program excluding the Benediction. It was also the most moving. Then the Recessional began and for the last time (as students) we watched the faculty file out of Newlin Hall. ## Student Congress

Dreams often turn into regrets. Perhaps, this could be the theme of the 1981-82 Student Congress. It could also be applied to most of the Congresses of the past.

This past year, the newly-elected Congress officers began their terms with the same thought: This year's Congress will not be like last year's. It will be better and do more. By the end of their terms, reality had somehow crept in, leaving them to wonder what had gone wrong. In their eyes, the Congress was a little bit better and it had done a little bit more, yet it was the same old Congress - nothing had really changed.

Actually, this year's Congress, under the direction of President Robert Groves, probably did more than the average Congress usually does; however, unlike most Congresses, it was a very non-controversial organization. No angry or encouraging editorials or letters about the Congress appeared
in the Cento. Student participation in the Congress was very low. Administration interest or concern was also at a low level. And even Congress members felt content with the status of the Congress.

Some new changes were brought about this year. Others were proposed, and turned down. Still others were proposed, accepted, and little done about the, which seemed okay. There was always next year.

Vice-President Lea Stromire helped enable a few clubs to be recognized and brought into existence due to her and the Legislative Committee's efforts. Among these clubs were the Campus Scouts, the American Chemical Society, and the Pyrrhonian Society.

Treasurer Charlie Bausch instituted some effective and successful changes in the budget process. Clubs now have to request money from Congress for specific purposes and also

be accountable for the use of those funds.

Secretary Matt Bowman, along with Bausch, was instrumental in procuring a new vehicle to replace the old Student Congress van, which Bowman described as, "not the type of vehicle that you would want to be caught dead in, which is a definite possibility considering the shape that it's in." The new car is a full-size 1980 stationwagon. Needless to say, requests for rental from the Congress dramatically increased.

Perhaps the two major goals this year's Congress was working on were the instituting of some type of honor code and changes in the present visitation policy. Both goals were largely the ideas of Groves. As of the end of the year no demonstratable progress could be seen toward the realization of either goal, although a fair amount of effort had been spent on both ideas.

The Congress was very competent in its usual and "necessary" roles. Refrigerator rental, Homecoming duties, shuttle-bus service, running of elections, car rental, Student Directory and Private Phone Directory publication, allocation of funds to clubs, and other services were all carried off efficiently. Dean Smith described these duties as "necessary and important tasks which usually go unrecognized and from which the Congress seldom receives any appreciation."

At the 1982 Elections Convocation, unlike years before, very little criticism was directed at the previous Student Congress administration. Instead, candidates talked about possibilities for change, especially with the arrival of a new president next year.

Perhaps the Student Congress will change. Perhaps this year's Congress was the last of a series of Congresses frustrated by student apathy and a lack of "real forward momentum." Perhaps next year's officers will be satisfied come the end of their terms. Perhaps not.

## Tough Season

It was a tough year for the football colonels. In what was hoped for a winning season and a second straight C.A.C. championship, the colonels fell short of the mark. Their record was 4-5, with only two victories in the conference. Plagued by inconsistency, the team never did rise to their potential until the final two games of the year.

There were some very bright spots, however, in what must be considered a very exciting season. There was the great offensive drive with only a few minutes remaining which enabled the colonel's golden toe, Lambert Willett, to kick a last second field goal. This won the colonels the first game of the season against Washington University. There was the emotionally riveting game against West Georgia, ranked 10th in Division III nationally. Coming into the game a twenty point underdog, Centre put a scare on West Georgia, losing only in the final moments of the game 37-25. The most satisfying game however, for players and fans alike, was the season finale against Southwestern. What was
a bitter rivalry, (SAM burned Centre 55-14 in 1979) ended in a colonel onslaught of offensive and defensive showmanship. Centre peaked in their final game to blitzkrieg SAM 57-17, setting a C.A.C. scoring record in the process.

Offensively, the colonels consisted of a powerful ground game and sound passing attack led by a strong front line. Defensively, Centre was inexperienced at many positions, but through hard work and practice they became a solid crew at year's end.

The team captains - Greg Naiser, Mike Ward, Bob Kessinger, and Kurt Winstead - led the players through off-season weightlifting and the long, grueling season. The M.V.P.s were: offensively; Mike Ward, Defensively; Dave Brown, special teams; Lambert Willett. The Most Improved Player was Jerry Watson, and the Most Valuable Non-letterman was Mike Hall.

The colonels placed five players on the All-C.A.C. team: Ward, Winstead, Willett, Kessinger and Brown. Three players received Honorable Mention: Wes Evans, Brad DeVries, and Ray Hundley.

Morrill Accepts Centre Presidency


Shortly after Homecoming it was announced that Dr. Richard L. Morrill, president of Salem College and Salem Academy in Winston-Salem, N.C., would become the eighteenth president of Centre College on June 1, 1982.

Students who have met Dr. Morrill have been impressed by the combination of his warmth, candor, and intelligence. The student body in general were pleased with the selection because of Dr. Morrill's reputation as a president who maintains close ties with student life.

Dr. Morrill's selection resulted from a national search process which took nine months, an in-depth review of seventy candidates from all areas of the country, and lengthy on-campus interviews of six candidates. Judge Pierce Lively ' 43 , vice chairman of the board of trustees, served as chairman
of the selection committee, which also included William H. Breeze '45, George P. Crounse, Gordon B. Davidson '49, Dr. Richard G. Johnson '43, Henry Meigs and Jane M. Norton.

The faculty elected Professors Paul Cantrell, Dorothy Nelms, and Milton Reigelman to serve as their representatives on the selection committee.

Dr. Morrill is a widely-recognized authority on ethics and values in higher education. His recent book, Teaching Values in College, was published in 1981; he has spoken and published widely on the subject and participated in numerous conferences in this country and Europe.

The faculty was enthusiastic about Dr. Morrill's appointment because he has been a teacher himself. He taught at Wells College and Chatham College before going into administrative work at Penn State and then at Salem.

Possibly one of the aspects of the "Centre experience" many students most vividly recall is a winter term off-campus trip. The thirty-five students who spent winter term in England with Professors Cantrell and Matheny will certainly have nothing but fond memories of what many will consider the five most enjoyable and exciting weeks of their careers at Centre.

In regard to academics, course offerings were in the fields of English and government. Each student chose between Kings, Lords and Commons with Dr. Matheny and Gold, Vellum and Stone with Dr. Cantrell. Requirements for each course consisted of reading selected works and participating in various excursions and "mystery walks," as well as visiting specific sites individually. In addition, for the second course each student worked on an independent study which took the form of a daily journal focused on a specific subject. A main advantage of this format was that nothing remained to be done when the majority of the group returned on February 8 th (several students remained an extra week), which meant that winter break was a care-free two week vacation.

The first eight days were spent in London, perhaps one of the group's favorite sites. During the visit, some of the group's excursions included trips to the British Museum, famous literary spots in Southwark, Dickens' House Museum, and Canterbury. Otherwise,
there was ample free time to individually tour the city and to work on independent studies. The group traveled to Salisbury for the next four days, where the most notable attractions are the magnificent Salisbury Cathedral and Stonehenge - perhaps England's most renowned historical find. The next four days were spent in York, in northern England. York is noted for its well-preserved medieval architecture. One of the most enjoyable journeys during this time was to the ruins of the Rievaulx Abbey located in the picturesque countryside outside York. The next six days were free for individual travel. Members of the group spread out across western Europe to such areas as Scotland, Wales, Amsterdam, Paris and far-away Greece. Finally, for the last eight days everyone returned to London to finish the course work. During this time everyone traveled to Oxford.
Nighttime provided opportunities to sample English culture and social life, Pubs were, of course, a popular attraction, although their 11:00 p.m. closing time was difficult to adjust to. Plays, opera, and the ballet were also popular choices. In addition, several students found time to attend a rock concert in London featuring a California group, the GoGo's.
Lest anyone think the trip was totally without drawback, there were some "minor" inconveniences. For example, it snowed in London, York was underwater, British Rail
went on strike, (they went out of their ways for Centre didn't they?), and bath water was never more than tepid - all too often down right cold. Fortunately, none of these obstacles proved insurmountable, however, the last one certainly gave us a renewed appreciation of the American plumbing system.
Undoubtedly everyone will have different memories of the trip and different versions of the same story to tell, but no one would argue that thanks to Dr. Cantrell and Dr. Matheny winter term in England was a "smashing" success.

## Welcome Back

This year four men returned to their old alma mater to find themselves on the other side of the podium as members of the Centre faculty. They appeared in the same classrooms they had slumbered in centuries before. They expounded on subjects that before they had managed to somehow endure. They made sure that each student repeated the struggles they had faced in their earlier years. They returned to Centre for a variety of reasons, each hoping to somehow enhance the Centre Experience of those they instruct.

Dr. Rodney Piercey graduated from Centre in 1971. He then moved on to Vanderbilt where he did research and taught while studying for his Ph.D. He received his doctorate in Physics from Vandy in 1978. Dr. Piercey said there was no particular reason for his return to Centre, although being closer to his home town of Albany, Kentucky was a contributing factor. Dr. Piercey noted that the students at Centre were no different than those at Vandy, and that the only major difference between the colleges is the size. He also mentioned that he finds the work load greater here, leaving him less time for research and relaxation.

Dr. Preston Miles graduated from Centre in 1974 and moved on to the University of Kentucky where he received his Ph.D. in Chemistry in 1978. From Lexington, he moved to Cincinnati, where he was employed by Ross Laboratories as a "bench chemist". After being promoted to an administrative position, Dr. Miles grew anxious for a new challenge and for the opportunity to do some personal research and saw the opening at Centre as a chance to do both. He also felt compelled to come back to Danville because "it's a good place to raise a family".

Dr. Mark Lucas is a member of the Centre Class of 1975. After graduation, he went to the University of North Carolina where he taught English while studying for his Ph.D., which he received in 1979. Dr. Lucas said he had always wanted to teach at a small college like Centre, but "never dreamed" of the chance to teach here. When the opportunity to teach here arose, he immediately applied. Dr. Lucas said he felt the students at Chapel Hill were very bright, but not as bright or serious as those at

Centre, and that he's glad to be back.
Matt Vonderbrink is a 1980 graduate of our fine institution. After graduation, he taught for a year at a high school in Brookville, Indiana, where he held down the positions of football, baseball, and basketball coach. Mr. Vonderbrink said he returned to Centre when the job opened because he likes the area (it's close to his hometown of Cincinnati) and because he likes the folks at the college.

Each of these faculty rookies agreed that the school itself hasn't changed much over the years. They mentioned that the students seem more conservative and conscientious than in their days. Centre students appear more concerned about finding jobs and earning their degrees. Dr. Lucas noted the presence of "less hippies" as an indicator of this trend, while Matt Vonderbrink mentioned that the Tuesday night parties are
