ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

One of the outstanding residences of Wilder Street, the Charles Wilder House appears to be one of the earliest, built between 1874 and 1879. Of particular significance is the tall mansard tower, capped with cresting and small round-arched windows. Some of the original landscape design is still evident, in the form of a well-planted curvilinear entrance drive.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

Charles W. Wilder (? - 1879) was a partner in Hunt and Wilder, provision dealers, and possibly the son of Charles H. Wilder, a local farmer who subdivided the area in the 1870s.
