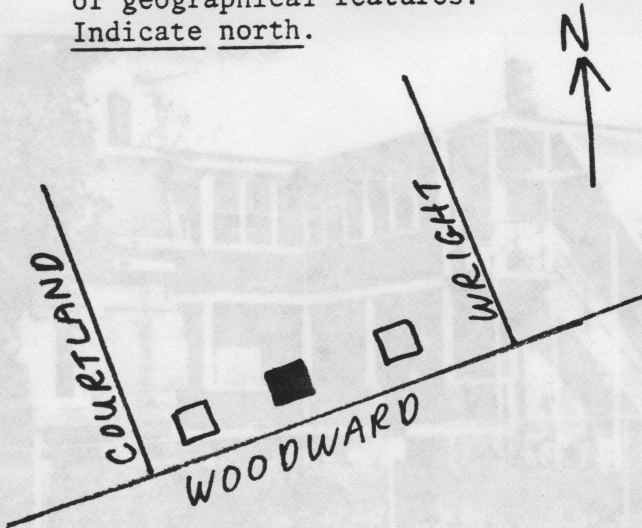

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

An unusual side hall cottage of brick in the Mansard style. Notable features include the recessed dormers, angle brick pattern at the cornice, and segmental lintels of brick.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

Although stylistic evidence suggests a date of c. 1875, this house does not appear until the 1896 Atlas. It was owned by Oliver S. Flint, listed as a foreman in City Directories of the 1870s. The next occupant of the house was George F. Flint, a fireman and driver of Steamer #5 (presumably a relation of Oliver Flint).
