Public Program Tuesday to Mark Beginning of the Much Needed Service

A public library for colored people of the two Bristols, to be known as the Tenneva Public Library, will be opened with a speaking program, reception and

book shower at Slater high school, McDowell street, at 3:30 p. m. Tuesday.

Seven hundred fifty volumes, including two complete sets of encyclopedias, constitute

nucleus of the new library. Plans are under way to obtain a gift from the Rosenwald Fund for the full-time services of a graduate librarian and a permanent home for the library, equidistant

from all points of the two cities. The library is housed temporarily in the Slater high school building.
