For gallantry in action: Captain Woodhouse distinguished himself by gallantry in action on 6 May 1970 while serving as Senior Battalion Advisor, 1st Battalion, 5th Regiment, 2d Infantry Division, Army of the Republic of Vietnam. On this date Captain Woodhouse was advising the 1st Battalion during a combat patrol in the Hiep Duc District, I Corps Tactical Zone. As the unit was completing a resupply mission, the headquarters element and one rifle company came under attack by a well-coordinated, heavily-armed enemy force. During the initial movements of contact, a barrage of hostile mortar, rocket, and automatic weapons fire wounded several Vietnamese soldiers and pinned down the friendly force. Captain Woodhouse, completely disregarding the imminent danger to his life, twice ran through the hail of enemy fire in an attempt to rally the troops and aid the commander in organizing a counterattack. As the battle continued, the unit split into two elements, leaving one directly in the area of concentrated hostile fire. Captain Woodhouse again exposed himself to the withering enemy fire as he moved forward to rescue the wounded soldiers. He led them 1500 meters through sporadic rocket fire to reach a secure area, where he organized a landing zone and directed medical evacuation missions for the most seriously wounded. His courage and calm reaction to an extremely critical situation was directly responsible for saving the lives of several Vietnamese. Captain Woodhouse's conspicuous gallantry in action was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflected great credit upon himself and the military service.
