Countywide sales tax revenue totals more than \$21.36 million for fiscal year 2006 compared to \$20.49 million at this point in fiscal year 2005.

BLOUNTVILLE - Countywide sales tax revenues are about \$875,000 above last year at this point, Sullivan County Accounts and Budgets Director Larry Bailey said last week.

After taking a downward dip in November, revenue from sales taxes generated in the city of Kingsport bounced back this month with a more than \$900,000 increase from the same month last year, Bailey said.

When a consumer pays sales tax locally, it is sent to the state, which redistributes it back to the county and its cities based on collection site.

Sales tax revenue is typically distributed back to localities two months after being collected.

collected Taxes November, for example, come back to the localities in January.

In January 2005, the state sent more than \$1.64 million total back for sales taxes collected within the city — with half, or more than \$820,000, going to the city of Kingsport's coffers, and the other half being split among local school systems.

Alderman Hoyt Denton, the designated alderman for property, has been asked by the Kingsport Board of Mayor and Aldermen to review all city-owned property and return with a recommendation if any property should be deemed surplus and

Though Denton said he has not had time to investigate the properties, he added that the reason for going through this process is to try and make surplus property more useful to the citizens of Kingsport.

"I haven't taken any action on that because we've been dealing with a more important real estate issue," Denton said, referring to
