

FAIR BEING STAGED BY COLORED PEOPLE AT LOCAL CHURCH

Began Last Night and Will
Continue Through Friday
Night—Much Interest is
Being Shown

Much interest is being evinced in a "fair" being put on by the colored people of this city at the Bristol Highway M. E. (colored) church, of which Rev. A. D. Williams is pastor. The fair began last night and will continue through Friday night. White people, as well as colored people, are invited to attend.

The church has been divided off into a half-dozen or more booths decorated in various color designs. One booth is of Egyptian design, and in it there is an "honest-to-goodness" fortune teller.

Last night there was an old time spelling bee at the fair. Tonight will be "Dunbar Night", featured by negro folk songs and selections from Dunbar. Tomorrow night the program will be featured by an address by Mrs. J. W. Harrison on the subject of "Woman's Place in the World." Thursday night the program will consist of a "Womanless Wedding." The final program Friday night will be "A Trip Around the World."

The proceeds of the fair will be used to send representatives to the district conference to be held at New River, Va. The fair is being put on by the Ladies' Community Club, under the auspices of the church. The men's committee in charge of the fair consists of Preston Collins, Clyde Collins and Bradies Horton; the women's committee consists of Misses Sue Collins, Cle Williams, Viola Horton, Gertrude Horton, Nellie Patton, Edna Wilson, Kate Hale, Mrs. Joseph Fain, Mrs. Armstrong and Mrs. Reece.
