ADDITIONAL DESCRIPTION

This is an extended version of the multiple family building characterized by facade bay windows or oriels and cornice elaboration, which was built repeatedly in the Acre in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

The building features a projecting modillioned cornice. The wide frieze board, embellished by a dentil course directly under the cornice, is finished over the corners of the oriels by elaborate brackets and pendant drops.

The area behind the building is paved with asphalt.

ADDITIONAL HISTORICAL INFORMATION

The first building on this site was very likely constructed in the 1850s. An L-shaped building extending around the corner from Adams Street onto Cross Street, it was composed of twelve small dwelling units, early with separate street numbers. Many such buildings existed in the Acre in the nineteenth century. Their form no doubt reflects high population density of the Acre.

By 1896 a large addition or continuous new building extended back from the Cross Street portion of the building. That structure was torn down around 1930.

The Adams Street portion of the building was replaced by the current building ca. 1910. Pavis Shiffoin owned the property in 1924.
