







In the background of such national changes as Watergate and the fuel shortage, Centre felt its own changes in the form of increased enrollment and physical expansion.










The largest building effort in the college's history, the Regional Arts Center spurred Centre dramatically into the present, while still clinging to its fondly held traditions.




















# Student Congress,




