

Dear Anne,

Thank you for inviting me to be the program chair and being open to partnering with *Irvine for Everyone* to put on, as Beryl Smith called it "an ambitious program."

We were dealing with not only a very difficult and complex subject, but a lot of programmatic changes as well. It ranged from online RSVPs to partnering with established and new non-profits and it wasn't business as usual but we did it! Our first program was praised by many as the "best program they've ever been to on homelessness" and some of the people who said this had been to many! Someone else shared at the end of our second gathering, referring to the whole program: "You will never know your impact. But this has made an immeasurable difference. Generations from now, families will remember you." I appreciate you for stepping out in faith.

During Winter and Spring of 2019 Presbyterian Women of the Presbytery of Los Ranchos offered two Gatherings on *Homelessness Demystified* on Feb. 2nd and May 4th. The added benefit of these two programs was I4E-led *Buffet of Educational Experiences (BEE)*. From February 2 to May 4, I4E partnered with faith, education, civic, and the nonprofit homeless service provider communities to offer many hands-on ways of learning about the complex social issue of homelessness. All of us learn in different ways. That is why the Buffet or BEE planned different categories of learning experiences to help us be the change Jesus wants us to be. 

Lessons Leaned: Training of volunteers takes a lot of time. Services in shelters are needed. Advanced volunteering – i.e. volunteering in meaningful activities beyond meal prep – is needed. It can be as little as 2 hours per wk but it needs to be periodic, consistent, regular. **Next Steps:** A new I4E/CareerWise team led by Prof. Dorie Solinger is serving at *The Link*. Lynn Redmann has added detailed instructions to the training of volunteers and will begin to form a new team of volunteers for *The Lighthouse*, a new shelter in Costa Mesa. **Grants:** Thanks to PWP for a Bogie Grant for partner CareerWise (Fullerton) \$750.00.

 Goal: Designed to get to know people working in the area of homelessness and housing

Feb. 5 – **Office Hours with Mohammed Aly**. 0 from our groups.

March 27 - Casa Teresa.

Status Report:

Limit of 10 attendees. Event sold out. 10 % attrition. 9 attendees. We met a pregnant mom and chatted over brunch. Visited the Boutique (used clothing store) in Orange.

Lessons Leaned: Trauma informed care is critical in any kind of service and housing for people who've suffered homelessness. Family reunification is a strategy that is helping people stay housed.

Coffee with Anita. Did not happen except with individuals (same old story as last 1 year!!) **Lessons Learned:** The I4E mailing list has ~200 Irvine residents. I was unable to get anybody interested in hosting a talk. Neither IPC/Shepherd's Grove nor my HOA responded to my requests through official and unofficial channels to partner with me to host community homelessness talks. Might this be indicative of the level of prejudice and resistance against homelessness solutions? Someone said, "The only thing more controversial than homelessness are solutions to it." This seems true, sadly.

• Learning by Transforming Knowledge into Action:

April 14 - Family Promise - 0 RSVP; canceled.

April 26 - Creative Crafts for a Cause – Thanks to PWP for a Bogie grant for \$1250 to buy the hygiene supplies. Event limited to 30 attendees. Sold out. 50% attrition. PWP grant \$1,250.00; also received \$50.00 for supplies. A successful event despite the 50% attrition. Thank you to City of Irvine and the High School Youth Action Team for coming alongside us. Status Report: 26 attendees. 14 belonged to the High School Youth Action Team, Irvine. Seamstress team lead Suzanne Kameya designed the sturdy, lightweight, drawstring bags. At a pre-event, Regents Point friends helped Suzanne assemble the ready to sew bag kits. On the day of event, Suzanne, Mary DeBar (Canvas) and Judy Bell (Laguna Beach) stitched some bags. 30 drawstring bags were pre-made. Attendees filled the bags with hygiene supplies and wrote 30 compassion notes. A connection tips talk. Thanks to Bogie grant to I4E to buy the hygiene supplies. A few kits remain to be stitched and in God's perfect time this will happen. Please contact me, if interested.

Lessons learned: Asking people to talk to homeless people to make an authentic and meaningful human connection is for most people a very difficult and overwhelming task. **Next Steps:** 5 bags were taken by the leaders and given. InSight took 10 bags to give to their writers to make connections. I4E distributed 15 bags at May 4th Gathering and asked people to share their stories with SEEDs or via the Homelessness Mentor Network .

 Advocating Goal: Get to know homeless advocates, formerly homeless people, and local elected leaders.

Outcomes: Placentia city council meeting attended by 4 PWP.

• **Donation Goal to** Raise needed supplies and/or funds based on homeless people/service needs.

Outcomes:

I4E received a donation of 170 basic hygiene kits. These were distributed as follows:

Challenge:

- Look at your own attitudes
- o Talk to neighbors
- Find out who in your city council is working on emergency shelters and legal encampments and begin to make friends with people in encampments.
- Find out who in your city council is actually working on affordable and housing for homeless people and see how you can come alongside them.

Invitations

- 15 people took a Compassion Bag each home to gift to a homeless person in their neighborhood and help build social capital.
 - A Leaders and Mentors Network was set up of people who offered to help do this. The network includes two newly housed people.
- o To apply for Presbyterian Mission Agency Self-Development of People grant.
- To investigate the St. Francis Challenge and Safe Organized Spaces legal encampments – and question municipal governments about anti-homeless laws in OC cities
- 10 people took the Century Villages at Cabrillo Social Impact Report to bring to their mayor and city council members, and invite them to visit CVC.

LEGAL ENCAMPMENTS SAFE ORGANIZED SPACES (SOS)

YOU ? KNOW

Safe Organized Spaces is a community integrated village model that meets CA state codes for emergency shelter buildings and service standards. Legal encampments or sanctioned campsites adapting SOS can help end OC homelessness.

BENEFITS INCLUDE:

1. 3,961 people in OC are living on the streets as of January 2019 can get immediate and essential services, thereby reducing the biological, psychological trauma of homelessness, improving public health, safety and limiting environmental impact

- 2. **Privacy and dignity** for the people experiencing homelessness, along with **fiscal responsibility** because the tiny homes or emergency shelter cabins cost \$11,590 per person/yr. Costs for water, shower and food for 20 100 residents is \$292,800/year
- 3. Under utilized private or public land is operated in coordination with city services, developed by multiple stakeholders from the local communities, costing taxpayers far less than law enforcement and clean-up of homeless camps. OC spent \$23 million on law enforcement without housing people. Temporary and humane legal encampments like SOS place 'service resistant' people on a pathway to permanent housing

5 WAYS TO HELP OC PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS



Advocate

OC has an emergency shelter crisis.
Only 2,899 of the 6,860 people
counted as homeless in Jan. 2019 are
living in shelters, while the rest 3,961
people are living unsheltered, on the
streets. There are many groups
working to block emergency shelters.
Get to know your city council and
participate in public meetings to
advocate for a humane emergency
shelter in your city.



Build

OC has an affordable housing crisis. We need 111, 996 affordable homes. California state legislation allows homeowners to build Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs), also called granny flats, in-law units, backyard cottages, secondary units.

If you are a homeowner or have other properties, consider building ADUs, converting parking lots, and under-utilized land or property into much needed affordable housing.



Connect

Make an impact by making eye contact with a person experiencing homelessness. If you already assemble and give blessing bags, sandwiches or hygiene kits, add a note of inspiration, and take a few extra minutes when you give the gift to say hello, talk, and share a cup of coffee or have a meal together.



Donate

Shelters have online wish lists to make donating easy. Money and goods in kind are welcome. New socks, underwear, feminine hygiene supplies, men's clothing, toiletries, including moisturizers, sunscreens, wet disposable towels, and emergency blankets are always critically needed.



Empower (Volunteer)

The average American spends less than an hour per week volunteering. Often, volunteers serve meals around holidays. Emergency shelters need year-round support and volunteers with skills like resume creating or editing, job applications, and tutoring. Volunteering in this way will EMPOWER people and change lives. Volunteer 2-3 hrs per week in empowering activities like Career Development Services in a homeless shelter near you.

Overall Lessons Learned from the Housing Experience:

A Bridge Shelter is a type of Housing-first emergency shelter that's been in LB for 30 years.

Critical educational need exists for increasing the awareness of domiciled residents about homeless people and the range of housing solutions that are needed and that are working.

Shelters, Very Low Income Affordable housing, and Permanent Supportive Housing needed.

The anti-homeless laws and law enforcement approach to homelessness isn't working. We became aware about temporary Legal Encampments like Safe Organized Spaces.

Everyone Counts PIT count results day before last Housing Experience.: 52% chronically homeless of the close to 7,000 homeless in in the OC. 48% still need other kinds of affordable housing. Shelters are not working (either no beds or inhumane).

Other Lessons:

- Both Charity and Justice have a place think carefully strategically and missionally
 what you want to do to help in this crisis.
- Collaborate. Partner. Team up!! Don't reinvent the wheel. Don't do it alone. Form and learn in teams and small groups. **Investigate our church's SDOP ministry**.
- Two key principles to follow, individually and collectively:
 - o Strategic Find the critical needed fit between service and needs.
 - o Missional Stay in touch, i.e. connect with people experiencing homelessness.

Next Steps:

- **Housing** Housing-focused bridge emergency and bridge shelters are needed as the numbers show just as much as affordable housing, and permanent supportive housing are needed.
- **Jobs** Career dev services in shelters as well as jobs that pay living wages needed.
- **People** Community development. People development. **Build Social Capital**.

Strategic Directions by Garrett Dunbar: How do we leverage community support for permanent solutions that are founded in evidence-based principles? A conversation highlighting innovative nonprofit community development organizations such as Villages at Cabrillo, Skid Row Housing Trust, and the need to form partnerships strategically to provide housing, wrap around services, and build community for our neighbors experiencing homelessness. Sharing insights from Community Street Outreach events as well as a unique pilot program funded by the Los Angeles County Department of Mental

Health, offering holistic field based support through intensive case management. People minded, environmentally conscious, involved in purposeful social action campaigns, and determined to give back to the local community, **Garrett Dunbar** is the Founder, President and CEO of *The OC Burrito Project*, and a full-time Personal Service Coordinator at *Mental Health America of Los Angeles*' Homelessness Full Service Partnership, ARCH Program.

Missional Actions by Marney Wilde: A small church, utilizing presbytery, government, and community guidance, has formed an Outreach to Homeless Neighbors team. Members work directly with persons living on a nearby sidewalk in order to help them attain their goal of housing. Additional programs are designed to assist the newly-housed to acquire the skills and resources needed to avoid falling back into homelessness.

Marney Wilde has a heart for serving those that Jesus mentions in Matthew 25: 35-36, and a part of her efforts involve support for those experiencing



homelessness. She is a PC(USA) Ruling Elder, a member of St. Mark's Presbyterian Church, Lomita, and active in the work of Pacific Presbytery, serving on the Commission for Preparation for Ministry.


