ADDITIONAL DESCRIPTION

ADDRESS Seven Wamesit Court

Seven Wamesit Court was demolished in late 1992. Before demolition, this was a two-family residence which connected to #5 Wamesit Court and was part of an intact group of small 1 1/2 story frame vernacular workers' houses dating from ca.1830 which were moved to this location about 1860. (see also #1,3,4,5,and 8 Wamesit Court).

Before demolition, #7 Wamesit Court was six bays across, with a main entrance at the fourth bay and secondary entrance in the side ell connecting it to #5. Windows in the house had been largely replaced with new 1/1 sash. Original features included the wood clapboards, still located under old aesbestos shingle siding, as well as the window trim and door transom. Brick chimneys were located in front of the ridge and in the ell. The building was in deteriorating condition due to minimal maintenance. As of mid-December, 1992 the lot had not been paved.
