

## NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

This house is an integral part of the proposed Tyler Park Historic District.

## ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This is a particularly well preserved Queen Anne house. It is  $2\frac{1}{2}$  stories in height and has its original porches on both east and south facades. Typical of Queen Anne houses of the period is the cross gable plan iwth fully pedimented gables. The house has retained its slate roof required by deed restrictions for buildings in the Tyler Park Lands subdivision.

Hinting at the Colonial Revival style also currint in the 1890s is the Palladian-type window in the east gable and the fluted porch posts which rest on panelled plinths. Stick Style window surrounds on the south facade and sawtooth shingle work in the gables indicate the builder was fully conversant with current stylistic devices of the period.

## HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

The Sherman-Berry house appears to be one of the first houses built in Tyler Park. The plan for the Park was recorded in March of 1893; six weeks later the deed for the lot was registered, and in August of 1893 water was connected to the house site. William H. Bent, the developer of the subdivision hired Olmsted, Olmsted and Eliot of Brookline to plan and landscape Tyler Park and the centerpiece of the development linking the irregular plots to a more coherent whole.

Frederick W. Sherman, the first owner of the house was a prominent businessman who operated an insurance business in the Hildreth Building. He also owned and operated a sand and gravel business from this address. The family resided here until 1927 when they moved to Orland, Florida. Mr. Leo Berry and his wife Bertha lived here until 1985. Berry was a prominent business man owning and operating a floor refinishing business from the house.
