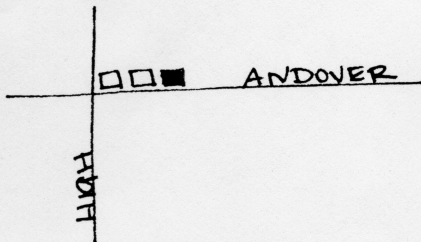

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ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

An early Italianate double house with a Greek Revival broad gabled facade. Paired round arched windows pierce the gable. Iron spiked fence encloses front of lot.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The earliest known owners are Knight and Tuttle who seem to have owned the property for rental. In 1879 George Choate, a mill overseer, occupied the house. By 1896, J.C. Pearson, a carpenter for the Middlesex Corp. and Abel V. Laughton, collector for the Morning Mail owned the house.
