ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

Unfortunately squeezed onto a small lot as one of the last buildings along fashionable Wilder Street, this house has a remarkable treatment of Stick Style and Eastlake trim. Of particular importance is the porch, a unique display of turned and jigsawed work. This is probably the finest porch of the period 1880-1890 in Lowell.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

William Bascom (Jr.) son of a prominent early Lowell businessman, lived in this house in the 1880s and apparently built it.
