## ADDITIONAL DESCRIPTION

One of the largest buildings in the Acre, this is a very plain late nineteenth century vernacular multiple dwelling. Currently vacant, the windows of the first two stories are boarded up and those on the third story are broken out. (Burned and demolished August 1979.)

## ADDITIONAL HISTORICAL INFORMATION

This site is part of the land auctioned off by the Locks and Canals Company in 1845. By 1850 a building with four side-by-side dwelling units and two dependant ells to the rear had been constructed on the property. Slightly later (ca. 1855) a separate small building was built at the south end of the site.

The northern building was replaced by the present large structure in the 1890s. Thomas Mahoney who owned the new building in 1896 may have built it. The building remained in Thomas Mahoney's hands until after 1936.

The small building on the south portion of the site was removed after 1936, perhaps as late as 1960.

#### ARCHEOLOGICAL COMMENT

The first building activity occurred on this site between 1845 and 1855. Archeological remains which might be recovered from the south side yard would relate to the subsequent domestic use of the site and the small structure ca. 1855.
