


Early double house retains 6/6 sash on north half. Entrance sidelights partially blocked up. Rubblestone foundation.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The two halves were often owned by men in the same business. In the 1850s, Eliher Hunt and Alpheus Spalding lived here; Hunt was a butcher at the city market, and Spalding sold fruit and vegetables. In the 1880s, Langley Boardman and Maurice Roach lived here. Roach was a shoemaker, and Boardman sold boots and shoes.
