ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

A 2-story flat-roof building of rubblestone with granite lintels, sills and quoins. The building is 12 bays deep x 5 bays wide; windows are 12/12. In 1893 a fire caused extensive damage to the mill. The main building was originally 3 stories plus an attic, with a pitched roof and skylights. A dye house and boiler house were completely destroyed by the fire. The unusual round granite smokestack was originally 75' high but is now only 20' high.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

James Dugdale, who immigrated to the U.S. in 1847, began operations in this building spinning and braiding worsted yarn in 1868. The mill at that time employed 85 people and was known as the Lowell Worsted Mills. Before moving to this location the company occupied quarters in Whipple Mills (1860-68).

Other products manufactured by Dugdale's mill were mohair, camel's hair, yarns for cassimeres, knit goods, and coatings, "made here with improved patent doublers . . . which do away with all imperfections." The company's trade extended throughout New England and as far as Philadelphia.
