
Congressman Paul Tsongascan tell you what he's done.

Paul created a "Job Resources Section" in his office. Then he sat down with labor and local officials to develop a plan of attack on economic problems. Here are some of the results of those efforts:

- saved 1000 jobs at Lincoln Labs in Lexington by helping to restore federal budget cuts
- helped organize Congressional efforts that prevented the closing of Fort Devens

- helped win approval of major public works funds for the Merrimack Valley after initial funds were denied

- cosponsored a bill to double the number of weeks of emergency unemployment compensation

It took three years to write and pass America's first urban national park bill. But Paul Tsongas and a lot of people in Lowell know it was worth the work.

The Park will restore Lowell with \$40 million and hundreds of jobs. It will be the first national park that honors the workers who built our country. It's Paul's proudest achievement in Congress.

It all started here, and Paul Tsongas never forgets it.



Paul's grandfather came to America about 1914. A year later he had saved enough money to send for his family. They're pictured here in 1926, at the Tsongas tailor and pressing shop in Lowell. Paul's father would later operate the store. And Paul started his first job here, assembling coathangers, at age ten.

Later, when other kids were playing sports after high school, Paul was driving the family laundry truck. "I didn't feel like I was missing out," he says. "It was what you had to do and wanted to do. It was the whole family working together."

And Paul learned. About things that almost seem old-fashioned today; about hard work; about saving money; and about determination.

In his first elective office as city councillor, he built a neighborhood park with his bare hands when the council didn't provide the necessary funds. In his successful campaign for County Commissioner on the reform slate, he walked 250 miles through every city and town in the county.

Friends who have known Paul for a long time say he hasn't changed much over the years. He still shows the same quiet determination he showed when driving the delivery truck in high school.

Never in his 37 years has he forgotten about the hard work that has been a family tradition. The Senate could use a few more people with that tradition.
