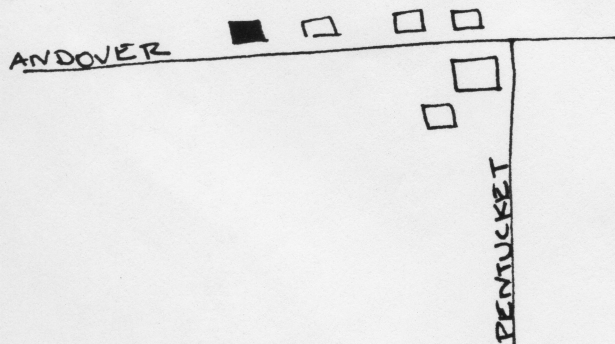

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

Like other large residences built on Andover Street at the turn of the century, this was designed in the Colonial Revival Style. The circular portico with paired Doric columns, pedimented dormers, Palladian window and gambrel roof are all typical of the style.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This is the second house on the site, replacing an earlier residence owned by Horace Shattuck. Freeman Shedd, who lived at 396 Andover and owned and developed much of the land in Belvidere built this, probably for speculation.

The architect, Edwin Clark of Chelmsford, designed a number of Colonial Revival houses in the Oaklands. His design for 791 Andover Street is a near twin of this house.
