







Senator Olid D. Johnston, Democrat of South Carolina and Chairman of the Senate Post Office Committee sent Mr. Day a letter. In part, Senator Johnston said:

"I am mindful that you believe savings of \$300,000,000 can be achieved, provided the Department be given time and authority. I am anxious to know what additional authority the Department will require.

"The Congress would welcome a reduction of this magnitude because it would be a potent factor in reaching an equitable rate adjustment in 1962. I wholeheartedly support the postal system modernization, which will result in substantial savings without impairing this vital public service, or harm to the devoted career workers."

These are strong words indeed from the man who will play the most important role in this rate question. Mr. Day and Mr. Kennedy have their work cut out for them if they hope to win more money for the Post Office from the public through the action of Congress.

Now is the time to write your representatives to tell them of your feelings on this and other important matters which will face Washington during the next session. Be a responsible
