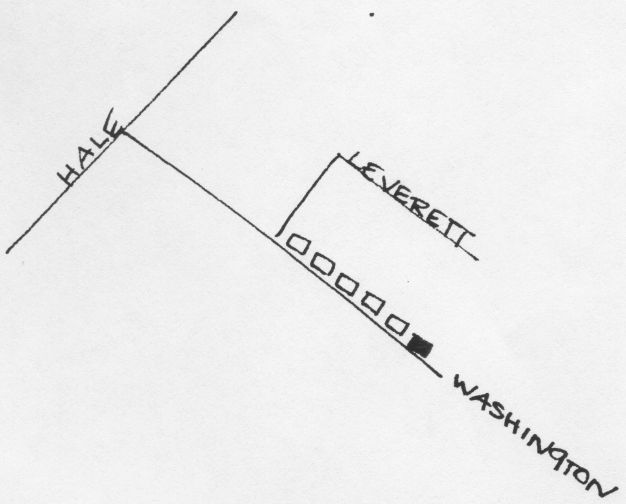

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

Washington Street was laid out in the 1870s and most of the houses built on it resemble this 2 family frame building with pattern book ornament common to Lowell. The spindle-like porch balusters and incised vergeboard illustrate Eastlake's influence.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

M.V. Evers, the owner in 1896, is not traceable through the directories. The house was undoubtedly a rental property for nearby laborers.
