Although The House passed legislation making the Peace Corps an autonomous agency within-TOCA but showed concern about making too-close a tie by giving the Peace independent budget and program authority. Although I am not entirely happy with this approach, it important that the House recognize potential confliction problems if the agency were incorporated completely within IDCA.

Hould like to elaborate on the important of keeping the Peace Corps independent of foreign policy objectives. We have seen many examples

of effective work done by volunteers in countries whose governments were at odds with the U.S. for one reason or another. We have more volunteers in Africa than any other region of the worlds and they work there successfully inspite of the fact that U.S. policies with regard to Africa often run counter to prevailing opinion on that continent. A case in point would be the Front Line States of Africa, which look incredulously at the U.S. for its refusal to recognize Angola. Yet President Nyerere of Tanzania last year invited the Peace Corps back to his country and the first volunteers will arrive there this fall.

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On a more personal level, I returned to Ethiopia in 1977 and met with students I had taught years earlier. At the time of our reunion, U.S.—Ethiopian relations were at rock bottom, posters of Lenin and Marx were were prominently displayed in the main square, Russian and Cuban troops/visible throughout the country, the notation Ambassador in residence.
