This small house is of note because it is representative of the small, one-story bungalow built throughout Lowell before World War I. Although small, such houses are usually well-finished. The glazed porch with five fanlights is of particular interest.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The Winthrop-Puffer Street area was opened to development after 1904 and the subdivision of the Parker Street Sapulding farm by Hannah Spaulding. The area was built up with modest homes such as 87 Puffer and 103 Winthrop, both versions of the Bungalow style.
