# Nixon Credibility *And welfare recipients?*

## New Area Concern *Please poll the taxpayers!*

The credibility of the Nixon administration is the main worry of about 70 per cent of visitors at U.S. Rep. James R. Jones' mobile office, Jerry Conrey, Jones' district manager, said today.

This represents a sharp change from August tabulations which ranked the Watergate, and related scandals, as last in major areas of public concern.

Shortages of supplies and materials, or the threat of them, also is a source of anxiety for 1st District voters — ordinary citizens and businessmen alike, Conrey said.

Since Oct. 3, he said, 4,056 persons have visited the mobile office.

"THE BIGGEST concern of seven of 10 voters is about the credibility of the entire administration, and its ability to continue to operate the government," he commented.

The change in public concern, Conrey said, occurred after President Nixon fired Special Investigator Archibald Cox and after the controversy over White House tapes exploded.

There have been quite a few inquiries, and complaints, about shortages in the field of constructing, maintaining, and

repairing pipe lines, he continued.

"We're getting a lot of inquiries about the availability of pipe and wire mesh from people directly involved in pipe lines, he said.

THE RESIGNATION of Vice President Agnew did not provoke much area public interest, Conrey added.

He told the story of one pipe line repair company, which wasn't in business last year, and now is having trouble obtaining supplies.

Allocations are handled on a basis of what the firm did last year, he said.

People engaged in marketing — such as salesmen — are worried about gasoline shortages, he said.

JONES' ADVICE about the Watergate and related scandals is not to make any rash judgments and to wait until all the facts are in, Conrey said.
