ADDITIONAL DESCRIPTION

This late-nineteenth vernacular building has a few simple decorative features. There are shingle skirts around the porches and a dentil course and several moldings at the cornice.

The yard to the right (north) contains a low retaining wall at the rear. There is a low granite ashlar retaining wall extending from the right two-thirds of the way across the front of the lot.

ADDITIONAL HISTORICAL INFORMATION

Before 1879 there was a building on the southern half of this site. It may have been constructed as early as 1850 when other houses were being built on Adams Street. Probably in the 1880s, a wood frame building was built on the northern half of this site.

In approximately 1910 both buildings were replaced by larger wood frame structures. These were owned in the 1920s and 1930s by the Abodeely family. The building to the north was removed in the recent past (1960 to 1970).

ARCHEOLOGICAL COMMENT

There is archeological potential for recovering remains of the frame building which was located on the southern half of this property, which had probably been built in the 1850s.
