BASKET CASE: 1) is the typical student on Monday morning. He lacks


energy, enthusiasm and is very lethargic 2) a student the teachers have given up as hopeless.

BUTTON DOWNS: are a common style of shirts worn by the student body. The cloth is usually oxford and any possible color. The top gives the student a preppy look.





CLOTHES: at N.S. are only the finest quality no matter if the student is an athlete, a prep, a punk or just a casual whatever.



DREAMS: are what the finer things in life are made of. Dreams vary from being a football star or nuclear physist to marrying that special someone.



FINALS: a nerve wracking, nail biting period of the student agenda. They occur, unfortunately, 3 times a year lasting two hours each.


FIRST PERIOD: guaranteed to put a 20 year insomniac to sleep!

FRIENDS: make school what it is.


Friends are the most important







shirt can cost up to \$24.00 at Rich's.



LOAFERS: another facet of the preppy style. They are brown leather shoes with a slot in front to put a dime — a penny is no longer worth much.



MONDAY MORNING: yawn, grrrr — Don't speak to me, zzzzzzz . . .





QUIET: is what the library has become ever since last year's Senior prank (locking a calf in the library) because it now takes a "pass" to enter the library.


RADIOS: or ghetto blasters help liven up the school and after school practices. Popular stations are Z-93 and 96 Rock.


And the beat goes on . . . Concert Band
