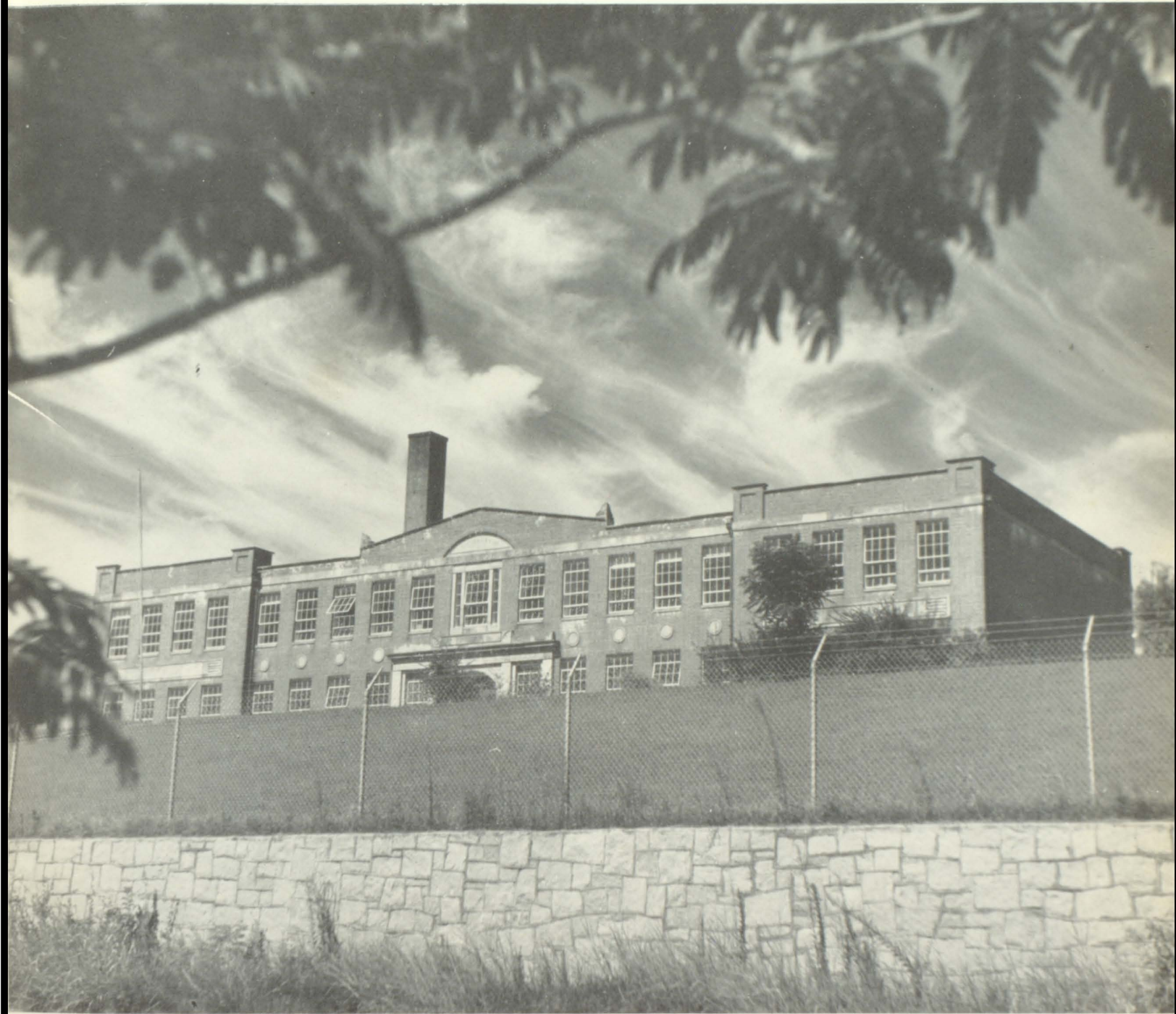




Foreword

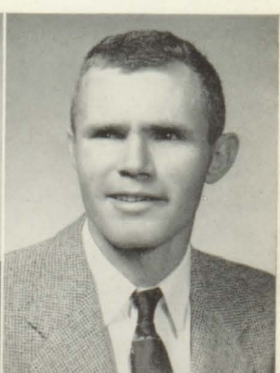

The trial for the class of '57 ends this May 28th, 1957. This senior class comes to a full realization of its five year hop from "seventh grade promotion" to high school graduation.

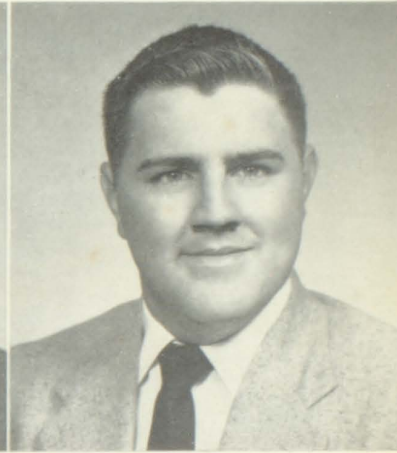

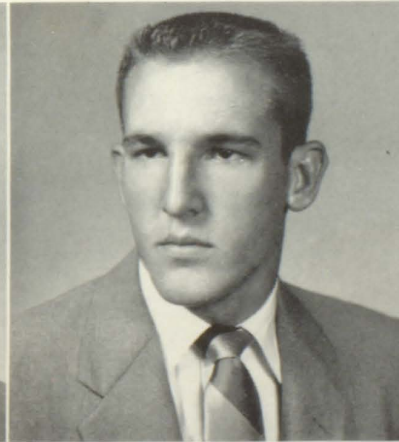

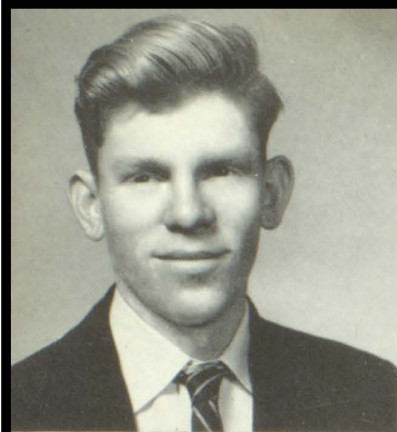
DAVID JERALD ELLIS, *General*: Lost part interest in HHS when Joyce graduated. Loves art and assists with instructing eighth grade art students.

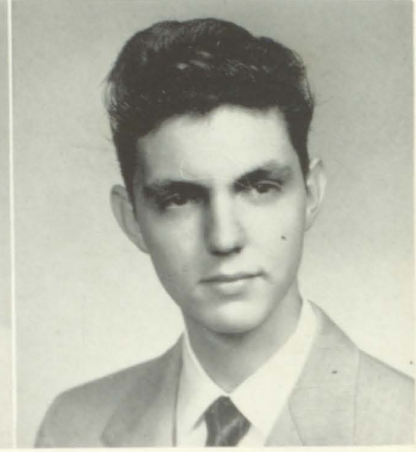
LILA RUTH McMILLAN, General: At Southwest High, Lila was a member of the Senior FHA. Main virtue—Loves to Read.

BARBARA ANNE MINSHEW, General: In her quiet way and easy-going manner, Barbara has been in the Beta Club one year and was a Student Council room representative.



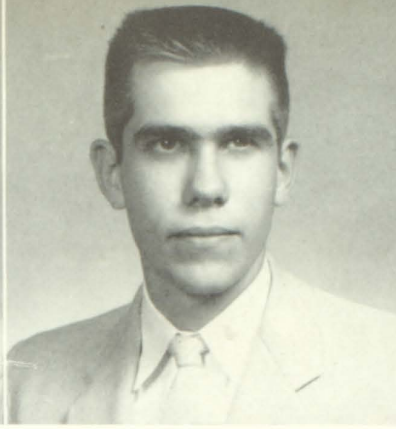

The Juniors

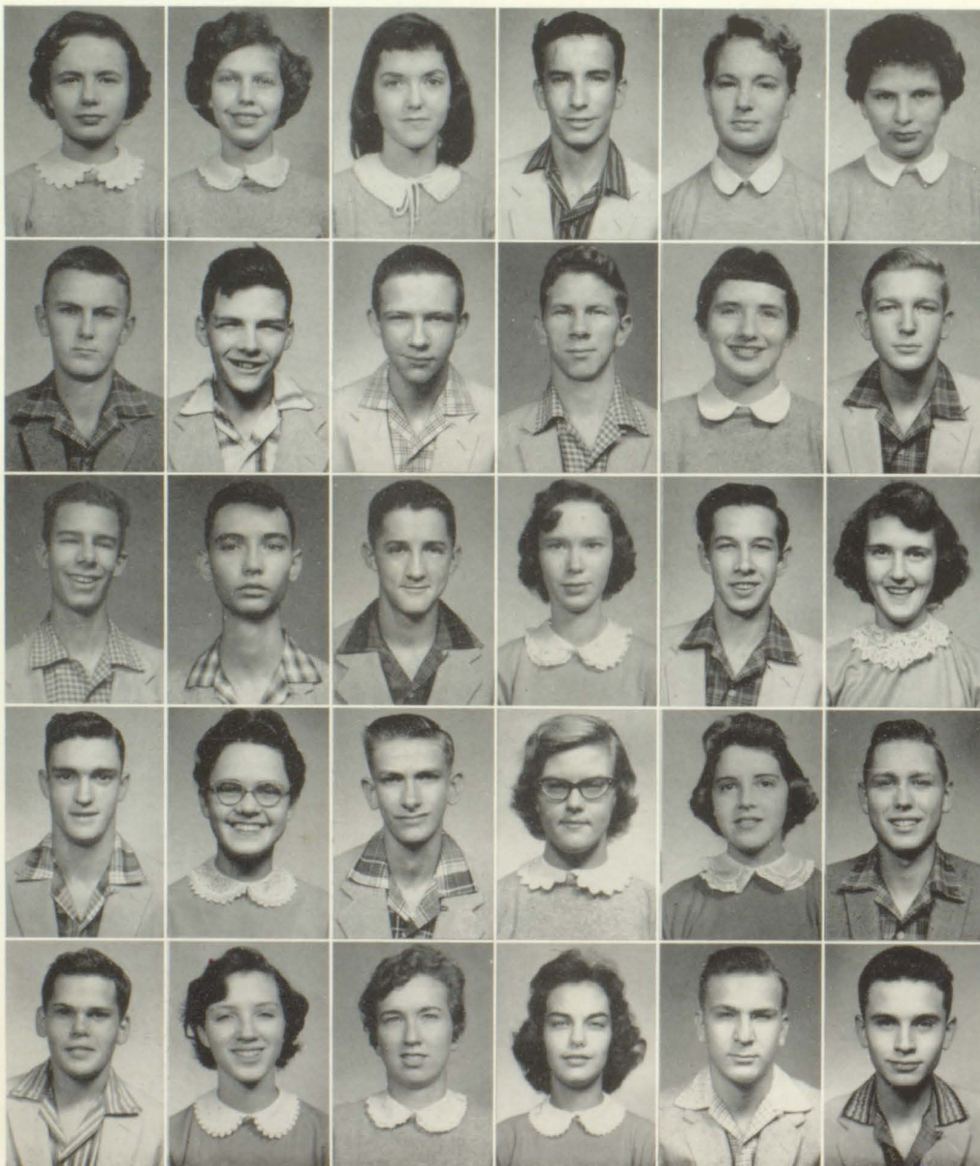
Being a junior involves belonging to upperclass activities, enjoying limited privileges, and looking forward to being a senior.

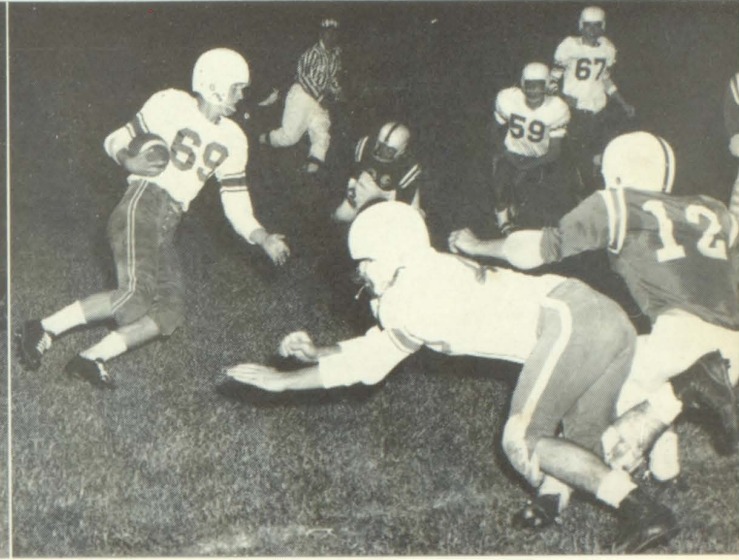
