## ADDITIONAL DESCRIPTION

This handsome, well-proportioned four-story Panel Brick commercial/residential building is notable for its brickwork and use of a variety of materials. On the ground floor, the three-bay building has a center recessed entrance to upper floor apartments, flanked by two storefronts which retain their original brick side piers and iron center piers and have handsome wood storefront mullions and paneling. A metal entablature separates the ground level from the brick upper floors, where 1/1 windows are paired within recessed bays which extend from level two to level three and are connected between levels by wooden panels. A band of brick dentils together with a granite band separates the third floor from the top story, which has three pairs of arched 1/1 windows. A terra cotta panel with the building name "Jewett" is centered above the fourth floor windows, just below the distinctive brick corbel table cornice.

## ADDITIONAL HISTORICAL INFORMATION

The Jewett Building was constructed between 1882 and 1896, when the building first appears on the atlases labeled "Est. of Jere. P. Jewett." Early businesses located there include the Joseph A. and Henry W. McDonald Brothers store, which sold clothing, boots and shoes (1894), McDonald Brothers Clothing and a dentist (1896) and a dentist and optometrist (1917). The upper floors were residential. The building remained in the Jewett family until sometime between 1906 and 1924, when it was sold to George Husson and became part of the Royal Theatre complex (see 484 Merrimack Street). In 1936, it is shown as one building with #484, as the Royal Theatre under the ownership of Rose Husson. On an 1945 map, it was occupied by the Hart clothing company.

Maps and atlases dating before 1896, including the 1832 map, show a previous building on the site. On the 1882 <u>Sanborn</u> atlas, this is shown as a two-part frame commercial row occupied by a tailor and dry goods store.
