Meridian. - Arrive at

the 14<sup>th</sup> of last May, with  
Capt. Steimmeyer, taken a  
prisoner on that day, join  
me. - Write to my Aunt  
just at sunset. -

Aug. 3<sup>d</sup> 63

TUESDAY, February 14th, 1860.

Ride over the miserable  
road 82.50 from Me.  
to Morton River. Arrive  
at 8.50 P.M. 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  P.M.

to the Bivouac of Sixty  
Brigade and over

Regt. after seventy  
days leave of absence

Morton River.

FRIDAY, February 17th, 1860.

Thursday - 6<sup>th</sup> Aug. 1863

This day three months ago I bade my wife good bye at Piedmont S.C. & joined Regt. in City, & started for the west - And much has since transpired. The loss of the Mississippi River, & the defeat of Lee in Pennsylvania!

SATURDAY, February 10th, 1860.

Aug. 10<sup>th</sup> 1863.

Nothing of note to chronicle. We are tramping our Biomec clean, & drilling. - Got my first letter from Solie on the 4<sup>th</sup> eight days & a half in coming.

Aug. 15 1863.

No special news from the enemy.

A few prisoners captured by our Cavalry on the line of the Big Black, & brought to Morton, is all we've seen of the enemy lately. Since the tenth our ration has been reduced as follows:

Early morning cloudy & quite cool. Ogier very ill - Gist buried 8<sup>th</sup> hrs. + 16<sup>th</sup> S.C. 80.

& his pick & fence  
destroyed, & is in a  
peck of trouble.

Ga. delivered at 1 1/2 P.M.  
Start at 3 1/2 - Genl. Chick  
arrange at Genl. Aik, on  
train, with 24<sup>th</sup> two Cos.  
of 46<sup>th</sup>, & Genl. List of

Mother.

SATURDAY, March 17th, 1860.

Sept. 5<sup>th</sup>

mountain in three arms.

Sept- 7 - 63 -

Another warm day -  
Colquhitt, Mist & I take  
a pleasant bath in Creek.  
In the evening Col - Stearns  
& I ride to the top of the  
mountain to the edge of  
our Birnamie. A fine  
view of the Doonung?  
Old man lives in  
the top of the mt.



TUESDAY, March 20th, 1860.

Sept. - 8 1863

Field Officer of the day,  
Today. - Rode down  
the Coosa River, on  
River road - crossed  
Mts. to Cure Spring  
Road & went on to Old  
ala. Road, reconnoitering  
country.

WEDNESDAY, March 21st, 1860

Sept. 12<sup>th</sup> 1863  
Saturday!

Since my last note  
it has been definitely  
ascertained that  
Genl. Bragg has evacuated  
Chattanooga,  
& the position held  
by Buckner, at  
Charleston, falling  
back into Georgia.

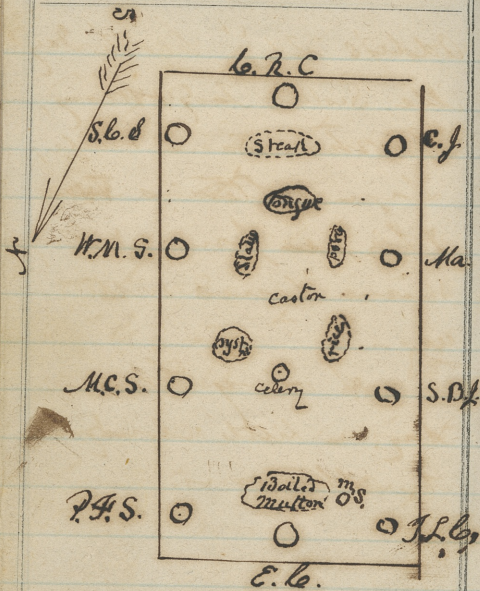

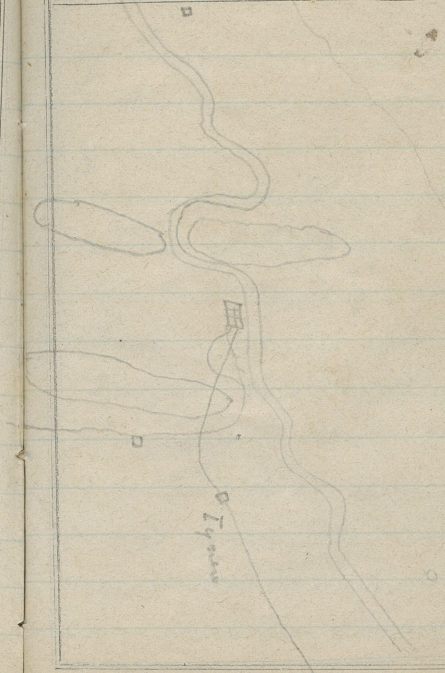
