ADDITIONAL DESCRIPTION

This late nineteenth century vernacular multiple residence has a few Colonial Revival decorative details. These include simple Doric columns on the second and third story porches, recessed panel corner boards with molded caps and a modillioned cornice. A one-story storefront was probably added in the early twentieth century.

6) IMPORTANCE OF PROP TO HIST SETTING integral to character (see Add. Info.)

97 Adams Street appears to correspond to a narrow lot that serves as a driveway to two garages. 105 is the one-story storefront. 107 is the house itself which faces Franklin Court, a brick sidewalk into a small inner block yard faced with multi-family buildings.

A grapevine in the left side yard is used by the occupant of the food store for the production of brined Greek grape leaves which he sells.

ADDITIONAL HISTORICAL INFORMATION

This site is part of the land that was auctioned off by the Locks and Canals Company in 1845. John F. Manahan, a carpenter, of S. T. and J. F. Manahan Company purchased the land in 1846 which ran from the current 107 Adams Street to LaGrange Street (Northern Middlesex Registry 45:499). It was probably Manahan who laid out Franklin Court, which forms the northern boundary of this site, and built two small houses on either side to form a residential lane. Each house contained two dwelling units. Those on the south side were owned in 1850 by Mr. Sargent. A number of these small courts were built in the Acre at that time (see Research Report on 1 Marion Street).

In addition, Manahan probably built the house owned in 1850 by Mr. Otis H. Morrill, a school teacher, which stood where the lot numbered 97 now is. By 1896 another house had been built on the rear of this lot.

Ca. 1890-95 the current building replaced the house at Adams Street on the south side of Franklin Court. It was owned by Henry Castles in 1896. The other above described buildings remained on the site until approximately 1930.

Franklin Court now provides access to the building at the rear of 28 LaGrange Street.
