A BILL

To establish a select commission to examine the issues associated with voluntary service.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SHORT TITLE
- 4 Section 1. This Act may be cited as the "Select Com-
- 5 mission on Voluntary Service Opportunities Act of 1981".

2	SEC. 2. It is the purpose of this Act to establish a Select
3	Commission to examine the issues associated with voluntary
4	service and—
5	(1) to focus national attention on the need for vol-
6	untary service, on opportunities which exist for such
7	service, and on alternative types of national service
8	programs which may help the United States to meet a
9	broad range of national and local needs;
10	(2) to explore and assess alternative methods for
11	providing the people of the United States with the in-
12	centives and the opportunities to provide useful service
13	to the community and the United States; and
14	(3) to provide the President, the Congress, and
15	the people of the United States with an overview and
16	assessment of existing opportunities for voluntary serv-
17	ice and a series of options for alternative types of na-
18	tional service programs designed to help the United
19	States deal with a number of serious challenges in the
20	areas of youth unemployment, conservation of natural
21	resources, protection of the environment, rebuilding the
22	inner cities, education, providing services for older
23	Americans and handicapped individuals, and personne
24	requirements in a wide variety of Federal, State, and
25	local programs and agencies.
