LOCAL COLORED CHEF FINED \$150 AS RESULT OF FIST FIGHT

Second Participant in Fight Slated For Trial
This Afternoon—Officers Have Difficulty
Effecting Arrest



As result of an altercation at a negro restaurant on Sullivan Street yesterday afternoon, Ed Harris, local colored chef, was fined \$150 and costs in city court this morning on charges of drunkenness, resisting arrest and assault and battery, and Jim Ross, also colored, it scheduled for preliminary hearing before City Judge Napoleon Bond this afternoon on charges of an assault upon Harris and an old

count of carrying arms.

The cause of the scrape between Harris and Ross is not known. In the altercation, Harris received a severe cut on the shoulder, said to have been inflicted by a knife wielded by Ross. Officer Clay Crawford intervened and when he attempted to place Harris under arrest, the latter resisted and a fight ensued between the negro and the officer. With the assistance of Officer Joe S. Marrs, who was just recovering from an illness, and Tad Pyle, employe of the Johnson Service Station, Harris was finally subdued. During the altercation with the officer, Harris is alleged to have taken Officer Crawford's gun from his holster.

Officer Crawford stated today that it was a miracle that neither he nor Harris was fatally or seriously hurt in the altercation.

The charge of carrying arms is held against Ross by Frank Camper, who claims that the negro drew a gun on him several days ago. Ross is pressing the charge of assault.
