## 300 Books Have Been Circulated in Two Months Among Colored People

Increasing interest has been shown in the public library at Douglass school since the opening of the library for colored people in July. A total of 300 books have been circulated, with 200 adults and 115 children taking advantage of the opportunities.

Leaders in promoting the project said yesterday that since the Douglass public library is one of the few recreational opportunities for the colored people of Bristol, it is hoped they will continue to avail themserves of its services.

The librarian acknowledged donations of money and books during the summer.
