

## RESOLUTION ON WOMEN'S ECONOMIC EQUITY ACT OF 1981

Whereas, One purpose of Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. is to prepare girls for their responsibilities in the home and the community; and

Whereas, If women continue to experience economic discrimination and disadvantage, girls will find it difficult, if not impossible, to accept those responsibilities; and

Whereas, The ability of female adult volunteers in the Girl Scout movement to deliver the program to girls is seriously impacted by their personal economic well-being; and

Whereas, S.888 and H.R. 3117, known as the Women's Economic Equity Act, are comprehensive packages of legislative proposals that address economic equity for women; and

Whereas, This group of legislative proposals is a bipartisan effort and, while not addressing every economic issue which uniquely and negatively impacts women, is a good and substantive beginning for true equality between the sexes, and one which is probably achievable; and

Whereas, Women are currently the fastest growing poverty group in America; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. join the Congresswomen's Caucus in endorsing in principle the Women's Economic Equity Act of 1981; and further, be it

RESOLVED, That copies of this Resolution be sent to the sponsors of S. 888 and H.R. 3117, to be circulated at their discretion.
