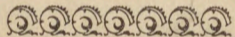

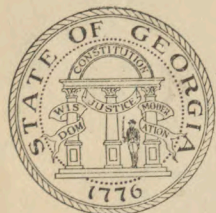

Dear Mr. Superintendent:

In the preparation of this annual report form we have endeavored to arrange same so that the minimum amount of time and effort will be required of the Superintendents in making out the reports and at the same time supply the information needed.

With the exception of the first page all information called for in this report has been called for in previous reports. The information called for here is somewhat of a summary which we must secure in order to make our annual report to the Bureau of Education. The information called for on the other pages, as called for in previous years, is required by law and is needed by this office in the preparation of the annual report to the Georgia Legislature and in determining what are the educational problems of this state and how they may be solved. No program for the improvement of education in Georgia can be intelligently made without this information which is much less than that reported in other states.

While there are more pages in this report than in reports made previous to 1925, we believe less time and effort will be required in supplying the information than for the old form. We believe, also, that its form will result in less confusion and a greater degree of accuracy. The assembling of all information relating to teachers on one sheet and all information relating to enrollment and attendance on another, etc., brings together information needed in a form that lends itself to a study of these problems by the County Superintendent as well as by the State.

These forms are principally tabulation sheets rather than blanks upon which are to be placed the results of lengthy calculations. The minimum amount of calculation is required, it being our purpose to do as much of the calculation in this office as possible, thus relieving the Superintendent as much as possible.

The report this year as usual is in two parts, one dealing with financial statistics and the other dealing with general statistics.

The desire of many Superintendents to make their reports promptly is much appreciated. If they are delayed embarrassment is caused, sometimes resulting in tying up their funds. Please see, therefore, that this report is filled out and returned to this office promptly.
