

History

City of East Point

Shortly after the Civil War, New South cities such as Birmingham and Atlanta experienced tremendous growth. East Point, positioned just to the south of the Atlanta city limits, experienced growth as well, and was considered at one point to be the 8th largest city in Georgia.¹

The area known as East Point was first settled in the early 1820s and was primarily an agricultural area that grew to about 16 families up until the beginning of the

Civil War. ² During the 1840s and 1850s, Atlanta was a hub for numerous railroads, one of which was the Atlanta & LaGrange Railroad. The easternmost point of that branch of the rail became known as East Point. Post Office records refer to East Point by 1851.³ Growth after the Civil War was enhanced by railroad access and geographical proximity to Atlanta. East Point first incorporated on August 10, 1887.

Schools

A revision of the Charter in 1891 contained the provision to establish a free school system. In 1896 Central School opened for white students; African-American students attended school in church and lodges. By 1916, increased population in East Point led to overcrowding in Central (which had been renamed East Point High School), leading to the establishment of Harris Street School on land donated by John J. Eagan.⁴

John Eagan was a wealthy industrialist who agreed to donate ten additional acres of land for the construction of a new high school in 1923. Eagan stipulated that the school be named for his uncle, William A. Russell, a Confederate captain, who became a successful businessman in the East Point area in the late 19th Century. The new Russell High School opened in the fall of 1923 and resided in the old East Point High location until the new facility was ready for occupancy in the spring of 1924. Russell High opened for its first full year of operation in the new building in the fall of 1924 with 300 students, 10 teachers, and a graduating class of 17.⁵ The physical facility, located in Jefferson

Park, contained 12 classrooms, a large auditorium, a science lab, and a state of the-art commercial department. The school was described as beautiful, spacious, and modern and was the pride of East Point.⁶ As was the case since the inception of education in East Point, Russell High continued to operate independently of the Fulton County School System.

Over the years, a number of additions were made to the original building. When all East Point schools merged with the Fulton County School System in 1927, a decision was made that Russell would stand as the sole high school serving South Fulton County. A necessary expansion to fulfill this role added 13 new classrooms, a fully equipped home economics department, an armory, cafeteria, and a modernized science department. The \$105,000.00 addition was celebrated with a Masonic Cornerstone laying on 5 September 1928 with W. S. Richardson, Grand Master, officiating and Col. Ed L. Humphreys, President, East Point Chamber of Commerce, in charge of programming. The consolidation of schools in East Point, Hapeville, and College Park produced a new Russell High attendance zone, covering much of South Fulton, that served over 1,200 students. Over the next ten years, overcrowding at Russell became an issue, which resulted in Hapeville and College Park students returning to new high schools in their respective communities by 1940.

The 1956-57 school year started with Russell students on double sessions with students now zoned for the then-new Headland High School. Headland was created to

alleviate overcrowding at Russell, but the Headland building was not scheduled to open until February of 1957, hence the double session at Russell High. The Russell students reported for the first session from 8:30 A. M. to 12:30 P. M.; Headland, complete with their own administration/faculty and comprised that first year of 8th, 9th, and 10th graders, attended Russell High from 12:45 P. M. to 4:45 P. M. The only exception involved the Russell athletic booster organization, which opted to support both programs.⁸

Prologue

Why would a Russell High grad be interested in writing a history of the Headland High band? It is a good question, and one that I heard often during the research and writing of this manuscript. There are several reasons:

- 1) Part of the Headland band history was already written. My first large-scale band history project involved that of the Russell band, two separate volumes of which were completed in 2018. Not surprisingly, a number of Russell High band events coincided with those of the Headland band. Parades, Fulton County Marching Exhibitions, GMEA 5th District Band and Solo/Ensemble Festivals, GMEA district honor bands, GMEA all-state bands, South Fulton County Orchestra, Beethoven Bi-Centennial Festival band and Russell-Headland football post-game receptions, were a part of the history of both bands.
- 2) Leslie Chambers Champion,'77 Headland band grad, edited much of my

Russell Band research material. I met Leslie several years ago when she was volunteering, along with her father, Charles Chambers, at the East Point Historical Society. Her Headland band memorabilia and memories of events helped to facilitate a Headland band history.

3) I had personal knowledge of two Headland band directors: John Laughter and Ken Durham. I met John when I was a freshman at the University of South Florida during the 1971-1972 academic year. As saxophonists, we were both in the USF saxophone studio and performed in other ensembles as well. After no contact for many years, we reconnected when I reached out to him only to inquire about his *Rock 'n Roll Saxophone* workbook a number of years ago. It was not until I met Leslie that I discovered that John had directed the Headland Band for two years.

I came to know Ken Durham during his visits to Russell High for
Thursday night marching band practices during my student days in the late
1960s. Bill Prescott, Russell's Band director, invited Ken over numerous
times to assist in critiquing and helping the Russell band. I got to know Mr.
Durham up close and personal during a weeklong Fulton County Jazz Band
clinic held at Headland High in the summer of 1970 prior to my senior year.
In the early 1970s, I was a visitor to, and later a member of, the Yaarab Shrine
band that Ken conducted. In the late 70s, when I was a band director in
DeKalb County, we crossed paths off and on during his Georgia Tech Band
days. In the early 1980s, I was also one of Ken's clients in his Primerica
Financial Services position.

4) The history of the Headland Band deserves to be told. The band earned an outstanding reputation through significant honors and recognitions as evidenced by numerous state/regional performance invitations and consecutive Superior festival ratings. These accomplishments represented a tremendous amount to hard work and dedication that deserves to be memorialized.

This band history attempts to document the Headland High School Band's nearly three decades of excellence and service to Headland High and the City of East Point from 1956 to 1982. The Headland band was featured at football games, patriotic parades, civic events, school concerts, music education conferences, and numerous other special appearances from Florida to Virginia. In addition, the band was an active organization that provided service to Headland High and the community in many capacities, such as holiday celebrations, patriotic appearances, and constant parades. Most importantly, the Headland band had an educational emphasis along with its traditional civic and school role. This additional focus was accomplished primarily by the music festival format administered by the Georgia Music Educators Association (GMEA).

Historic Scenario of Headland Bands

The Headland Elementary Honor Band

Merwin Crisman established the Headland Elementary Honor Band, Fulton County's first area honor band, in 1958. Since 1960 the band entered (and performed Class "EC" or "EB" music) in the annual GMEA 5th District Festival, consistently receiving Superior (I) ratings. In addition to festival performances, the band presented Christmas concerts at Greenbriar Shopping Center, performed annually at the Veterans

Hospital, and made spring concert tours of all local elementary schools. The Honor Band also performed at the 1973 SMENC Convention in Norfolk, Virginia.

The Honor Band had one regular 1 ½ hour rehearsal each week after school, and each student received two half-hour classes weekly during school time. The band was comprised of students in grades four through seven. Ninety percent of the students in the Elementary Honor Band attended Headland High School upon reaching the eighth grade. Much of the success of the Headland Band was due in large part to the Elementary Band feeder program.

Headland High School Band

Headland High School was organized in 1956 with Robert DePoy was Headland's first band director. ¹⁰ In 1960, Dan Smith became band director. Since 1962, the band achieved superior ratings in the highest classification of GMEA 5th District Music Festivals. In 1968, Ken Durham began eight years of service as band director and continued the tradition of superior performance at GMEA 5th District Festival. During his tenure Mr. Durham also established several additional groups including: The Scotchmen (stage band), The Highlanderettes (drill team), a Color Guard, and the Brass Choir. He also took the band to new heights and prominence, obtaining invitations to two Orange Bowl Parades and to several state and regional music education conventions.

In the fall of 1976 John Laughter succeeded Mr. Durham as the Headland band director and served for two years. Mr. Laughter sought to have the band reflect a deeper Scottish culture and therefore added both bagpipes and a Highland Dance team to the marching band. Mr. Laughter also started the tradition of competing in the Scottish

Highlander Games/Competitions held each year at Stone Mountain Park. James Sims was Headland's last band director, serving from the fall of 1978 through 1982.

Since its inception, the Headland Band accumulated a number of memorable outof-state appearances. Among some of the most significant of these were:

- 1964 Cherry Blossom Festival in Washington, D. C.;
- 1969 Honor Band in the Easter Festival Parade in St. Augustine, Florida;
- 1970 King Orange Jamboree Parade in Miami, Florida;
- 1973 GMEA Convention;
- 1973 SMENC Convention in Norfolk, Virginia; and,
- 1974 King Orange Jamboree Parade in Miami, Florida.

Headland High Band Directors

Particularly important in the band history of Headland High were the dedicated and highly qualified band directors who led the band at various points along the 28-year time line. Three directors - Mr. Merwin Crisman, Mr. Robert DePoy and Mr. Dan Smith - were members of the Atlanta Symphony while serving at Headland High, and several went on to substantial and influential careers after their Headland days.

Band Director Biographical Sketches



Merwin T. Crisman: August – November 1956

From a technical point of view, Mr. Crisman actually was the first band director at Headland. He served as a long-term substitute at the beginning of the 1956-57 school year until Mr. Robert DePoy was hired in November. In addition,

Mr. Crisman was the band director of Headland's feeder elementary schools and the Headland Elementary Area Honor Band, which performed often as part of the high school band concerts. The success of the Headland High Band over the years was primarily attributable to Mr. Crisman's recruitment and training of elementary band students, who moved directly into the high school program.

Mr. Crisman held both a bachelor of music and music education degree and earned his master of music degree from the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago, Illinois. While in Chicago, Mr. Crisman performed in the Chicago Symphony and studied composition with Leo Sowesky. He began his long career in Fulton County in 1948 as the band and chorus director at Hapeville High School. Around the same, he played French horn for over 15 years with the Atlanta Symphony and performed regularly with other top Atlanta organizations, such as the Theatre of the Stars, the Atlanta Pops Orchestra, and the Atlanta Community Orchestra, and toured with Henry Mancini and Johnny Mathis. The winner of several Georgia Music Club composition contests, Mr. Crisman was also a composer/arranger, having written commercials for several television stations, television shows ("I'd Even Go North for Southern Bread") and arrangements for the Atlanta Pops.



Robert Dale DePoy: Nov. 1956-1960

Mr. DePoy was born on October 19, 1926 in Columbia City, Indiana. He served as a member of the Army band in World War II. He attended Indiana University and graduated with a bachelor's degree in music. He was an active and long time

member of St. John's Episcopal Church in College Park where he and his beloved wife

Barbara sang in the choir. His career included playing French horn in the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, teaching music at Headland High School, and as manager in computer operations at Delta Air Lines for over 25 years. He loved traveling, theatre, music and spending time with family and friends. Bob died of esophageal cancer on August 17, 2015.



Daniel Smith: 1960 - 1968

Mr. Smith was a graduate of the
University of Michigan and earned both
a bachelors and masters degree from the
institution. He was a member of the
famous University of Michigan
Marching and Concert bands for five
years. In addition to his duties at

Headland High School, Mr. Smith played bassoon in the Atlanta Symphony. In 1968 Mr. Smith transferred to Riverwood High School and met a tragic death during the 1972-73 school year.

Kenneth S. Durham: 1968 - 1976

Ken Durham attended Miami Jackson High School, where he had been drum major and band captain. He earned his BME degree at Florida State University in 1965. While at Florida State, he was a member and assistant drum major of the Marching Chiefs. In addition, he was a member of the Symphonic Band, Collegians, and director of the ROTC Band and Chorus. After college Durham served several years in the military, which involved service as Post Special Services Officer at Fort McPherson and as

information officer in the Army Reserve/300th Public Information Detachment. Prior to coming to Headland in the fall of 1968, Mr. Durham directed the band and chorus briefly at Stone Mountain High School in DeKalb County.



Mr. Durham taught at Headland for 8 years. For a portion of that time, he also taught elementary band at Conley Hills and Dodson Drive in East Point. He was active in the GMEA organization, serving as division instrumental chair in the early 1970s.

Mr. Durham played trumpet in the Atlanta Community

Orchestra and was also director of the Atlanta Yaarab Shrine

Band for three years in the mid-1970s. In 1976, Durham entered private business after his years at Headland, working as an executive with Primerica Financial Services. At the time of his untimely death in 1995, he was a member of, and music director for, the First Baptist Church of Snellville, GA.

Maria N. D'Antonio, a staff writer for the *Atlanta Constitution*, wrote a feature article detailing Durham's legacy:

Ken Durham, former band director at Georgia Tech and at Headland High School in East Point, instilled his dedication to music in his students.

"He used to tell us, 'No one ever learned their full potential on an easy schedule,' "said Mike Ray of Peachtree City, who played the saxophone.

Mr. Durham, 53, died Wednesday, at his Snellville home.

Mr. Durham was respected by his students for his commitment to hard work. "He'd have us out there every morning hitting the chalk – marching before school started," Ray said.

The hard work paid off. At the annual band competition in 1974, the band had become so well known that it received a standing ovation, even before beginning to play, Mr. Ray said.

After eight years at Headland, Mr. Durham left to direct the band at Georgia Tech. He continued directing the Tech band for about eight years, when he left to work full-time for Primerica Financial Services.

Durham left his mark with, and had an important impact on, his Headland High students. In June 1994, after being apart for about 18 years, former members of the Headland High band, the drill team and majorettes held a reunion at the school and gave a performance on the school football field.

The event led to the formation of the Headland Reunion Band, led by Mr. Durham. Members took the opportunity to bring music back into their lives and began performing at area malls and churches.

"Ken was real big on giving back to the community," Mr. Ray said. "He loved performing at malls. The reunion band will make a special appearance at his funeral."

"We've got people coming from all over – pulling their horns out and playing for their service," said Mr. Ray. "I wouldn't be surprised if the church was packed with the band." ¹¹



John Laughter: 1976-1978

John Laughter grew up in Tampa, Florida. He attended the University of South Florida before earning a B. M.

Jacksonville University (FL). Prior to coming to Headland, he taught band and bagpipes for schools in Dunedin, Florida.

While in Florida, he directed the Dunedin City Pipe Band during which time the group toured many states, the Bahamas, Scotland and England.



James R. Sims: 1978-1982

Mr. Sims earned both a B. M. and M. M. Georgia State University. Prior to becoming the band director at Headland in 1978, Mr. Sims established the band program at M. D. Collins, serving as the band director there for 8 years.

Headland High Principals

Any successful band program necessarily involves the cooperation of all the stakeholders: band director, students, band parents, and administrators. Three principals led Headland High School during its history, all of who had successful and distinguished careers.

Paul R. Lewis: 1956-1969

Tom Richardson: 1969-1972

Garland M. Watkins: 1972-1982

Fulton County Schools Music Supervisors

The Fulton County School System was fortunate to have two distinguished and dedicated music supervisors leading the County music programs. During the Headland years much of the success of the County's music programs can be attributed to both Don Robinson and Joe Kirschner, the latter of whom frequently dropped-in as a visitor and occasional guest conductor at Headland High.

Don Robinson earned a Bachelor of Arts degree at the University of North Carolina in 1947, began teaching in the Fulton County, Atlanta, Georgia schools as an instrumental and choral conductor, and later served as an instructor at the University of



Michigan School of Music where he earned a Master's

Degree in Music. While in Michigan, he taught in the
elementary and junior high programs in the Ann Arbor

Public Schools, and later was an elementary and classroom
music teacher in the United States Air Force Dependent
Schools in Wiesbaden, Germany.

In 1958, Robinson returned to Fulton County Schools in Atlanta as Director of Music Education, where he served with distinction until his retirement in 1980. There he successfully increased the number of music teachers, put an emphasis on the performance of new music, and employed a string quartet in residence to perform and teach at area schools.

A talented conductor, Robinson served as Music Director of the Atlanta Boy
Choir, the Atlanta Jewish Center Chorus, the Chorale of Atlanta, and the Central
Presbyterian Church, and conducted groups at National, Division, and State MENC
conferences, and All-State Choruses in eight states. Additionally, he published numerous
articles in the *Georgia Music News*, *Music Educators Journal*, and the *ISME Newsletter*.
In 1970, he served on the National Planning Committee on the White House Conference
on Children, and also served as chairman of the MENC Committee on International
Relations, chairman of the MENC Bicentennial Committee, President and Executive
Director of the Georgia Music Educators Association, President of the Southern Division
of MENC, and was a nominee for MENC President in 1975. As a 46-year member of
ISME, he served as Chairman on the Commission of Schools and Teacher Education, and
was a Life Member of the American Choral Directors Association.

Robinson was honored with the Distinguished Service Award from the University of Georgia Department of Music in 1981, where he did additional graduate work, and was chosen to address the South Korean Music Educators Association in 1989. He was awarded an Honorary Life Membership in ISME in 1998, and became an Honorary Board Member of the Choral Guild of Atlanta in 2002. In retirement, Don remained an active participant and supporter of local music groups, including the Atlanta Music Club,

the Atlanta Opera, and the Atlanta Symphony. Robinson passed away in 2014. 12

Joseph Kirschner was originally from Chicago, where he attended and performed with the John Marshall High School Orchestra under the direction of Ralph Lewis, Clifford Lillya, and Merle Isaac. He attended Northwestern University in Evanston, IL, where he received both his bachelor and masters degrees in music



education. He later received a specialist in music education certificate from the University of Georgia.

After serving as band and orchestra director in the school systems of Bledsoe County, Tennessee and teaching at Roosevelt High School in Atlanta, Georgia in the 1950s,

Mr. Kirschner was appointed to the music administration staff

of the Fulton County Schools in Georgia in 1960, where he remained until his retirement as Coordinator of Music Education. During this time he also served tenures as a violinist with the Chattanooga and Atlanta Symphony Orchestras. For a ten-year period, Mr. Kirschner was a Conductor and Director of the Atlanta Community Symphony Orchestra.

He also served as a member of the national board of directors of the American String Teachers Association. He conducted all-state bands and orchestras and adjudicated regional festivals, contests, and auditions throughout the southeastern and central United States. He was especially proud to have served as a district band/orchestra director/festival adjudicator in every district of the state of Georgia.

He presented at workshops for the College Board and conducted many specialized workshops and clinic events in brass and string instrument pedagogy and instrumental

music education for students and teachers for school systems, universities, and professional music education associations, including the Festival Adjudication Workshop of the Georgia Music Educators Association. In 1999, Mr. Kirschner chaired the organizing and development committee for the certificates of appreciation and outstanding service, presented by the Georgia Chapter and the National Board of Directors of the American String Teachers Association.

Mr. Kirschner was a past president of the Georgia Music Educators Association and the Georgia (Zeta) Chapter of Phi Beta Mu, an honorary bandmasters' fraternity. He was the recipient of many awards and distinctions, including the *Distinguished Alumnus* - the School of Music of the University of Georgia Award, the Distinguished Career Award of the Georgia Music Educators Association, and certificates of appreciation and outstanding service, presented by the Georgia Chapter and the National Board of Directors of the American String Teachers Association.

Mr. Kirschner passed away on June 27, 2013 after a long battle with cancer. His wife, Elizabeth, along with four children and seven grandchildren, survived him.

Headland High School Band History by Year

Academic Year: 1956-1957

Principal: Paul R. Lewis

Headland H. S. Highlights of Note: By vote of the student body in October 1956, the name Headland Highlanders was chosen, along with red and black as school colors.

Headland Band appearances likely for the following football season schedule: No Football Team; football practice held in the spring of 1957.

The school year started with students on double sessions with the then-new Headland High School and Russell High. Headland was created to alleviate overcrowding at Russell, but the Headland building was not scheduled to open until February of 1957, hence the double session at Russell. Other than the utilization of the same school building, Headland and Russell were two separate schools from the outset. The Russell students reported for the first session from 8:30 A. M. to 12:30 P. M.; Headland, complete with their own administration/faculty and comprised that first year of 8th, 9th, and 10th graders, attended classes at Russell from 12:45 P. M. to 4:45 P. M. During the fall semester double sessions, the Russell athletic booster organization opted to support both programs. ¹³ Mr. Paul R. Lewis, a veteran of the Fulton County Schools since 1937. was appointed as principal of the new school; Miss Sarah Suttles was named the assistant principal; and, Mr. L. L. Deck, Jr. was selected as the Headland counselor. A staff of 21 teachers comprised the charter faculty.

Mr. Merwin T. Crisman, director of the Headland Area Elementary band programs and member of the Atlanta Symphony french horn section, was the first official band director, organizing and holding together a small group of young student musicians until a permanent replacement was named. Headland's first full-time band director was



Robert DePoy, a BME and
MM graduate from Indiana
University. He was officially
introduced in Headland's first
published newspaper.¹⁴
According to the article, he
did not conduct the band until

The GMEA Region 3 Music Festival, involving about 6,000 students, convened in Marietta from February 26 through March 2. Adjudicators included Richard Brattain, Vander Cook College of Music; Wilbur Hinton, director of Alabama Polytechnic Institute Band (Auburn University); and Christian Kutschinski, North Carolina State University. In addition to the pre-prepared 3-song requirement, bands were also required to perform sight-reading for the first time in the history of festival participation.

According to the Highlander Band photo in the 1957-58 Tartan Yearbook, the

ensemble grew in size from around 24 members the previous year to about 43. Playing a

B-Team schedule for it's first full year of existence, the Headland football team won the

first game, beating the Campbell of Fairburn Bees 18-0 in a Thursday night game at

South Fulton Park.

On Saturday, August 10, just prior to the beginning of the new school year, the City of East Point held a 70th anniversary celebration of its founding. Starting at 10:00 A. M., the four-mile parade was so large that it took over 1½ hour to complete. The parade groups organized at Headland Drive and Semmes Street, proceeded down Semmes through East Point Street, south along Legion Way, and then to Main and Lawrence Streets, just across from the front of Russell High where the parade disbanded. As a special feature of the celebration, many of East Point's male residents grew beards.

On November 16, shortly after the conclusion of the football regular season, the GMEA 5th District Orchestra Clinic was held at Georgia State University. The GMEA 5th District Band Clinic was held the following week at Georgia State University.

The first annual combined music department Christmas Concert was presented on Monday, December 9, as the main part of the Headland High PTA program. The concert included musical selections by the Headland Glee Club, the Girls Ensemble and 8th Grade General Music Class directed by Miss Mary Alice Dalrymple, and the Highlander Band, directed by Mr. DePoy. Band selections included: *Mutual March*, *Christmas Medley of Tunes*, and *Christmas Suite*.

The GMEA Region 3 Band Festival met at West Georgia in Carrollton from February 27 to March 1.

On April 2, 1958, the bands of South Fulton County performed in a reading clinic at Headland High School. In addition to the Headland band, groups from Russell

Students returned to school in September to see a major new wing added to the school. This new south wing almost doubled the size of Headland's physical plant.

The Headland High Booster Organization held their first meeting of the school year on Monday, September 15 at 7:30 P. M. The group planned several fundraisers, the proceeds of which were determined to go for athletic equipment and school activities.

Mr. Ray Harris, Booster Club president, stressed that the band would receive about one-third of Booster fund-raising.

The first such Booster fund-raiser involved a fish fry on Saturday, October 11. To increase profits, Booster Club members canvassed the East Point business community and took pre-orders for fish plate deliveries. Ticket prices were \$1.00 per adult and \$.50 for children under the age of 12.

Another project that helped support the band involved a Booster-sponsored football game between the Sumner Park and Jefferson Park "Jim Thorpe League" football teams. These 85 pound and under teams, the future players of Headland and Russell, met on the Headland Field on Saturday, November 1 at 7:30 P. M. The Headland band performed a halftime show for the event.

The 10th anniversary of Atlanta's WSB-TV in September 1958 was cause for a major celebration. WSB negotiated with the Southeastern Fair to combine their respective parades, which produced a WSB parade of huge magnitude. For parade headliners, WSB obtained numerous NBC guests, including: Jackie Cooper of "The People's Choice;" Keith Larson of "Northwest Passage;" Spencer Williams of "Amos & Andy;" Richard Carlson of "McKenzie's Raiders;" and Gretchen Wyles, a popular guest on the "Perry Como Show."

In the days leading up to the WSB parade, Dave Garraway, well-known host of NBC's "Today Show," advertised the event in segments of his morning show. One such segment from Atlanta involved an interview that contained background music provided by the Fulton County Elementary Honor Band, many members of which came from the Tri-Cities area.

The parade began at 7:30 P. M. on September 30 and proceeded from the starting point at Peachtree and Baker Streets and continued down Peachtree to Whitehall to Trinity Avenue. The *Atlanta Constitution* reported that over 100 marching bands, Shrine units, Southeastern Fair floats, and other groups participated in the parade. The event lived up to its advance billing, drawing an estimated quarter million spectators, which was one of the largest parades in the history of Atlanta. Mayor Hartsfield, who led the

parade, declared, "the parade was one of the biggest I can remember in the past 29 years."

The PTA - sponsored Christmas Concert, featuring the full Music Department, was held on December 8. The PTA secretary wrote, "A delightful Christmas Program was presented for the Headland High School Parent-Teacher Association Monday evening, December 8, 1958 at 8:00 P. M. in the school auditorium." The band portion of the concert contained the following repertoire:

The annual South Fulton County Schools "Spring Music Festival" was held at Russell High on Monday, May 11. Under the overall direction of Mr. Don C. Robinson, Director of Music, Fulton County schools, the music departments of five high school choirs, bands, and orchestras combined to present the program. In addition to band students from Headland, the all-star band included members from Russell H. S. (Frank

Lentini, Director), Hapeville H. S. (John Beard, Director), Campbell H. S. (E. W. Moore, Director), and College Park H. S. (Harold W. Scott, Director). Festival selections for band included:

The Class of '59 was Headland's first graduating class and had the distinction of being the school's upper classmen for three years, since Headland added an additional grade each year until 1959. End-of-year senior activities began with the Headland Junior-Senior Prom on Saturday, May 9. The event was held in the school gym and reflected the theme, "A Paris Street Scene."

At the end of the school year, the East Point Lions Club awarded the James

Preston Memorial trophy to Headland drummer Tommy (Jimmy) Bledsoe in recognition

The school year opened with the addition of 16 new faculty members, one of whom was Ms. DePoy, wife of Headland's Band Director. Like Mr. DePoy, she was a graduate of Indiana University. She taught Health and Physical Education.

The Headland Band received a special invitation to perform at the dedication ceremonies for the new Fulton County Civil-Criminal Court Building located on the corner of Pryor and Mitchell Streets in downtown Atlanta. The band furnished music both before and after the 11:00 A. M. ceremony and was invited to a private dedication exercise in room 61 of the building.

The Headland Band was among a total of five high school bands, the Third Army Band, and the Yaarab Shrine Band, to perform with numerous other units in the Civil Defense Parade in East Point at 3:30 P. M. on Tuesday, October 6. A reviewing stand was set-up at City Hall for numerous dignitaries and important visitors. The parade started at the sound of four new Civil Defense sirens, which were newly installed. Remarking about the parade, Councilman A. W. Etheridge exclaimed, "The parade was one of the best I've ever seen in East Point."

Headland's first Homecoming Celebration and game (versus Chamblee High School) was held Friday, November 6 at the Headland Stadium. The homecoming queen was announced as part of the band's regularly scheduled halftime show; the crowning ceremony was presented by Richard Alderman, football captain, and Danny Peace, football Co-Captain. A dance with music by 'The Holidays' followed the game. The Headland Cheerleaders sponsored the Homecoming production.

While the Headland Band performed in an East Point Civil Defense Parade in early October, Civil Defense Week was held nationwide during the week of December 4-10. To kick-off the campaign and to heighten awareness of Civil Defense issues, Atlanta officials organized a large downtown Atlanta parade for Friday, December 4. The twomile parade stepped off at Peachtree and Baker Streets and ended at Trinity Avenue and Garnett Street. The Third Army Band was the lead music unit that included 15 other bands from around the Atlanta area. In addition to the usual complement of other civic, patriotic, and government participants, a large contingent of PTA groups added to the project. Elliott H. Jackson, Atlanta Metropolitan Area Civil Defense Director, indicated in an Atlanta's Suburban Reporter article that the Atlanta Civil Defense campaign was the largest in all of America.

The Third Annual PTA-sponsored Music Department Christmas Concert was held on Monday, December 14 in the school cafeteria. Following a number a choral selections, the band concluded the program with:

The 10th Annual UGA Music Festival attracted over 1,400 students, an all-time record number for the festival. Held on January 9, students from over 117 schools followed a hectic schedule that included rehearsals and clinics for band, chorus, orchestra, and twirling. The students also heard a performance by the Dixie Redcoat Band prior to playing their own concert in the evening. After the concert, the students attended a dance in the Memorial Hall ballroom.

Herbert W. Fred of the University of North Carolina served as the guest band clinician. Included in the band repertoire was his original composition entitled, *Moods Interlude*. Mr. Jack Best, a member of the Fred Waring organization, directed the choral activities, while Richard Seiber, Georgia State University in Atlanta, conducted the Festival orchestra. All students were selected on the recommendation of their high school instructor.

The post-football season Booster Banquet was held Saturday evening, January 16 in the school cafeteria. Such banquets were generally only football team affairs; however, the Boosters endeavored to recognize special groups that supported the football team during the season. In addition to the varsity and B-Team football players, members of the band, majorettes, and cheerleaders were invited guests.

The Annual GMEA 5th District Honor Band clinic was held at Bass High School on January 21-23. Select members of the Headland Band played under the baton of Guest Conductor Roger Dancz, then director of the University of Georgia Band. Selections included *Heat Lightning March*, *Suite Francaise* (Milhaud), *A Solemn Music* (Thompson), *Finale: Symphony for Band* (Berlioz), and *Selections from Gigi*.

The East Point Jaycees sponsored a "Miss East Point" parade on Saturday, April 10, as a lead up to the Miss East Point Pageant. The parade began at Forrest Avenue and moved down East Point Street, to Legion Way, and on to Main Street through the East Point Business District. Numerous high school bands, along with the 11 pageant contestants riding in convertibles, were among the parade participants.

The concert concluded with a rendition of Wilhousky's *Battle Hymn of the Republic* performed by the Headland combined choirs and band.

The Headland High and greater Atlanta music education communities were shocked to hear of the sudden death of Roy Drukenmiller on Wednesday, May 23. He was 63 at the time of his death and was serving as the Fulton County Instrumental Music Supervisor. Mr. Drukenmiller served a total of 32 years in the Fulton County School System, 20 which of those years were spent directly at Russell High as a science/band teacher and later as the Russell Principal.

Mr. Drukenmiller was laid to rest in Westview Cemetery. In a testament to Mr. Drukenmiller's legacy, many of his fellow teachers and former students attended the funeral and paid their respects.

End-of-year senior class activities began with a senior program entitled *Senior Circus* on Friday, March 4. The evening featured three short one-act plays: *The Great Joanne, The Light Went Out*, and *It's Cold In Them That Hills*. The scheduled headliner for the event was Tommy Roe, who at the time was a senior at Brown High in Atlanta. He started his professional career in and around Atlanta while still in school and went on to have a successful and popular music career, having retired in 2018. He wrote numerous hits, including *Shelia* in 1962 and *Dizzy*, which reached number 1 in America and abroad, in 1969. Roe's appearance at the Senior Circus would have been one of his very early career performances.

A month later, Headland's senior class presented the senior play on Friday evening, April 22 at the East Point Auditorium. The three-act play, *Who Wouldn't Be Crazy*, was stage designed by Mr. Leroy Jessup, Headland's art instructor.

Headland's second graduation was held at the Atlanta Municipal Auditorium on Monday, May 23 and involved 109 seniors. During the ceremony, Richard Lipes was awarded the Atlanta Journal Award, while Pat Britt was selected for the Faculty Cup.

Mr. Smith, Headland's new band director, was one of twenty new Headland teachers added to the faculty that fall. Even though Headland was a relatively new school, a number of these teachers were needed to keep up with the 1,000+ number of students, some of whom were already districted for the new Lakeshore High School set to open for the 1961-1962 school year.

The Headland Band opened the 1960-61 season with pre-school rehearsals beginning on September 1 at 7:30 P. M. in the band room. At this time, the band officially met Mr. Daniel J. Smith, the new band director. He took over from Headland's first band director, Mr. DePoy, who left to take a position with Delta Air Lines. In a short article published in late August, the *Atlanta's Suburban Reporter* wrote:

"Mr. Smith is a graduate of the University of Michigan and holds both a Bachelors and Masters degree from the institution. He was a member of the famous University of Michigan Marching and Concert Bands for five years. In addition to his duties at Headland High School, Mr. Smith will play Bassoon in the Atlanta Symphony." ¹⁷

Reporting on the progress of the band early in marching season, a *Tam-O-Shanter* reporter praised the band, indicating: "the band has entertained at many of the football games this season and have proven to be a great boost to school spirit." The 1960 edition of the Headland Marching Band numbered about 70 members, along with five majorettes: veterans Sue Estes and Cheryl Crowe, and newcomers Shannon Wilson, Ann Moore, and Joy Cook.

In a halftime ceremony held during the North Fulton/Russell football game played at Russell Field, Barbara Gullick, a Headland senior, was crowned "Miss Flame."

The "Miss Flame" event was the first a series of ceremonies held in conjunction with the East Point observance of Fire Prevention Week, which culminated with a large Tri-Cites parade through downtown East Point on Saturday, October 15. The Third Army Band joined other Tri-Cities bands for the musical portion of the parade. Over 100 units, representing groups such as the Civil Defense Organization, American Legion, Eastern Air Lines, and Yaarab Shrine Temple participated in one of the largest parades East Point had witnessed. The parade units organized at Lawrence Avenue and then proceeded down Main to East Point Street. From there the parade passed the Legion Building and traveled back to Main Street, where a reviewing stand was erected for the visiting dignitaries.

Headland's homecoming game occurred against Douglas County on October 21, a game won by Headland. Jana Hester was elected Homecoming Queen. A dance in the gym concluded the homecoming weekend activities.

The Christmas Concert occurred as the main part of the regularly scheduled

PTA meeting held on Monday, December 12 at 8 P. M. in the gym. In addition to a performance by the Chorus and Band Department, the Headland Orchestra made its first Headland appearance under the direction of Mr. Smith. On Thursday, December 15 of the same week, cheerleaders, majorettes, and band members were honored guests at the Headland High School Football Banquet held at 7:00 P. M. in the gym. As was the case the previous year, the Boosters and football coaches invited these non-football organizations for their contributions to the success of the football team.

Prior to the beginning of the school year, Nolan Lang, head football coach, announced his resignation. Bill Thorn was selected as his successor. Lang had been the only football head coach at Headland in its four years of existence.

Since the inception of Headland in 1956, the Headland Boosters, a primarily athletic organization support group, provided most of the band's fund-raising needs. With the beginning of the school year, the band parents organized their own booster group for the exclusive benefit of the band. H. D. Clark was elected president and Mr. D. C. Reynolds was selected to the important position of Finance Chairman. Band Booster fund-raising projects included the sale of school pennants, ribboned badges with miniature footballs, and plastic cushions at home games.

Homecoming week was a busy time for the band. A special show set the mood for the crowning of Sally Schley, Miss Homecoming Queen 1961. Mr. Gary Gallagher served as her escort. Fred Elsberry, President of the Student Council crowned Sally, while Johnny Gray, President of the senior class, presented her with a bouquet of roses. After a homecoming victory over Milton, Headland students enjoyed a dance sponsored by the annual staff.

The annual PTA-sponsored Christmas Concert was held on December 11 at 8:00 P. M. in the school gym. The Headland brass choir performed *A Carol Suite*, a four-movement work by Leroy Anderson, while the band performed *Jesus, Joy of Man's*

Desiring and Parade of the Charioteers from the film Ben Hur. The movie was an American epic historical MGM drama film starring Charlton Heston as the title character. Released in November 1959, the movie and the accompanying sound track were still popular in December 1961.

The music department returned from the winter holidays and assisted with a move to a new on-campus facility that was ultimately occupied in February. The new practice area was made possible by a physical education expansion addition. The new band and chorus rooms were built with acoustical tile ceilings and designed specially for music



classes. The band room in particular was much larger and contained numerous storage cabinets, practice rooms, and new offices.

The Headland band performed at the East

Point Auditorium as part of a Band Boostersponsored "Highlander Fling" held at the end of

February. The fund-raiser featured professional acts
and Headland talent featuring vocalists,
instrumental groups, and comedy acts, while an

Atlanta disk jockey emceed the show.

The Headland French Club, sponsored by Miss Jo Ann McNatt and led by president Cindy Lake, held a Mardi Gras parade on the afternoon of March 2. Numerous clubs and organizations contributed floats and other colorful items for this unique event. The Mardi Gras Costume Ball was held at the school the following evening with music provided by the band, "The Mad Men."

The 1962 GMEA 5th District Band Festival was held at Briarcliff High School in DeKalb County outside of Atlanta. In one of the first undertakings of its kind at Headland, the music department sponsored a production of the hit musical comedy, *H. M. S. Pinafore*. The two-night run was held on Thursday and Friday, March 29-30 in the school gym. Mr. Montague, Headland's chorus director, was in charge of the production, which utilized the work of Mrs. Elliott and students of the Art Department for set design and program covers.

Mr. Smith directed members of the band for musical accompaniment.

In a review of the production published in the April 1962 *Tam-O-Shanter* issue, Billy Greer, associate editor, wrote:

"Through the hard work of many students the operetta was presented before over 1,500 people. Everyone enjoyed the play very much and many compliments on its presentation were given. Everyone connected with the operetta should receive much credit, for it was one of the biggest and most successful projects undertaken by the music department."

The Miss East Point Pageant was held Saturday, April 7 in the East Point City Auditorium. East Point bands participated in the Miss East Point Pageant parade that included the contestants who appeared later that night in competition.

The Saturday festivities included a new feature: the running of the Mayor's Bike Race. The first Mayor's Bicycle Race occurred as a separate event the previous year, but it was included in 1962 as part of the activities scheduled for the Jaycee-sponsored Miss East Point Pageant. The bike race began at 2:00 P. M. following the Pageant Parade, which occurred earlier that morning.

Dick Lane, director of parks and recreation in East Point, organized the first Mayor's Bike Race in response to a July 1961 challenge issued by President Kennedy, who encouraged Americans to become more physically active. The inaugural Mayor's Bike Race included the mayors and several councilmen from East Point, College Park, and Hapeville; however, by 1962 the number of racing politicians had grown to a list representing over 15 towns and cities. The race ran over a half-mile course along Norman Berry Drive, starting at Harris Street and ending at the Swimming Pool. Bob Brown, a First Ward East Point Councilman, won a close race over second place finisher Charles Weltner, a Fifth District Congressional Candidate from Atlanta, and Mayor J. P. Smith from Menlo.

The annual South Fulton County Music Festival was held at the Hapeville Recreation Center on April 12. The festival band and orchestra was comprised of select high school all-star instrumentalists from Headland, Hapeville, Campbell/Fairburn, Lakeshore, Russell, and College Park. The orchestra performed *Trumpet Voluntary* by Purcell, *Finlandia* by Sebelius, and *Triumphal March* by Greig; band selections included

Overture for Winds by Carter, Folk Song Suite by Vaughn-Williams and The Sound of Music by Rodgers, arranged by Bennett.

The music department's spring concert was presented on May 11. The Headland Area Honor Band opened the concert by performing three selections, one of which included *Waltzing Winds* by Osterling. After several selections by two choral groups, Mr. Smith directed the Headland Cadet Band and Concert band in a total of eight selections. The band portion of the program concluded with Howard Hanson's *Chorale and Alleluia*. The String Ensemble, under the direction of Miss Joyce Relyea, contributed several selections. The concert grand finale was a combined presentation of the Headland choruses and band of *America, the Beautiful*.

Year-end senior activities included a production of the play *Bernadine*, written by Mary Chase. Mr. Roy, Headland's Drama Club sponsor, directed the work that was presented on April 26-27 in the East Point Auditorium. The Senior Follies were presented on Tuesday, May 8 and included a variety of hilarious skits, such as student parodies and portrayals of teachers, a talent show, and a senior boy Miss America pageant spin-off. Baccalaureate Service was held on Sunday afternoon, May 13 in the East Point Auditorium. A Senior Banquet and Dance took place at the Chrysler Corporation Training Center on the South Expressway the night before graduation. Graduation ceremonies were held on Wednesday, May 16 at 8:00 P. 

The Headland band participated in a parade very early in the school year. East Point held a Physical Fitness Day on September 8 and organized the parade to heighten awareness of the issue. In addition to Headland, other bands included the Third Army Band from Ft. McPherson. Dick Lane of the East Point Parks and Recreation Department handled most of the organizational details. The parade, which featured over 115 units, began at 10:00 A. M. in front of Sumner Park and proceeded in a long route through a number of East Point streets before returning to Sumner Park.

The first Band Booster Club meeting of the new school year was held on Monday, September 24 at 8:00 P. M. in the school gym. The band performed several selections in exhibition for the parents.

The 1962 Homecoming day featured Headland's first homecoming parade that was held during school hours. A police escort cleared the parade route allowing the Highlander Marching Band to lead the parade. Parade units included convertibles, floats, and marchers representing various school clubs and organizations. With the growth of the band, and with a separate booster organization dedicated to band activities, the band boosters organized a post-football season banquet primarily for the marching band members, guests, and parents. One of the first such marching band banquets was held at Pilgreen's Restaurant on Tuesday evening, November 6. Mr. Smith presented a recap of the season and was given a plaque in gratitude for his efforts during the season. Head

Rogers, who conducted the All-State concert for the Georgia Educators Association Convention at Atlanta's Municipal Auditorium.

The Miss East Point Parade was held at 10:30 A. M. on Saturday, April 20 prior to the contest later that night. Parade units featured clowns, cowboys on horseback, and vehicles of all types and description, and Miss East Point contestants driven in open convertibles. The Headland Band and Drill Team participated in the event.

Georgia Governor Carl Sanders designated March 2-9 as Georgia Youth Physical Fitness Week. East Point's observance of Physical Fitness Day, held on Saturday, May 4, drew a large crowd. A series of races of varying lengths were run through East Point during the course of the morning and afternoon; however, the highlight of the day was the third annual Mayor's Bike Race involving various government and political officials. Run the previous year as part of the Miss East Point Pageant, the race had grown in popularity and was held as a single attraction in 1963. Lester Maddox came across the finish line as the winner. Known for unusual bicycle tricks, such as riding a bike backwards, Mr. Maddox would later serve Georgia as a controversial Governor from

1966-1970.

The kick-off for the Saturday races involved a large 10:00 A. M. parade that contained numerous bands and over 120 unit entries. The groups formed at Kimmeridge Drive and moved down Neely, turned right at Church Street, proceeded up Cleveland, turned right at City Hall, and continued down East Point Street to Legion Way. The procession continued left on Main Street and turned left again on Forrest Avenue, where the parade disbanded.

The first of two band spring concerts was held at the East Point Auditorium on April 28. For the last concert of the year, the band performed a Pops Concert outdoors on the school lawn on May 17. As a reward for a successful year, the band was treated to a field trip to the beach at Callaway Gardens south of LaGrange.

End-of-year senior activities began with fund-raising efforts at the beginning of the second semester. The senior class set a goal of raising about eleven hundred dollars beginning with the sale of class pins. A Senior Class-sponsored Dance held on February 8 helped their cause. Another project involved the sale of note cards. The largest fund-raiser, however, was the popular Senior Follies presented on May 10.

Senior rings were delivered on April 12, just before the scheduled spring holiday. senior play, *Harvey*, was presented at the East Point Auditorium on April 26-27. The first selection depicted a Roman Band, complete with a chariot prop, playing *Parade of the Charioteers* from the movie *Ben Hur*. Next, the band depicted a circus group by forming a steam calliope and playing *Lassus Trombones*. The third segment, Dance Bands, featured the woodwind section in an arrangement of *String of Pearls*. The fourth and final set showed a modern football band in block band formation playing *Never on Sunday*.

The Headland Homecoming game occurred versus Jonesboro High School on November 8. Charles Bussey, Student Body President, crowned Janet Bailey as the 1963 Queen; Jay McDuffie, Captain of the football team, presented Janet with a bouquet of red roses. Brenda Brown, Captain of the Cheerleaders, was the crown bearer.

The annual PTA music department Christmas concert was held in the school gym on Monday, December 9 and featured groups from the band, chorus, and string orchestra. The band department played again in the East Point Auditorium on Wednesday, December 18 at 8:00 P. M. A program highlight was *Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer*. This concert generated a little more interest than usual since the band was selected to participate in the up-coming 39th Annual Cherry Blossom Festival in Washington, D. C.

In late January, GMEA posted the results of the GMEA All-State band auditions.

Headland students Andrea Weye and Betsy Bonnet Headland earned All-State Senior

High Orchestra recognition. They performed along with many others in a concert held in

Atlanta on March 19. Junior High All-State honors went to Cynthia Lillie and John Newsome, both of whom performed in Dublin, Georgia on April 18.

In a change from the traditional schedule of music concerts offered during a typical year, the music department students decided to add a special concert for the benefit of the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF). The concert was advertised and described in a rare Headland music department article reported in the *Atlanta Constitution*. Band member Richard Croker was interviewed and revealed:

"Since we were interested in doing something for youngsters, a contribution to this group (UNICEF) seemed one of the best ways to do it. We're particularly proud that we are going to present this number. It is probably one of the most popular of all masses, but it is seldom done by a high school group."²¹

The selection to which Richard referred was the Schubert *Mass in G*. The concert was held on Sunday, February 23 at 4:00 P.M. in the school gym. The program was billed as free, but contributions were accepted for UNICEF.

Headland had the privilege of hosting the East Carolina Concert Band directed by Herbert Carter on February 20. Headland was one of five high school concert locations to host a concert by the group. The East Carolina Concert Band performed a wide variety of selections, including Norman Leyden's *Serenade for a Picket Fence* and a trombone solo by trombonist Gene Narmour.

The Headland Band received a Superior (1) rating at the GMEA 5th District Band Festival held at Briarcliff High School on Saturday, February 29. Band adjudicators for the event were Julian Stephens (Auburn University), Harry Schmidt (Florida State

The annual South Fulton County Spring Music Festival was held in the Russell gymnasium on April 14, 1964. In addition to select band, chorus, and orchestra members from Headland, other students came from Lakeshore (Bert Kempe, Director), Hapeville (William W. Miller, Director), Campbell (E. W. Moore, Director), College Park (Harold Scott, Director), and Russell (William Latson, Director). Festival Band concert selections, conducted by William Hill of Georgia State University, included:

The South Fulton Beauty Pageant parade and the Mayor's Bike parade, held as separate entities in 1963, combined forces for a mega parade celebrating both events in 1964. Organized by the East Point Recreation Department, the parade was held on April 18 and included many groups, such as the East Point bands, the Atlanta Legion Post No. 1 Drill Team, and civil defense units. These groups assembled at Sumner Park and traveled up Neely Street, to Church Street, left on Cleveland Avenue and on to East Point Street. From there, the procession continued south to Legion Way, turned left onto Main Street and proceeded north to Forrest Avenue, where the parade disbanded.

On April 11, preliminaries for the Pageant's 18 contestants were held at Headland High School and produced the following semi-finalists: Earleen Bryan, Carmen Stansberry, Janis Palmer, Elaine Norris, Cheryl Topshe, Nancy Legg, Midge Ivie, Janet Bailey, and Barbara Wood. The finals were held at the East Point Auditorium on the evening of April 18. Janet Bailey, a Headland senior, was named Miss South Fulton 1964 and was immediately eligible to enter the Miss Georgia Pageant held in Columbus later in the summer. Earlier in the year she was chosen as Headland's Homecoming Queen, Miss Tartan, and Mardi Gras Queen.

From among over 200 band applications, the Headland Band was one of fifty bands from the country, and one of four bands from the Atlanta area, selected to



participate in the Cherry Blossom Festival in Washington, D.C. Walter Plant, Band Captain, made the first official announcement by reading an invitation to the band during rehearsal in late December. The band marched down Pennsylvania Avenue and also toured

several areas of the city. An estimated 750,000 visitors witnessed the gala spring spectacular.

For the third year in a row, the music department produced a Broadway musical. *Oklahoma* was chosen and represented yet another challenging undertaking. In participation numbers alone, the entire production, including stage crew, cast, orchestra, and others involved with behind the scenes activities, numbered about 300. The musical contained the requisite singing and acting challenges, but it also contained dancing scenes. The lead dancing role went to Betsy Watson, a sophomore chorus student who

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had earned Superior (1) rating at GMEA Solo/Ensemble Festival for her vocal rendition

of Puccini's Mio Babbino Carro. Betsy was also an advanced ballet student in the

Georgia School of Ballet and was an accomplished pianist. *Oklahoma* was presented on

May 8 and 9 at the East Point Auditorium.

Senior year-end activities began with the senior play, Seventeen, produced at the

East Point Auditorium on April 10 and 11. The Junior-Senior Prom, utilizing the theme

"Days of Wine and Roses," was held at the Biltmore Hotel in Atlanta on May 1. The

Glenn Moffet Band provided the musical entertainment, and Triangle Lanes was the

Gifted education in Georgia took a major step forward in 1964 with the establishment of the Governor's Honor Summer Program. In describing this new initiative, Dr. Claude Purcell, State Superintendent for Schools, offered these prescient comments:

"We expect this to become the prestige program in Georgia education. It could well be the greatest honor that could come to a Georgia student during his high school years. It will be a mountaintop experience for these 400 boys and girl, a sort of junior Phi Beta Kappa program. We want to bring them into contact with an able faculty and with some outstanding personalities who will visit the

campus. We plan to invite some world famous Georgians, and to bring other successful and talented people to talk with them during the summer." ²²

Created by the State of Georgia as a free, concentrated 8-week summer program held initially at Wesleyan College in Macon, Governor's Honors students were first nominated by their respective schools and then competed on a regional and state level for select positions in the areas of art, dance, music, drama, and several academic areas. The program was very popular from the outset, attracting over 2,500 student nominations for the 400 coveted spots. To this day, the Governor's Honors program continues to be an important college-like environment and experience for rising junior and senior high school students.

For the inaugural year, Fulton County schools sent a total of 24 students to Wesleyan College in June and July prior to the start of the new school year. A total of six students from Headland were chosen; three in academics and three in music. Those students who went the academic route were: Terry Cobb, foreign language; Randy Rea, natural science; and, Mike Montgomery, social studies. The three music students were: Betsy Bonnett and Andrea Weye, who focused on orchestra; and, Laura McDuffie, who received vocal training.

In the first issue of the new school year, the *Tam-O-Shanter* introduced the band with a feature article under the title, "Band Notes." Stan Ferguson, drum major, and the major corps were highlighted, along with a description of the band, which consisted of seventy-one members, eleven of whom were eighth graders.

The Headland Band Booster group met for the first time in the school year on October 5 in the school gym. A budget goal of \$2,163.50 was established, a major portion of which was earmarked for equipment and supplies. About \$1,000.00 was setastide in a reserve uniform fund. As part of the meeting, the marching band performed several selections for the entertainment of the parents.

Homecoming day kicked off with the traditional homecoming parade led by the band on the morning of Friday, October 30. Barbara Exum was selected as the 1964 Homecoming Queen, an honor announced with the band on the field during halftime of the game versus St. Pius X. Steve Waterman, President of the Student Council, crowned Barbara, while Ken Akins, President of the Senior Class, presented Barbara with red roses. Jo Ann Thomas, acting Captain of the Varsity Cheerleaders, served as crown bearer. The Anchor Club sponsored the post-game dance that featured the band, The Mystics, for dancing entertainment.

At the conclusion of football season, the band boosters held a banquet celebrating the hard work of the marching band. Mr. Smith mentioned season highlights that included: *The Highlanders at the Circus*; *The Civil War Show*; and, *The Musical Feature Show*. Outstanding achievement recognitions were awarded to: Ann Moseley, "Director's Award;" Pat Chase, Head Majorette, for "Special Service," Eddie Nolan, "Band Council Award," John Curl, "Most Improved," and Mark Tolbert, "Most Promising New Band Member."

The band performed two Christmas concerts: the first was held on December 14 as part of a music department collaboration for the PTA, and the second performed at the East Point Auditorium at 8:00 P. M. on December 17. The latter concert featured

selections such as *The First Noel* by Morton Gould, *Adeste Fideles*, and *Serenade of the Carols*. Other Christmas favorites included *Sleigh Ride*, *Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer*, *Carol of the Drum*, and *Overture to Messiah* by Handel.

The Headland Band received a Superior (I) rating at the GMEA 5th District Band Festival held at Dykes High School on Saturday, 13 March. In a March 22nd *Atlanta Times* article titled, "*Music honor won by band*," a reporter wrote, "In the history of Fulton County, the Headland High School Band is the first to receive this honor" (a Superior Rating for three selections of 'Class A' music). With the exception of having pants instead of kilts, the uniforms were authentically

Scottish. A description of the uniform appeared in a December 15 *Tam-O-Shanter* article:

"One of the most notable changes in the corps is the new uniform they (the officers) and the entire band have donned. The drum major's high "feather bonner" – an exact copy of those worn by Scotland's Blackwatch Regiment) and the majorettes' trim little kilt, ruffled blouse, and tam with the feather add to the looks of the group and also mean a lot to Headland's Highlander tradition."

A detailed description of the regular band uniform appeared in a *Tam-o-Shanter* article several years later:

"The plaid is Royal Stewart and is imported from Scotland. The brooch, which holds the plaid, or the long wrap over the shoulder in place, the sporran, which is the leather and horsehair pouch, the spats, hats, pants, and coat are all United States made, but the wool cloth comes from Scotland, The total cost of the band uniforms is \$230.00."

Prior to 1966, Friday homecoming activities at Headland began with an in-school (sixth period) homecoming parade led by the band and followed by floats representing numerous student organizations. Later that

night, halftime activities generally featured a short marching routine prior to the crowning ceremony; however, beginning in 1966, the homecoming halftime kicked off with a parade of floats. The Co-ed Hi-Y sponsored this procession that included about twenty floats, which circled the stadium track while the band provided musical entertainment. Judges for the event included: Mrs. Young, PTA president; Mrs. Kidd, an active civic worker; and, Mrs. Sommers, President of the HHS Booster Club. They chose the Latin Club float as the "most original" and the Civinette float as "best-looking." Cheryl Saunders was crowned as Homecoming Queen in the halftime ceremony. Homecoming enthusiasm, however, was dampened by Headland's 21-6 loss to Newnan. The post-game dance sponsored by the Anchor Club featured music by Bobby Pair and the Chapparalls.



The school year began with Ken Durham as the new Headland band director. A graduate of Florida State University, Mr. Durham came to Headland after a brief tenure as director of the Stone Mountain High School Band.

Mr. Durham was introduced to the Headland community as part of a *Tam-O-Shanter* article highlighting new faculty members. A follow-up *Tam-O-Shanter* article, "New Band Director plans change," provided a more detailed and personal look at his background and plans for the band. Mr. Durham cited improvements in the marching

style, a focus on more popular and contemporary music, and a desire for the band to become more active and visible in the community as program objectives.

The Headland Band Parents Organization held their first meeting on Thursday, September 26 and discussed operational plans for the year. While Mr. Durham had been on campus for over two months, this meeting was his first official 'meet & greet' with the members of the Band Parent Organization. At the meeting, Mr. Durham announced plans for the band to attend the Clemson (S. C.) Band Day and also spoke of the formation of a new all-female drill team. In October, the marching band did indeed feature this new auxiliary group called the Highlanderettes, a 18-girl drill team that utilized rifles. Drill Team members as reported in the *Tartan* Yearbook included: Debbie Shelton, Anna Holcombe, Kathy Perry, Trenia Richardson, Susan Blaisdell, Nancy Duncan, Ella Kent, Susan Stolz, Jane Coile, Linda Baker, Wanda Benefield, Marcia Chapman, Judy McConnell, Jenny Hasty, Charlotte Webster, Barbara Hackney, Cheryl Preston, and Jan Bennett.

The rivalry game with Russell High always drew a great deal of attention and the 1968 clash was no different. The Russell-Headland game held on Friday, September 27

was designated the Game-of-the-week by WSB-FM radio, which usually broadcasted the Atlanta metro area's top high school football games. Phil Schaefer, WSB-Radio sports Director, and color man Bob Ketchersid handled broadcast duties from the game played at Headland.

Undoubtedly, fight songs, fanfares, and other incidental songs and pep selections played by both bands were heard in the radio broadcast background.

It was about this time midway through the season that that Jody Brown, sports reporter for the *Atlanta Journal*, caused a bit of a controversy by writing in his coverage of the Headland vs. Hapeville game that, "the Hapeville 172-member band won, as usual, the halftime show." Obviously, this statement did not sit well with the Headland faithful, causing H. R. Whitmire, Vice President of the Headland Band Boosters to write to Jack Spalding, editor of the *Atlanta Journal*, that "Obviously, your sports writer was disappointed with the outcome of the game, and his comment about the band was entirely uncalled for and misleading. Furthermore, Mr. Whitmire asked for an apology. Two weeks later, Jody Brown wrote a letter of response indicating in part, "First, let me assure you there was no intent to derogatize the Headland Band, but since there has been an interpretation of discredit, I am by all means ready and willing to offer my apology.²⁴

Homecoming 1968 occurred on November 1 and began with a pre-game parade that included floats constructed by various students groups and organizations. The highlight of the marching band half-time show was the crowning of Martha Ann Turner as the 1968 Homecoming Queen, who was escorted by Danny Ohm. The football team enjoyed a 43-0 victory over Briarwood High and later The Spontaneous Generation Band provided music for the post-game dance.

The following day, the band and booster organization were busy at the school cafeteria with a large spaghetti supper fund-raiser, the proceeds of which were designated

to defray operating expenses. The dinner took place from 5:00 P. M. through 8:00 P. M. and featured a menu of spaghetti, French bread, salad, dessert, and a drink. Band members were on hand to help serve and assist at the event.

The GMEA 5th District Band Festival was held at Briarwood High School in February. Adjudicators for the event included Mr. Robert T. Braunagel of Florida State University, Dr. Bodie Hinton of Auburn University, Mr. James Pritchard of the University of South Carolina, and Lenard C. Bowie of Florida A & M. The Headland band was rated Superior (I) by the three concert judges and also by the sight-reading judge. One judge remarked, "Fantastic."

The Headland Band was designated to be the lead band in St. Augustine, Florida's Easter Festival Parade held during the weekend of April 4-7. News of the invitation was first reported in the February 5 issue of the *Atlanta Suburban Reporter*. Financing for the trip was made available in part through candy sales and a \$1,000.00 donation from the East Point V. F. W.

The band departed Headland on Friday morning, April 4, and arrived at the Monson Motel in St. Augustine later that night. The next day was available for

sightseeing and touring the nation's oldest city. Later that night the band was honored at a semi-formal banquet.

On Easter Sunday, the band dressed out in full Highlander uniforms and marched in the three-mile "Parade de Los Cabalos Conchos" through the main streets of St. Augustine. After the parade, the band performed an evening concert at the outdoor Bayfront Band Shell. Repertoire for the performance included a repeat of the GMEA 5th District Festival literature described above. The band returned to East Point on Monday, April 7.

Prior to leaving for St. Augustine, the band performed at an American Cancer Society Kick-off Breakfast. Paul D. West, Superintendent of Fulton County Schools, commended the Headland Band for both performances. In a letter to Mr. Durham, Mr. West wrote:

"The outstanding recognition that has come to the Headland High School Band in recent days and months makes us all appreciative of your excellent leadership and the spirit and ability of the members of the band. The officials of the American Cancer Society tell us that the program rendered at the recent Kick-Off Breakfast was one of the best high school musical presentations ever. We also take deep pride in the high quality of the program presented at St. Augustine, Florida, during the past weekend.

Please convey to those who have participated in these outstanding programs the genuine appreciation of the members of the Board of Education and our administrative staff."²⁵

The music department sponsored the musical *Brigadoon*, a student body production held Friday and Saturday, April 25-26, in the Headland gym. Writing in the *Atlanta Suburban Reporter*, Gregory Pilewicz offered this observation: "At the conclusion of the performances, it became extremely apparent the play had been accepted

with great enthusiasm by the 1,000 spectators who witnessed *Brigadoon*....To this reporter, the production of *Brigadoon* was the best play performed by any Headland group since the production of *The King and I* a few years ago."²⁶

End-of-year senior activities included a senior play entitled, *Hip Hippy Hooray*, presented on Friday and Saturday, April 11-12 in the Headland gym. Headland's STAR Student was William Bagley, who also went on to be designated as the overall Fulton County STAR student. William named Harlan Harris, an algebra teacher at Headland, as school and Fulton County School System Area STAR Teacher.

Baccalaureate services were held May 18 in Headland Stadium. Rev. Myron Taylor, minister of East Point Christian Church, delivered the message. Graduation was held later in the week at the Atlanta Municipal Auditorium.

June 6, 1969 was designated East Point Night. By special request from Mayor Bob Brown, Headland provided music for the nearly 1,500 people in attendance. In a follow-up letter to Mr. Durham, Mayor Brown wrote:

"Many thanks for your cooperation in providing the band music for East Point Night at the stadium recently.

We were so proud of such a fine looking band, and the fine music they presented before the game. We feel sure that there were at least 1,500 citizens of East Point there, and are hopeful on making this an annual affair.

Please accept our thanks for your part in making this a very successful undertaking."²⁷

With this performance, the 1968-1969 school year came to a close.

In its twelve-year history, the Headland band had a number of memorable performances and significant appearances; however, nothing before would approach the magnitude and national exposure as the 1970 Orange Bowl trip to Miami. After a lengthy application process, the official invitation arrived by letter to Mr. Durham on June 9, 1969 from the Orange Bowl Committee. An approval process was required from the Fulton County School Board, but word of the proposed trip leaked out in late summer. In a page one article shortly after the new school year began, the *Tam-O-Shanter* was the first to publically break the details and exciting news with the article, "Band to march in Orange Bowl Parade Jan. 1."



The proposed trip to Miami would be the single largest expenditure in the history of the band program, so proceeds from a variety of sales were

needed to help 105 students. The total number included 76 musicians, 20 drill team members, four majorettes, a four-man color guard, and a drum major. Past Band Booster budgets were important for special projects and for the annual general operation of the band, but the Orange Bowl trip would require additional fund-raisers. Several such projects included:

- 1) Doughnut sales on August 9;
- 2) a Tupperware Party at the HHS Band Room on Saturday, October 25 at 7:30
- P. M.; and,
- 3) an old cemetery cleanup.

A cemetery cleanup is a very unusual fund-raising project, but the idea came from a Citizens and Southern Banks (C & S) initiative aimed at community beautification. C & S offered the band \$500.00 at the completion of 250 hours of community service. An old cemetery at the dead-end of Manor Terrace, about two blocks from the school, was chosen as the target area. On Saturday, October 25, the band students, in cooperation with sanitation trucks from East Point, cleared the cemetery of weeds and other overgrown material.

Headland's majorette's - Robyn Johnson, Marla Reynolds, Kippi Struck, Teresa Texeira - were featured in a newspaper article and photo titled, "Majorettes anticipate festival, clinic as marching season comes to an end." The article presented an up close and personal look at their summer/fall activities and detailed their special work and dedication required as Headland majorettes.

With the wide recognition of Ecology and Earth Day still years away, the Headland band presented a "Pollution-themed" half-time show, a unique performance

during the Russell game that was ahead of it's time. *The Atlanta Suburban Reporter* wrote a review of the half-time show under the title of, "Ecology Is Half Theme." With support from East Point Mayor Bob Brown, who proclaimed the day, "Let the Sun Shine In Day" in East Point, the Headland Band performed *On a Clear Day, Let the Sun Shine In, Everything is Beautiful*, and *Games People Play*. The music played to a backdrop of props such as a rising Pollution Index, smoking chimneys, a 16-foot rowboat, and heavy exhaust from a car. During the halftime show, Frank Garner of Channel 5 TV News made an appearance using a clouded weatherboard.

Homecoming Week began with classes and clubs decorating halls and other school areas. Friday began with an afternoon parade that included a float competition. Winning floats were displayed during the evening pre-game. Claudette Tuggle was crowned as Homecoming Queen; a dance followed after the game.

Carol Hunt, a 1968 Headland graduate, was crowned Miss Atlanta in a pageant finale held at Symphony Hall in downtown Atlanta on Saturday, August 23. The University of Georgia freshman was the choice of the judges with the following talent: singing impressions of Barbara Streisand and Carol Burnett; dancing impression of Cyd Charisse, and her original act singing *My Man*.

The Headland band provided musical entertainment for Georgia School Boards

Association members attending the Governor's Conference on Education held at the

Sheraton-Biltmore in early October. Jack Acree, Executive Secretary of the GSBA, wrote
a follow-up letter of congratulations to Mr. Durham, stating, "Your performance was not
only most enjoyable, it was an inspiration to local school officials from all over the state.

I heard many of them say that they only wished their local people could have seen and heard you and your group."

The Headland band received an invitation from John N. Demos, Director of Atlanta Falcon Half-time Activities, to perform at Atlanta Stadium as part of the halftime show for the Atlanta Falcons vs. Dallas Cowboys game on Sunday, October 12. Headland was one of several bands that comprised the mass band portion of the halftime. Other marching season appearances later in the fall involved a performance at the East Point Shriner's Parade.

A busy December began with the annual University of Georgia Band Festival held on the first Saturday in December. The guest clinician was Colonel Arnald Gabriel, Commander and Conductor of the United States Air Force Band.

The annual Christmas Concert was held in the school gymnasium on December 15 and featured the entire music department. In addition to several vocal groups, instrumental groups and their repertoire included:


The Orange Bowl invitation was significant news in East Point, so much so that Mayor R. E. Brown ordered that the week of December 14-20 be proclaimed "Headland Highland Band Week."

An office signing ceremony was memorialized in a *Southside Sun* photo showing Band Director Ken Durham, Janice Prichard, Susan Stolz, and Barry Erwin, and Headland High Principal Tom Richardson²⁸



Georgia Governor Lester Maddox heralded the Headland Highlander band in a proclamation designating the band as Georgia's Official State Band for the Orange Bowl.

On Monday morning, December 29, three buses departed for a schedule six-day trip. The entourage included: Ken Durham, band director, 23 chaperones, East Point Policeman Lieutenant Earl Godfrey, registered nurse Mrs. D. B. Texeira, three bus drivers, and 105 band members, majorettes, and Highlanderettes.

After a day of driving, the band spent the night at the Quality Courts Motel in Ocala. The next day, Tuesday, December 30, the band spent time in Silver Springs, Florida to see underwater life while riding glass bottom boats. The group also spent time on a jungle cruise where they saw monkeys, alligators, exotic birds, and a reptile show. Later that evening, the band checked into the motel that would be their home for the next three days.

On Wednesday, December 31, the day of the big event, the band had breakfast and spent the rest of the morning practicing for the parade. Later in the afternoon, they lined up and marched down three miles of Biscayne Avenue as part of the official parade. The King Orange Bowl Parade was the highlight of the Miami trip and a fitting ending to the entire 1969 marching season. With the Apollo 11 moon landing in the summer fresh in the minds of Americans, her majesty, Orange Bowl Queen Katrina Hampel, rode in a space capsule on a float representing the moon. Many of the floats and units utilized space themed decorations, American eagles, giant flags, and space flight montages. Supporting the "Wizard of Oz" float behind them, the Headland band performed *Somewhere Over the Rainbow*.

The parade was televised nationally on NBC TV and narrated by singer Anita Bryant and actor Lorne Greene. Headland marched in the parade along with about 25 high school bands and the 225-member University of Missouri Marching Mizzou Band. The greater Miami area saw the entire Headland band pass by the viewing stand, because the local TV station did not have commercial interruptions; however, the national network went to a commercial break midway through Headland's appearance. After the parade, the band celebrated and brought in the New Year at the hotel with East Point's own rock band, 'The Synthetic Sunshine,' enjoying a dance and refreshments.

Events for the next morning, Thursday, January 1, included, sightseeing, a beach party at Crandon Park, a visit to Miami's Seaquarium, and a picnic. Later that night, the band attended the Orange Bowl football game, where Penn State won over the University of Missouri. On Friday, January 2, the band traveled north to Cape Kennedy and saw the spacecraft designated for the March 12, 1970 moon mission. They stayed that night an

Ormond Beach motel that featured a beach view and heated pool. Saturday, January 3, the sixth day of the trip, was the scheduled travel day back to East Point. The group returned at 5:45 P. M., just 45 minutes late of their anticipated arrival.

The trip was the culmination of about six months of planning and fund-raising. A reporter for the *Atlanta Suburban Reporter* estimated that the Band Booster Organization sold almost 6,000 dozen doughnuts to help defray the travel costs. Other Orange Bowl related fundraisers included: a September 12 Spaghetti Dinner, Christmas Wrapping Paper, Rex All-Purpose Cleaner, Stadium Cushions, World's Finest Chocolate Candy, *Atlanta Suburban Reporter* Subscriptions, a Saturday, October 25 Tupperware Sale, a paper sale on December 16, and Greenbriar Mall Saturday Bake Sales on October 18, November 22, and December 6.

In an unusual fund-raising venture mentioned above, Headland band members contributed 250 man-hours of volunteer community service work on several consecutive Saturdays for a \$500.00 Orange Bowl donation challenge by C & S Bank. At the suggestion of Mayor R. E. Brown, band members cleaned up an old overgrown and dilapidated Connally cemetery that originally was part of the Shady Lawn Methodist Church. The sum total of fund-raisers during football season went toward the \$15,000.00 needed for the band trip.

The East Point Kiwanis Club January Student of the Month was band member Teresa Texeira. She was selected in part for her band and majorette activities, along with being a nominee for the Governor's Honors program in music, and membership in the Spanish National Honor Society, F. T. A., and the American Field Service.

GMEA announced winners of the All-State music groups. Headland students who earned this prestigious 1969-1970 All-State honor were: Margaret Parrish, oboe; Walter Huff, bassoon; Barry Erwin, clarinet; Keith Vickers, clarinet; Johnny Crisman, french horn; Joe Flanders, trombone; Candy Bucy, baritone; Kathy Pickard, viola; Curtis Murdock, string bass; Greg Moore, percussion; Oliver Ramsey, percussion; and Tony Burton, violin. The All-State performance was held as part of the Georgia Education Association Convention held at the Atlanta Civic Center on March 13.

In February, Russell High hosted the GMEA 5th District Band and Orchestra event that involved over 350 Fulton county students. The *Southside Sun* advertised this significant event:

"350 all-star selected high school musicians from the fifth district will gather at Russell High School next Saturday for the annual Instrumental Clinic.....two bands and one orchestra to rehearse all-day Saturday. Dr. Andrew Galos will conduct the orchestra; Boyd McKeown conducts the Blue Band; Guerry Youmans conducts the Red Band....."

In March, the Headland band earned a straight Superior Rating (1) at band festival held at Therrell High School. Adjudicators for the event included: Manley Whitcomb,

The band performed at a memorial for Confederate Veterans held at the Connally Family Cemetery in East Point on Sunday, April 14. The annual Spring Concert was held on Thursday, May 14 in the school gymnasium. Mr. Joseph Kirschner, Instrumental Coordinator for Fulton County Schools, served as guest conductor.

Mr. Crisman organized the Headland Area Elementary Band in 1958. The band was comprised of select 5th, 6th, and 7th graders from area elementary feeder schools. By 1970 these schools included Oak Knoll, Dodson Drive, Conley Hills, Jere Wells, and Sandtown. For an organization comprised of elementary students, the band was quite active during their existence, having performed a the Lenox Square and Greenbriar Arts Festivals; 1969 G. E. A. principals' meeting; WSB "Today in Georgia;" and WETV

"Here and Now." In April, the band added to their laurels with a performance at the state capitol with Governor Lester Maddox in attendance. The success of the Headland bands over the years was due in large part to the high quality of the feeder program led by members of the area elementary band.

The Headland band celebrated a busy and successful year with an Awards
Banquet held at the Fort McPherson NCO Club on Wednesday, April 29. Twenty-six
band members received School Letters for two years service. Specific awards were

Candice Bucy was invited to perform and study at the University of Kentucky's Summer Wind Ensemble. The 12-day camp annually hosted select talented high school music students in an environment resembling college classes.



Each day was filled with classes in music appreciation, theory, history, and private lessons on their respective instruments. They also performed in the concert band. While the FSU Camps were going on, Mr. Durham organized and taught an area jazz band for the 1970 Summer Music Program held at Headland.

In a short August 12 *Atlanta Suburban Reporter* article, "Band Practice at Headland Begins," Mr. Durham announced the beginning of band practice for Monday, August 24. Practice was scheduled to last about two hours starting at 7:00 P. M. The

article quoted him as saying, "Our goal this year is to produce an entirely different marching appearance with the same famous Headland Highlander sound."



Prior to the beginning of marching season, the band received favorable citywide recognition in the Saturday, August 29 *Atlanta Constitution* article titled, "And the Bands March On." The article described how Headland band students, like many around the city, give up summer vacation time to prepare for marching season. Mr. Durham was quoted about this additional time factor and went on to explain, "The main thing we strive for is precision."³⁰

Prior to the beginning of the school year, news arrived of the band's selection to perform for the Southern division of MENC, the national music teacher's organization, in Daytona Beach, Florida in 1971. Having had two major trips the prior two years – St. Augustine in 1969 and Miami in January1970 – the Headland Band Parents' Club would be called upon again to financially support another significant trip. The leadership of the 1970-71 booster organization was comprised of the following members:

In early September, band members Ray Terhune, bass drum, and Angela Hartman, clarinet, were featured in a photo publicizing the band. The short article mentioned the band's performance at the Orange Bowl parade the previous school year.

In another early season newspaper article, Jim Overstreet, Sports Editor, wrote a very favorable review of the marching band with a special focus and emphasis on the new 16-member rifle drill team squad, organized in the middle of the 1969 marching season. In reference to Headland's "Salute to Patriotism" show performed at the Lakeshore game, he wrote enthusiastically, stating the band, along with the rifle corps and majorettes, "brought the crowd to its feet with stirring renditions of *When Johnny Comes Marching Home Again, Stars and Stripes Forever, It's a Grand Old Flag*, and *America the Beautiful*. Overstreet made a special mention of the rifles and majorettes, exclaiming, the "Highlander Drill Teamis one of the highlights of the Headland Halftime Show."

In 1970, the adjudicated Marching Band Festival experience was a relatively new and novel concept. By contrast, Concert Band Festival for high school bands was a historic event going back decades to the early 1920s. The adjudication and rating of marching band shows, however, did not become widespread until the late 1960s, so the

Highlander Band was on the cutting edge and extremely forward-looking with their participation in this new music phenomena.

After the Russell football game held at Headland, the Headland Band hosted a post-game reception for the Russell Band in the band room. In a letter of thanks from Cindy Leach, secretary of the Russell Band, she wrote: "Again thank you for the party. It was a kind display of friendship, something that we hope will always be a strong tie between our bands."

After a week of hall decorations and theme days filled with spirit from classes and clubs, Friday, November 6 began a long day of homecoming celebrations. The band led an afternoon parade, and the evening ceremonies concluded with the halftime crowning of Queen Jan Jenkins. Headland won the game 28-12 over Rockdale County. The band, "Talk of the Town," provided music entertainment for the post-game dance.

During the 1970-71 school year, the Atlanta Symphony offered an outreach program called the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Member School Chamber Music Series. This program intended to put small groups of musicians into schools for a series of 45-minute performances and question/answer questions held in the rehearsal rooms of select high schools. The first such performance at Headland was held by the ASO Brass Group at 2:30 P. M. on October 30.

On November 30th, the marching band performed the halftime show in Atlanta Stadium for the Dolphins-Falcons game. This Atlanta Stadium performance was the second in two years, the band having performed at Atlanta Stadium the year before in a game versus the Dallas Cowboys.

Ludwig Van Beethoven (1770-1827) is probably the most important and well-known composer in music history. His *Fifth* and *Ninth Symphonies* are probably the most popular musical compositions of all-time. He was a man ahead of his time who demanded that music be taken seriously. By his death in 1827, Beethoven had transformed the role of composer from servant to artist as HERO. Beethoven, a musical revolutionary living in a revolutionary time, was undoubtedly one of the great disruptive forces in the history of music.

The Bicentennial of Beethoven's birth in 1970 was cause for musical celebrations across the world. Fulton County Schools marked the occasion with an All-County Beethoven Extravaganza performed in Atlanta's Symphony Hall. This Beethoven Bicentennial Concert involved all-star students from every school in the district performing in the following order: Wind Ensemble, Elementary School Chorus, Trombone Quartet, Woodwind Octet, Combined Groups and Audience (singing *Joyful*, *Joyful*, *We Adore Thee* from *Symphony No. 9*, *Opus 125*), High School Chorus with Soloists and Orchestra, High School Orchestra, and High School Chorus and Orchestra.

Instrumentalists representing Headland High included: Teresa Texiera, piccolo; Sherry Bucy, oboe; Billy Grindle, clarinet; Candy Bucy, baritone; Cynthia Pritchard, french horn; Hyram Childs, french horn; Randy Andre, trombone; Debbie Walker, oboe; Walter Huff, bassoon; John Crisman, french horn; Tony Burton, violin; Cathy Pickard, viola; and Bill Pickard, bass. Headland High vocalists included: Debbie Boland, Nadine Ellington, Elaine Haynie, Joyce Sizemore, and Carolyn Walz, Sopranos; Lynn Baxter, Beth Candler, Kathie DeVane, Alice Duffey, and Susan Ricker, Altos; Joel Adamson,

Robert Baugher, Terry Phillips, Ricky Reeves, and Ledman Wright, Tenors; and, Thomas Warne, Bass.

To open the program, Mr. Durham conducted the wind ensemble in three Beethoven selections: *Military March No. 1 in F, Polonaise in D*, and *Military March No. 2 in F*. Dan Smith, former Headland High band director, conducted the *Allegro* movement from *Symphony No. 8* for the Orchestra portion of the program.

Writing in the *Atlanta Constitution* the following day, William Weaver, the paper's music critic, reported, "Fulton students...perform admirably. Youngsters from all over the school system participated and came up with an enjoyable program of great variety and interest. The entire program received a well deserved audience response." Concerning Mr. Durham's contribution to the program, Weaver wrote, "Kenneth Durham directed a wind ensemble in arrangements of two marches and a polonaise that got the evening off to a spirited start." Regarding Dan Smith's piece, Weaver wrote, "Dan Smith conducted from memory the *Allegro Vivace* from *Symphony No. 8* and the orchestra played with vitality, good rhythm, and the best ensemble heard." ³¹

Before the end of the calendar year, 12 band members and majorettes participated in the University of Georgia Music Festival. The band and chorus performed the annual Christmas Concert at 8:00 P. M. on Monday, December 14. The overall concert theme was *Peace to All*.

The Georgia Music Educators Association announced that several Headland students earned membership in All-State. Selected for the All-State Band were: Johnny Crisman, horn; Candy Bucy, baritone; and, Teresa Texeira, flute. Those selected for

orchestra were: Tony Burton, violin; Cathy Pickard, viola; and Sherri Bucy, oboe.

For many bands, concert band festival preparations necessarily involved extra rehearsals, both before and after school and sometimes on Saturday mornings. For the Headland band, many weeks of hard work paid off, for the band earned a Superior (I) rating in GMEA 5th District Festival held at Ridgeview High School. Mr. Dan Smith, former Headland H.S. band director organized the festival. Adjudicators for the event were: Dr. Andrew Galos, of Columbus College (GA), Frank Greer, from East Tennessee University, and D. A. Ellis, Band Director at Furman University. Billy Grindle, the band's student conductor, directed the band in *Sonata for Winds* by Charles Carter.

Spring activities and recognitions were numerous. Headland band students participated in the GMEA 5th District Honor Band, six earned membership in the Georgia All-State Band/Orchestra, and numerous students earned superior ratings at the GMEA Solo/Ensemble Festival at Dykes High School.

The second Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Member School Chamber Music Series was held at Headland at 9:00 A. M. on March 19. This 45-minute program featured a small group of ASO woodwind performers. The third installment of the program occurred on April 16 and featured the percussion section.

The Headland band was one of only three high school bands invited to perform at the Southeastern Division Convention of the National Music Conference (SMENC) held in Daytona Beach, Florida. Highlighting the significance and honor of the selection, East Point Mayor Bob Brown proclaimed the week of April 24-30 as "Headland Band Week." A photo of the proclamation ceremony held in the mayor's office featured the following: Principal Tom Richardson, Daree Tucker, Mark McDonald, Larry Buran, Billy Grindle, Hiram Childs, Teresa Texeira, Angela Hartman, Randy Andre, and Mr. Durham.³²

The tour began with an 8:00 A. M. East Point departure on Thursday, April 29. At 2:30 P. M. the band performed a concert for an assembly at Forest High School in Jacksonville, Florida. Families of the Forest High School Band hosted the Headland Band members in their homes that night and returned them in time for an 8:00 A. M. departure. The band checked into the Quality Motel North Beach in Ormond Beach at 10:30 A. M. By 4:30 P. M. the band was ready for their concert performance for the SMENC Convention at the Plaza Hotel in Daytona Beach.

The band returned to the convention site and heard the Brass Tower Music performance by Headland's Brass Choir. The students concluded the morning and afternoon by touring the convention exhibits and attending concerts by other performing groups. The day finished with a 6:00 P. M. cookout supper on the beach. Travel day home began with a 9:30 A.M. departure from Ormond Beach and finished with a 4:00 P.M arrival at Headland High.

Harold Bachman served as guest conductor for the event. Numerous Headland students were able to acquaint themselves with Col. Bachman during his stay. It was, therefore, quite a shock to the some Headland band students to hear of news of Col. Bachman's sudden death on stage after conducting the last Junior High All-State selection in Macon later that spring.



I feel this year's program was far more successful than last summer, and this is largely due to your instruction....Let me wish for you a great year with your band at Headland. I'll be up to hear you once during the season. Thanks again for a job well-done, and I hope we can call on you again in the future." 34

1972 was a presidential election year. President Richard Nixon sought re-election and made a campaign trip to Atlanta on Thursday, October 12, his only major visit to the South that year. The Georgia State GOP arranged a 12:00 noon motorcade caravan from the Airport, up Peachtree Street from Five Points, to the Hyatt Regency Atlanta hotel. Organizers arranged for the Headland Band and many from Atlanta, Fulton County, DeKalb, Clayton, and Cobb County schools to be positioned at many points along the motorcade route. An *Atlanta Constitution* article the day after estimated the crowd at around 500,000.

Homecoming week 1972 concluded with a busy Friday. The band led an after-school parade down Headland Drive. Pre-game festivities included an announcement of sponsors and representatives. After a short halftime show presentation that featured majorette fire batons, class representatives and the homecoming court were introduced. Pam Fisher was crowned Homecoming Queen; a dance was held after the game.

The Headland Area Elementary Band performed its first concert of the year on Tuesday evening, November 14, at Brookview Elementary School. A week later the Honor Band performed a concert at the Atlanta Veterans Administration Hospital on Clairmont Road. The performance was the third consecutive VA concert in as many years. As a reflection of the success and quality of the group, The Headland Area Elementary Band, directed by Mr. Crisman, earned superior ratings at 11 of the past 13 GMEA 5th District band festivals.

In a November 20 *Tam-O-Shanter* article, "Marching band rests...SMENC promises trip," the reporter commented on the marching band's just completed successful season that involved ten halftime shows. The reporter also described the band's outstanding performance at the Douglas County Marching Festival where the color guard earned an Excellent (II) rating and where Superiors (I) were awarded to the majorettes, drill team, Drum Major, and marching band. Mention was made also of the band's top score in class for the inspection category.

Several Headland High band students had the outstanding experience of performing with Atlanta Symphony Orchestra members under the baton of famed conductor Robert Shaw. On December 8, the following students performed at Symphony Hall for the annual Young People's Concert: Peter Huff, percussion; Winston Wright, timpani; Eric Whelchel, tuba; Mark McKinney, trumpet; and Trina Modling, flute.

Several band members were featured in the Headland High Talent show sponsored by the student council and held on Friday, February 16. Appearing under the name of "The Combined Poduck Volunteer Police and Fire Department" were Bennett Moncrief, trumpet, Tommy Grindle, trombone, Doug Lee, bass drum and clarinet, Keith

Vickers, saxophone, and Neal Bagley, string bass. Their repertoire consisted of *Bringing* in the Sheaves, Shortening Bread, and Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight, and Dixie.

The Headland Symphonic Band received an invitation to perform at the GMEA Convention held in Macon, Georgia in January. This achievement was significant, because the selection was made through a "blind" audition process. In other words, the convention performance adjudication panel listened to and ranked band recording submissions without knowing the identification of the conductor, nor group. The GMEA invitation was both a high honor and a musical challenge for Headland, in that the performance was held for an audience comprised almost entirely by music educators. In other words, this GMEA Convention audience was a very knowledgeable and critical group.

You represented the Fulton County Schools with distinction and I am proud to be associated with you and your outstanding musicians."³⁵

"May I thank you for the attractive and interesting program you sent me in connection with the concert at the State Convention of the Georgia Music Educators Association, January 18-20, 1973.

Both the Headland Elementary Honor Band and the Headland High School Highlander Symphonic Band are doing a superb work, and we are grateful to the members of these organizations and also to the two of you for your leadership."³⁶

John W. Grindle, Superintendent for Fulton County Schools, wrote:

"Thanks for the program of your concert at the State Convention of the Georgia Music Educators Association held in Macon on January 20, 1973.

I am sorry I was unable to attend the concert but I had a previous engagement. I have heard several favorable comments on what a superb performance the band gave.

It is people like you who are so dedicated and conscientious in your work that makes the Fulton County Music Program the fine program it is.

Our sincere appreciation for all the time and efforts."³⁷

J. Kimball Harriman, President of GMEA, also offered his thoughts:

"Dear Band Members.

We thank you for your generous participation in our recent GMEA state meeting in Macon. We have heard nothing but praise for your part in the many activities that were carried on, so we commend you all. Your outstanding contribution was both meaningful and essential to the ultimate success of the entire convention.

The metro Atlanta music education community was shocked and deeply saddened to read the news that Ridgeview High School Band Director, Mr. Dan J. Smith, had been killed by gunshot. In a February 5 *Atlanta Constitution* article, reporters Barry Henderson and Beau Cutts revealed the unbelievable news and unresolved issues surrounding his death.³⁹ This news hit the Headland band family particularly hard, since Mr. Smith was a prior Headland High band director for eight years, from 1960 through 1968. During this time at Headland, he took a relatively small group of students and in a short amount of time created large and successful groups that consistently earned superior ratings at GMEA festivals each year, performing selections in the most difficult level of Class 6 music. In 1964 Mr. Smith and the Headland Band were the first in Fulton County to ever earn this recognition.

The Headland band contributed music at Mr. Smith's funeral. In a February 28 letter to Mr. Durham from Mr. Don Robinson, Supervisor of Music for Fulton County Schools, he wrote: "Please accept my deepest appreciation for your beautiful music at the funeral for Dan Smith. This was a difficult task and you made it a moving and expressive gesture of love and personal appreciation."

The 1973 GMEA 5th District Band Festival was held at Crestwood High School.

The band received a Superior (I) rating in both concert and sight-reading performance. In addition, Winston Wright, student conductor, earned a Superior (I) rating. Adjudicators

Prior to the beginning of the school year, Mr. Durham and Mr. Crisman attended a two-day GMEA music symposium, a first of its kind event that drew over 100 Georgia music educators to Northside High School in Atlanta. Among a number of issues, the symposium examined adjudication criteria for the GMEA-sponsored festivals. Presenters included Dr. Manley Whitcomb, Florida State University; Mr. Don Neuen, Georgia State University; and Mr. Coulter, Wesleyan College.

As a member of the GMEA Instrumental Council, Mr. Durham also attended a GMEA Division meeting in early September to consider a number of band issues including additions to the GMEA festival required music list. Others representing Fulton County were Jim Sims, band director at M. D. Collins, and Richard Evarts, orchestra director at College Park High School.

The Headland Band was one of twenty-five bands to participate in the Douglas County Centennial Marching Festival held in Douglasville, Georgia on Saturday, October 20. The band, drum major, color guard, drill team, and majorettes all earned Superior (1) ratings. Headland scored highest among bands across all classifications in the 'inspection caption.'

Homecoming 1973 week culminated with celebrations on Friday that began with a parade down Headland Drive led by the band. Pre-game activities included a presentation of senior sponsors. After a brief band show at halftime, 11 members of the homecoming court were presented before Susan Kinett was crowned queen.

East Point's Veteran's Day Parade was held on November 10. The event was organized and sponsored by the East Point American Legion Post No. 51.

Mr. Durham was a guest conductor for the sixth annual Atlanta Peach Bowl football classic was held on December 28. An early official announcement of Headland's selection occurred in the July 25 issue of the *Atlanta Constitution*, where a photo of Mr. Durham, East Point Police Chief Earl Godfrey, select band officers, and Governor Jimmy Carter accompanied the article. This Headland group was at the Governor's Office to receive an official State of Georgia proclamation assigning the Headland Band as ambassadors of good will to the Miami Orange Bowl. East Point Mayor Bruce Bannister also issued a proclamation. The students were provided several fund raising opportunities to help fund the trip. One such project included a citrus fruit sale. Another involved a Colgate-Palmolive product label cash back program.

The September 23 issue of the *Tam-O-Shanter* included a majorette and drill team article entitled, "Work pays off for majorettes, drill team." The article detailed the practice schedule and accomplishments for both groups. The majorettes won first place at the Halftime Showcase Camp at Georgia Tech during the summer. The Drill Team won fifth place in the A division in Drill Team competition at the same Georgia Tech Camp.

During the Durham years, his voice was heard every halftime show with announcements that started like this 1974 show:

"For your halftime enjoyment we proudly present the nationally famous Headland Highlander Marching Band under the field direction of Drum Major Bill Andre, Majorette Captain Cindy Pickard. Drill Team Captain is Cathy Crews, Flag Corps Captain is Tricia McDonough, and Color Guard Captain is Donna Little. Captain is Mike Bell, the Senior First Lieutenant is Mike Petty, the Secretary is Janet Robertson, and the Treasurer is Georgia White."

The marching band festival/competition movement began in late 1960s and early 1970s. By 1974 marching band festivals were important events for most high school band programs. Since no equivalent of a standardized GMEA concert band festival format existed for marching bands, select high school band programs, such as the Douglas County Band, organized separate Georgia High School Association-approved festivals as major fund-raisers and band showcases. Many directors utilized marching band festival ratings as a barometer of the success of their programs and as a motivational tool for students.

Larger school systems around the state that contained multiple high schools initiated their respective county band marching exhibitions, both as a positive public relations effort, but more importantly as a "practice run-through," complete with adjudicator comments, for the purpose of improving performances for the up-coming marching festivals/contests. In mid-October, the Headland High Marching Band performed in exhibition performance at Fulton County's First Annual Marching Band Festival.

Later in the season, the majorettes were featured in a *Tam-O-Shanter* article, "Practice makes perfect for majorettes." The article and photo described the amount of work that the majorettes put in before and after school during marching season.

One of the more unusual band halftime shows involved a "Salute to Disney, where numerous props and students in Disney cartoon character costumes were utilized. The highlight of homecoming activities included the crowning of Claire Upshaw by Bobby Selfridge, Senior Class president. Danny Harbour served as Claire's escort. Joni Milam, varsity cheer Co-captain, presented the crown; Barbara Robertson, student

council president, presented roses. The court was comprised of two representatives from the bottom four classes and three from the senior class.

In 1974, the Atlanta Symphony Youth Orchestra (ASYO) was created as a subsidiary of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. Over the years, the ASYO featured some of the finest young instrumentalists in the Atlanta area. Every September, about 650 middle and high school instrumentalists compete in auditions for places in the ASYO. Only about 120 will be selected to participate in the season.

Players from the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra perform coaching sessions on many Saturday or Sunday rehearsals, a program that has been in effect since the Youth Orchestra was founded. More than 50 ASO players have served as ASYO coaches.

Headland percussionist, Peter Huff, had the significant distinction of earning charter membership to the then-new ASYO. Peter also won a 1975 College Park Music Club Scholarship to attend the Brevard (N. C.) Music Center.

The chorus and band performed two special assemblies for the Headland High student body. The first assembly featured selections such as *Autumn Leaves*, *Battle Hymn of the Republic* and *The Entertainer*. The second assembly, a Christmas program, involved a collaborative effort with the Drama Club and Chorus in a skit entitled, *Twas the Night Before Christmas*. The band performed traditional favorites including *Sleigh Ride*.

In January, the Georgia Music Educators announced the finalist for the 1975 Georgia All-State Band. Headland students earning this significant honor in the senior high division were: Eric Whelchel, tuba; Peter Huff, percussion; and Rickie Weye and Janet Robertson, clarinet. Leslie Chambers, saxophone, Mitchell Dodd, Tim Hinton,

french horn, and Julie Stempinski, flute, earned membership in the Junior High All-State Band.

On Thursday, February 20, just two days before the GMEA 5th District Band Festival at Douglas High School, the Headland band performed a preview for the Headland student body. Performing as the last band of the district festival, the Headland band received a Superior (1) rating.

M. departure on Thursday, April 17 and a 5:00 P. M. arrival at the Holiday Inn in Cordele. Later that night the band performed a concert at Crisp County High School.

Friday morning began with a morning breakfast and departure for Tallahassee.

The band arrived at Florida State University and performed a concert at 2:30 P. M., after

which the band was treated to a campus tour. Later in the afternoon, the band departed Tallahassee and ate dinner en route to Panama City, Florida. The day ended with a checkin at the Panama City Holiday Inn. Saturday was spent relaxing at the beach and with a pool party later that evening. Sunday was a travel day and return to East Point.

Administrators from the Fulton County Schools Music Department arranged for a number of school music groups to perform at Symphony Hall, home of the Atlanta Symphony. Tuesday, May 6 was Headland Night. The Headland Elementary Honor Band performed at 6:00 P. M.; Headland Highlander Symphonic Band took the stage at 8:00 P. M. Other participating groups included: Crestwood High School Band and Chorus; Hapeville High Band; Westwood Area Bands; James L. Riley Elementary Chorus; Riverwood High School Band; Roswell High School; Sandy Springs Elementary Honor Band; Sandy Springs Training Orchestra; and Sandy Springs Honor Orchestra.



"Homecoming day began with the morning pep rally, which promoted spirit for the game. The parade followed in the afternoon.

During the week many clubs built floats of all shapes, sizes, and designs. The Key Club constructed the winning float, "Roll Over the Vikings." Anchor Club followed in second place with "All the Vikings Hear is Defeat."

The parade started with the introduction of the senior football players and their sponsors. The Highlander Marching Band, playing our fight song, led the parade. The homecoming representatives followed, riding in cars ranging from a 1932 Model A to a 1975 Bradley GT. The floats concluded the parade.

All this led into the game against Westwood. The senior sponsors were introduced during the pre-game activities. The band started of the special halftime show by playing several selections from *The Sound of Music*. Student Council built the scenic props, making a beautiful background. One part of the evening was set aside to honor our Foreign Exchange Student, Isabelle Clause, who was escorted by Mr. Bill Billingsley. Mr. Durham then announced the class representatives, ending with the senior girls and their escorts. The climax of the evening followed soon after with the announcement of the 1975 Homecoming Queen, Perry Anne Moore.

In mid-October, the Headland band participated in the 2nd Annual Fulton County Marching Exhibition held Campbell-Fairburn Stadium. Officers listed in the program were Peter Huff, Drum Major; Cindy Pickard, Majorette Captain; and, Julie Hinton, Drill Team Captain. Comments from several judges assisted the band in earning their second Superior (1) rating in as many years at the Douglasville (GA) Centennial Marching Band Festival.

In a December 15th *Tam-O-Shanter* news article, "Students get symphonic touch," three Headland students, Joe Bader, Peter Huff, and Mary Turcotte, were profiled for earning membership in the Atlanta Symphony Youth Orchestra. Considering the amount of competition for a limited number of positions, this achievement was particularly important and reflected well on the Headland music department. Peter was quoted as

saying, "I find being in this youth orchestra is a very rewarding experience since it is run on a professional basis by professionals in the fields."

GMEA 5th District Festival for Class A, B and C Bands was held at Fredrick Douglass High School on March 12 through 13 with Vanable H. Moody, Band Director at Douglass, as Festival Chairman. Adjudicators included Dr. Donald Lowe of the University of Georgia, Mr. Thomas Lyle of Alabama State University, Mr. Ed Barr of Valdosta State College, and Mr. Archie Sharretts of Stephens County High School.

Laughter, who previously went to school and worked in Florida. He replaced Mr. Durham, who left after eight years at Headland for an assistant band position at Georgia Tech.

Mr. Laughter was officially introduced to the Headland community in a September 12 *Tam-O-Shanter* article, "Band Reflects Scottish Style (Laughter Encourages Participation)."

The marching band's Scottish identity was enhanced ten years

earlier with the change from a West Point style uniform to a near authentic style Scottish uniforms; but, Mr. Laughter took the band's Scottish culture one level higher. For example, Laughter had prior experience with Scottish Pipe bands, so one of his first innovations was to start a bagpipe presence with the band. Another change involved the establishment of Headland's first Highland Dance team comprised of Rachel Pharo, Catherine DeWitt, Lori Anglin, and Gina Bradley. Mr. Durham and the Headland Band program sponsored a jazz stage band since the early 1970s. After years of trying to organize a Headland-area jazz ensemble, the group finally came into being in the spring. Mr. Laughter's experience and background with jazz and pop music made him the ideal director for the band. The group was comprised of students from Headland, Russell, Briarwood, Ridgeview, and Westwood students. The group also had a small chorus of mostly Headland singers. The band rehearsed at Headland on Thursday evenings.

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The group played popular music of the time, such as Rocky, Chameleon, 2001,

and Fly Like an Eagle. Their first performances occurred at assemblies at Headland and



Most school systems in Georgia, such as Clayton County Schools, and indeed in most parts of America, historically organized the school structure as elementary (K-6), junior high (7-9) and senior high (10-12). However, some metro Atlanta school systems, like Atlanta City, DeKalb County and Fulton County, organized their schools with only

two tiers: elementary (K-7) and high school (8-12). For decades this was the plan in all of south Fulton and most of north Fulton until the early 1980s.⁴⁶

By the mid to late 1970s, however, school populations in south Fulton declined to such a low level that changes needed to be made in attendance zones. In May 1980, the Fulton County Board of Education closed three schools in South Fulton, including South Fulton and Eva Thomas Junior Highs. The fall 1980 merger of 227 students from South Fulton Junior High, Russell High's sole feeder, created an 8th through 12th grade population at Russell of 957 students. In the fall of 1981, Headland's enrollment was about 470 and that of Briarwood, just 2 miles apart, was approximately 490. Within a few months, a special task force was set-up to discuss the possible consolidation pairing of both high schools.

While dwindling enrollment during the 1980s had a huge negative impact on Headland High School, the band continued to function, performing at school events and participating in both the South Fulton County Marching Exhibition, GMEA 5th District Concert Band Festivals, and other community and school events until the closure of the school.

The 8th annual Fulton County Marching Festival was held at Garfield Stadium on the campus of Campbell-Fairburn. Mr. John Grindle, Fulton County Superintendent of Schools, was on hand to distribute participation trophies.

The Headland senior class won the 1981 Homecoming Week float competition.

The theme for Headland's last homecoming was "A Country Fair" that included students in county attire. Renee Hoggard was selected as Headland's final Homecoming Queen.

In 1976, Mr. Laughter and the Headland Band established Headland's first Highland Dance team. At the same time, Laughter also expressed his desire to have the marching band participate for the first time in the Stone Mountain Scottish Festival. The Highland Dancers were regular contestants over time and continued to compete in the Stone Mountain Highland Games through 1981.

In December, news reports confirmed that Headland and Briarwood would merge, with Headland converting to a middle school (Paul D. West Middle) in the fall of 1982.⁴⁷ With Headland's new designation as a middle school, the K-7 elementary schools in the East Point attendance zone - Dodson Drive, Connally Hills, Mt. Olive and Oak Knoll - transitioned to K-5 facilities.

Declining enrollment was the one obvious factor that precipitated the closure of Headland High in 1982 and other area schools in 1988 (see Appendix 1 below). For several more years, however, the bands once known as Headland and Briarwood now existed under the Woodland High name. Students had an important input into the name change and school colors, while rising seniors were given the option of having their previous home school name printed on the 1983 graduation diploma.

During its history, numerous Headland band members earned membership in the highly prestigious GMEA All-State Band. Headland's final representatives to GMEA All-State included Mike Terrell, trombone, Jon Slate, tuba, and Lori Wood. Lee Kinnamon, saxophone, earned membership in the Georgia Governor's Honors Program.

Headland's last band concert was held on May 25. The program included:

After a Choral Department multi-media presentation and a short performance by the Headland Honor Band, the band bid a final farewell with a closing portion entitled: "Salute to Headland High School"

The *Alma Mater* was sung with alumni and faculty featured in the front and with the audience standing.

Oh, hail to thee Headland
We honor and praise thee;
Thy spirit within us doth reign.
With truth as thy lesson
That truth hath made us free
And forever in thy debt we remain.

Faithfully will thou guide us As onward we journey 'Til summoned, we bow before God's throne; Thy memory shall linger And echo in our hearts, Thy glory we'll share as our own.

At the bottom of the printed program were the words: LONG LIVE THE MEMORIES OF A GREAT SCHOOL...HEADLAND HIGH!

The band attended Headland's final graduation and played numerous selections as a prelude to the exercises. Mr. Sims conducted Elgar's famous processional, *Pomp and Circumstance*, as the seniors entered. Class speakers included Michael Stell, how spoke of "Who Gets the Thanks," and Robert Barge, whose speech was titled, "The Next Step." The graduation class concluded the ceremony with a singing of the Headland *Alma Mater*.

Coda

The consolidation of Woodland (formerly Headland and Briarwood), Russell, Hapeville, and College Park high schools created a new school named Tri-Cities High, which was built on the Russell High School site. Woodland became a middle school, while Hapeville High was converted to an elementary school. The construction of the new Tri-Cities High School began on the Russell football stadium site, thereby allowing several buildings in front of the school to be utilized during the two-year transition. Until

Russell High was totally demolished and Tri-Cities High built, the new Tri-Cities H.S. 9th and 10th graders were housed at the "Russell Campus," while the 11th and 12th graders met at the old College Park High campus. For two years, the 9-10 band and the 11-12 band rehearsed daily on their respective campuses; the 9-10 band, however, was bussed from Russell to join the 11-12 band at the College Park campus for after school marching band practice, concerts, and GMEA 5th District events. The new Tri-Cities facility opened in August 1990.

It is important to note that throughout its history, the Headland band and music department were part of a larger high school band community. East Point and surrounding South Fulton areas were rich in musical experiences with contributions from other high schools such as Russell, Hapeville, Lakeshore, M. D. Collins, Briarcliff, Westwood, College Park, and Woodward Academy.

These groups and the Headland High Band shared common values, such as elevating and transmitting culture, fostering patriotism and democracy, providing self-improvement opportunities, enriching and improving the quality of life, and bestowing musical and cultural benefits on South Fulton County communities as a whole, all of which had the cumulative effect of making Headland High and the East Point area a better place to live. None of this would have been possible without the self-sacrifice of generations of Headland band students.

Self-Sacrifice

It is axiomatic that successful bands operate on "the whole is greater than the sum of its parts" philosophy. The great legacy of band membership involves *students who give* of themselves for the good of the band. For generations of Headland band students, "Band

first, me second" translated into an incredible number of service hours. The students literally gave of their lives through time, for in many instances, band occupied a tremendous block of each student's daily existence. During football season, for example, marching band took up an average of over 20 hours a week outside of school time for daily practices, game day activities, and Saturday Festivals/Parades, to name just a few.

Music-Learning and Music-Making were important and primary benefits for each student during their participation in band and the preceding pages present a scrapbook or tangible, extrinsic record of this important hallmark; however, another, perhaps more important, legacy concerns that of the long line of individual band students themselves who were changed and positively impacted through their respective participation experiences.

Intrinsic Benefits: Life Lessons Learned

Through their self-sacrifice and selflessness, the Headland band students earned intrinsic rewards and learned valuable life lessons in many significant areas:

- 1) Group participation Band participation enabled students to identify with a group, to be part of a popular organization, and to have pride in belonging to something bigger than themselves. The students were able to live and work together as a group in expressing a unified message. This was only accomplished by learning to sacrifice one's own desires, or to do what some athletic coaches refer to as "checking your ego at the door" for the broader success of the team.
- 2) Unity Generally speaking, the success of an individual student is not dependent on the success of all students in a typical academic class; yet, the nature of band is such that success for each student is tied to the ability level of the entire ensemble

- membership. By definition, a band must have a chain of command and mutual understanding of the importance of UNITY that is trusted by the collective members of the ensemble.
- 3) Self-discipline Success in most organizations, and in life in general, is attained through self-discipline. In band, students learned that self-discipline was the key to attaining the high goals set for the group.
- 4) Relationships Band is special in many ways, but the ensemble experience is unique in one important area time of participation. In most instances, Headland band students had the opportunity to have yearlong, not seasonal, experiences with both band directors and fellow students alike for up to five consecutive years. In some situations at Headland High, students began their band experience as early as fifth grade as part of the Headland Area Honor Band. Whatever their length of service, band provided the ability to form meaningful and deep relationships.

We were not created to be alone and live life in isolation, disconnected from the world around us as the Covid-19 pandemic has painfully revealed. Like a family, happiness and support can be found in a band experience, where there is an emphasis on relationships, a focus on the well being on others, and the ability to mutually lift each other up in good times and bad.

Finale

In conclusion, two themes are remarkable and appear consistently throughout the years chronicled here. First, the Headland High band was deeply committed to service to the school and the East Point/Atlanta communities at large as evidenced by the

overwhelming number of public performances. In short, the Headland band was vital to the social and musical fabric of the school.

Secondly, an interpretation emerges from these pages of events inspired by a united love of Headland High and the East Point area not only among the band students, but from the general population as well. This concept is clearly demonstrated by the community's enthusiastic support of duty, civic pride events and service.

Giving of themselves, with great sacrifice, to the band and to the school, along with the discipline, respect and concern for others, self-esteem, and pride in the band, will endure as a great lasting legacy of those who wore the Headland High band uniform. In return, students learned life lessons that continue to influence and impact lives even today. This story is especially dedicated to the large number of band students, band parents, and band directors who came through the doors of the Headland High School band room from 1956 through 1982 and who chose to give of themselves and provided music that brought

immeasurable value to the lives of many.

Appendix #1: Declining Enrollment in South Fulton County

Declining enrollment was the one obvious factor that precipitated the closure of Headland High in 1982 and other area schools in 1988. Over 30 years after the school closures, it is of historic interest to review select published newspaper accounts from the late 1970s and the early 1980s that provided a historical record of declining student enrollments that ultimately resulted in school closures.

Years of declining enrollment in the South Fulton area led to numerous schools having below minimum numbers of students as required for Georgia QBE funding standards. As early as 1976, a *South Fulton Today* article signaled the possibility of school closures in the Tri-City area:

"Declining enrollment in Tri-Cities schools may result in the closing of some of the smaller elementary schools. Maturing neighborhoods and citizen flight from the borders of Atlanta could mean empty classrooms in East Point, College Park, and Hapeville. Superintendent of Schools Dr. Ed Baker pointed out that one small school, Church Street Elementary in East Point, will close after this school year. Cade Gervais, information officer for the school system, said that in many cases there will be room in nearby schools for students from schools which may be closed."

In May 1980, the *Atlanta Suburban Reporter* published news concerning Fulton County's plan to close Beavers and South Fulton High Schools and Quillian Elementary because of declining enrollment. ⁴⁹ Russell High reabsorbed an 8th grade (from South Fulton), a 5-grade situation that had existed prior to the merger of Russell High and South Fulton High in the fall of 1970.

The shrinkage of attendance for a number of years around East Point telegraphed the ultimate closure of schools. Church Street Elementary School, one of Fulton County's oldest and smallest schools, closed at the conclusion of the 1976-77 school year. Later, in September 1979, the *Southside Sun* published an article detailing the decline of 532 South Fulton students over the year before.⁵⁰

Declining enrollment occurred not only at Headland, but also at neighboring high schools such as Hapeville and Russell. For example, in the fall of 1978, the Hapeville band numbered only 22 instrumentalists and 18 auxiliary members. In April 1980, Dr. Hal Shields, a candidate for Fulton County School Superintendent, spoke of his concern about the low enrollment of Hapeville High School, noting: "The fact is that all schools in the Tri-Cities are losing population." Russell High and College Park High absorbed 8th graders due to the closure of both South Fulton and Eva Thomas Junior Highs at the start of the 1980-1981 school year. By the early 1980s, low school enrollment led to the dissolution of the Hapeville football team. For the fall of 1982, Headland High School was consolidated with Briarwood High School to form Woodland High School on what was formerly the Briarwood High campus. The former Headland High campus was converted to Paul S. West Middle School, in honor of Paul D. West, a former Fulton County School Superintendent from 1947-1971 and principal at Russell High from 1933 to 1941.

One of the earliest announcements concerning specific proposed closing and consolidation of schools occurred in October 30, 1985, with a *Southside Sun* newspaper

article indicating proposals by a Tri-Cities school Task Force. 52 By 1986 the Task Force had met and made preliminary recommendations concerning the closure of numerous elementary and high schools. The following year the Fulton County School Board approved the closure and merger of Woodland, Hapeville, College Park, and Russell. Ultimately, Woodland and the other three schools ceased to exist after the graduation of the class of 1988. At that time, these high schools, rich in traditions and histories, came to an end with the merger, producing what is now known as Tri-Cities High School, which was built on the Russell High School site. Woodland (the old Headland High and Briarwood High pairing in the fall of 1982) became a middle school, while Hapeville High was converted to an elementary school. The construction of the new Tri-Cities High School began on the Russell football stadium site, thereby allowing several buildings in front of the school to be utilized during the two-year transition. Until Russell High was totally demolished and Tri-Cities High built, the new Tri-Cities H.S. 9th and 10th graders were housed at the "Russell Campus," while the 11th and 12th graders met at the old College Park High campus. For two years, the 9-10 band and the 11-12 band rehearsed daily on their respective campuses; the 9-10 band, however, was bussed from Russell to join the 11-12 band at the College Park campus for after school marching band practice, concerts, and GMEA 5th District events. The new Tri-Cities facility, incorporating in part the old Headland district, opened in August 1990.

APPENDIX #2

William Fry, Russell High Band, '71

Dr. William E, Fry, a 1971 graduate of Russell High School, is researching and documenting the 60-year history of the Russell Band. He retired after 36 years of service to music education and wrote the Russell Band History as his first retirement project.

After his graduation at Russell, where he was a band student of Dr. William Prescott, Fry graduated from Columbus State University (GA) in 1975 and received the masters of music education from Georgia State University in 1981. He obtained the doctor of musical arts (D.M.A.) in Instrumental Conducting from the University of North Carolina/Greensboro in 1991 and a leadership certification from Troy State University (AL) in 2000.

Prior to his 2011 retirement from a music position with the Muscogee County School District (Columbus, GA), Fry held band conductor positions at Columbus State University (GA) and Susquehanna University (PA). From 1975 to 1987, Fry was coordinator of all instrumental music activities at Redan High School, Stone Mountain, Georgia, and held an assistant conductor position with the Yaarab (Atlanta) Shrine Band. He has also held part-time music positions at Georgia Military College-Columbus, Columbus Tech College, and most recently at Point University in West Point, Georgia.

Fry has appeared as a feature conductor at the Georgia Music Educators State
Convention, Florida State University "Tri-State" Conductors Symposium, CBDNA/NBA
Southeastern Regional, and the Carolina Conductors Symposium. He has authored
several articles on conducting and is a noted authority on the band music of Don Gillis.

Fry has three grown children and resides with his wife, Anne, in Columbus, Georgia, where he was a part-time member of the saxophone section of the Columbus Cavaliers Jazz Band and has been conductor of the Columbus Community Orchestra for 24 years. He is also a saxophonist with "DNR," an all-medical doctor rock band that performs volunteer benefits throughout the Columbus area.
