I read with interest your letter upon my return from the Middle East.

My position with regard to impeachment will be that I am not going to publicly condemn or approve the actions until the facts have been fully developed in a judicious manner by the House Judiciary Committee. This investigation is currently being done. I do not have the leeway to act as a private citizen because if a recommendation for an impeachment is made, I will be sitting as a Grand Juror, and it would be improper to prejudice my thinking in advance.

Furthermore, I want you to know I certainly appreciate having your vote, but my constitutional responsibilities in deciding a question of this importance will take prime precedence over any offers of support or opposition.
