ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

The Littlefield house is a handsome building showing the influence of the Stick Style on the Queen Anne style, in the form of trusswork and vertical boarding. Sunburst panels, a Queen Anne feature, are used in the gable ends and in the projecting bay of the front facade. Freestanding columns are a unique feature.

The Littlefield House is nearly identical to the R.A. Maxfield House at 5 Belmont Street.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

Charles Littlefield was a partner in Littlefield and Pease, paper box manufacturers.

The Smith-Adams subdivision of lands near the Pawtucket Canal provided lots for the construction of both workers houses and more elegant houses such as the Littlefield residence.
