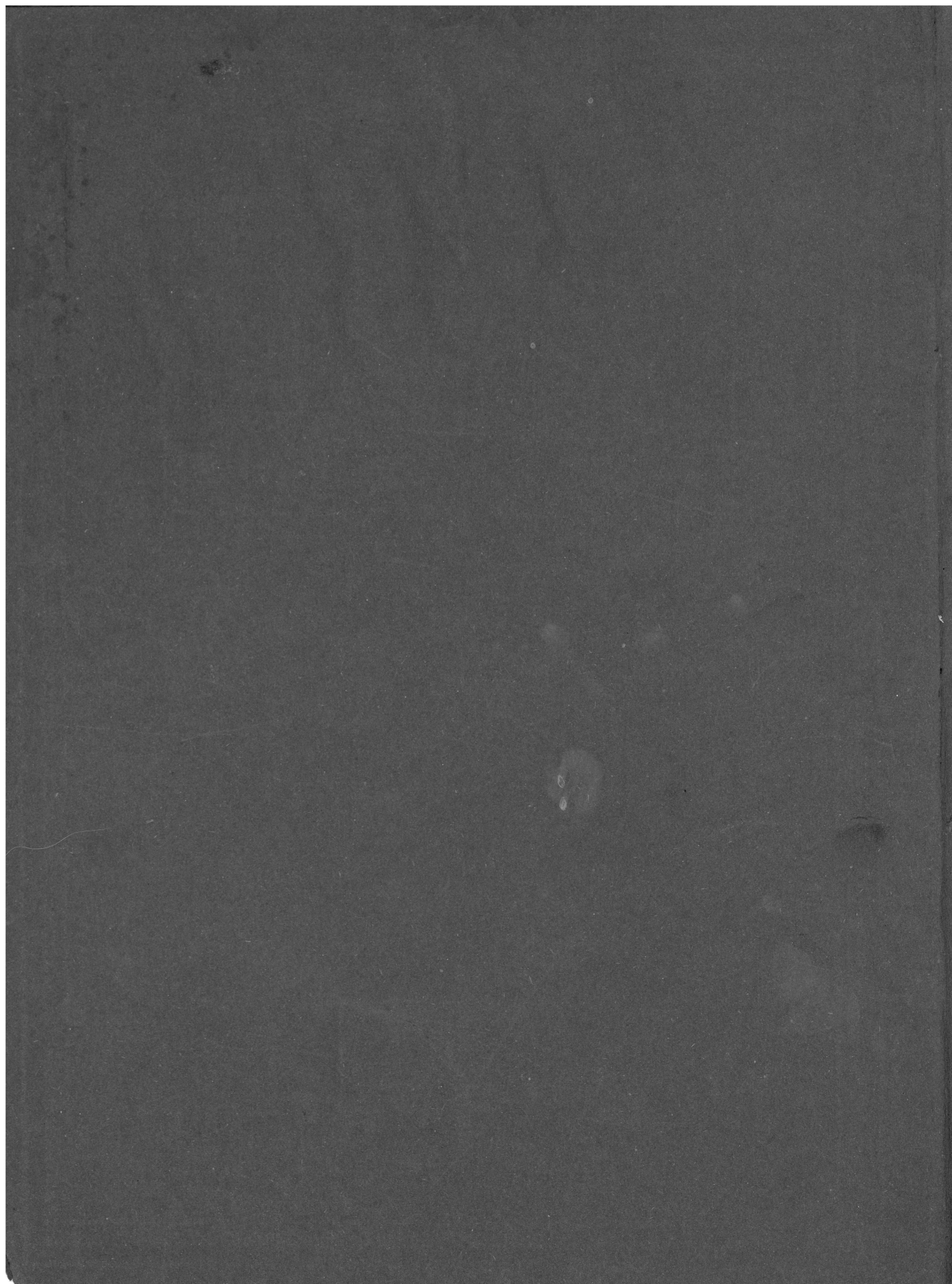

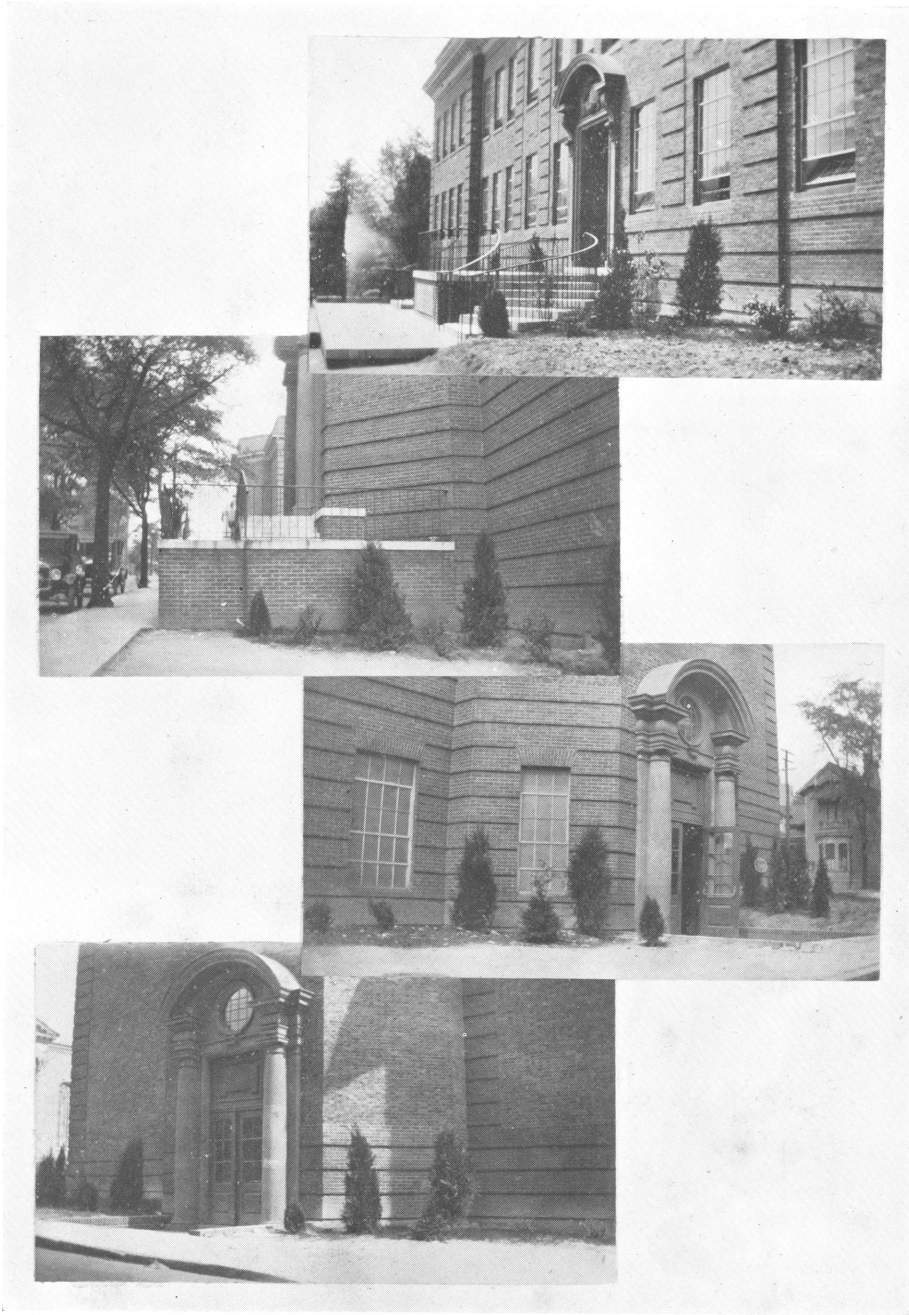

## Our Principal's Message



IN CLOSING this the most successful year of the school it may be well to take a retrospective view of the situation.

Starting in September, 1915, in a rented building on the corner of Whitehall and Garnett Streets, with an enrollment of one hundred and thirty-five pupils and a faculty of four teachers, Fulton High School has grown in eleven years to an enrollment of eight hundred and fifty pupils and a faculty of twenty-nine teachers. The present graduating class is the largest in the history of the school.

This is the first complete year we have spent in our magnificent new building, of which we are all very proud. During the year many prominent educators have visited the school; all admired the building. Only recently a delegation of pupils from a nearby town was sent to Atlanta to inspect our building and equipment. They said it was inspiring.

We have financed during the year the following athletic teams: Football, girls' basketball, boys' basketball, and also baseball and track teams. In addition to this sweaters have been given to the football and basketball teams.

Our Christmas entertainment netted us two hundred dollars for the library. We have also bought a stage setting for the auditorium, and a portable stereopticon and set of a hundred slides for the biology department.

We have bought several new instruments for the band, all of the best make, in addition to providing the members with inexpensive uniforms. Our band has now forty members. Their progress is indeed gratifying.

Through the able management of the president of our P.-T. A., Mrs. John D. Humphries, a donation was secured from the Board of Education to cover the cost of the beautiful shrubbery recently set out on our grounds.

Our Alumni Association has raised almost enough money to enable them to begin work on the fountain to be placed in the girls' court. As soon as this work is done the Board will probably build a driveway around the fountain and enable us to fix up the court in an attractive way.

We are very proud of our Home Economics Department. It is doing splendid work and is a decided asset to the school. Our cafeteria is serving its purpose admirably.

Our Joseph E. Brown Literary and Debating Society, though just a little over a year old, is proving to be one of the most valuable organizations of the school.

We foster and encourage the following clubs: The Girl Reserves, the Hi-Y Club, the Glee Club and the Home Economics Club.

In all the workings of the school the student body has always shown a beautiful spirit of loyalty. There is constantly evident what the French call esprit de corps that inspires Fulton High pupils to nobler and better things.

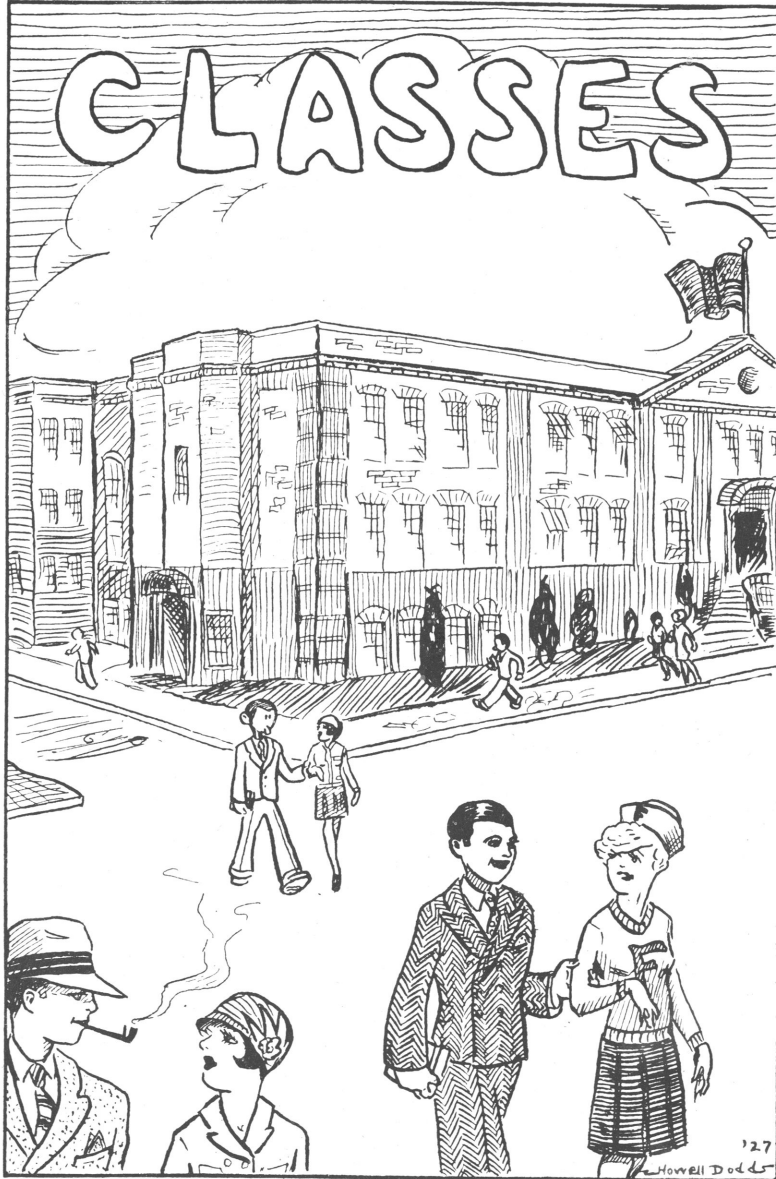

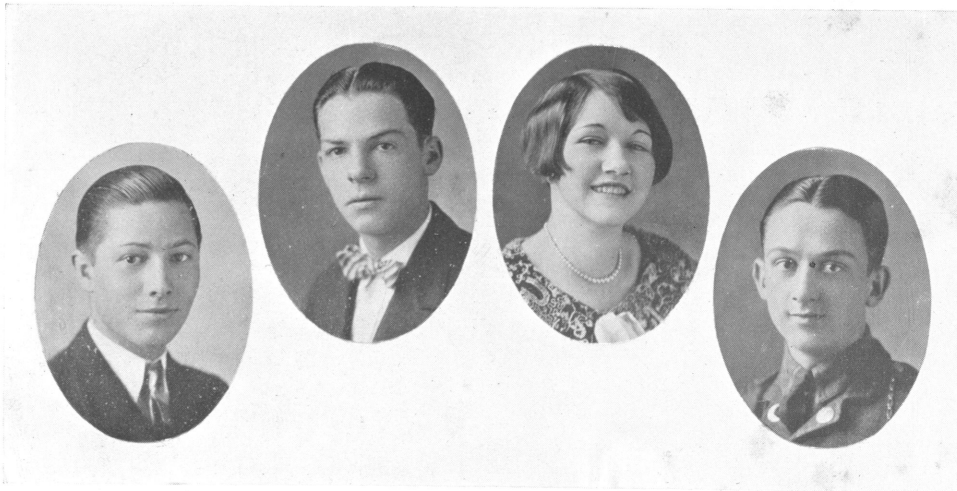
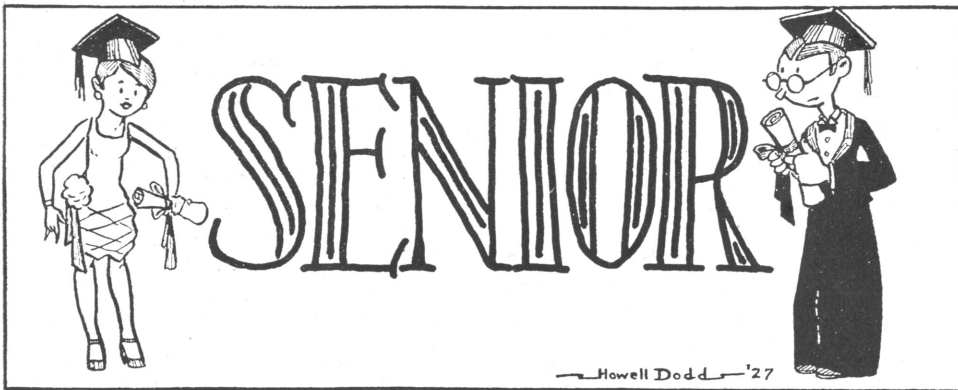

*"Buzzard"*

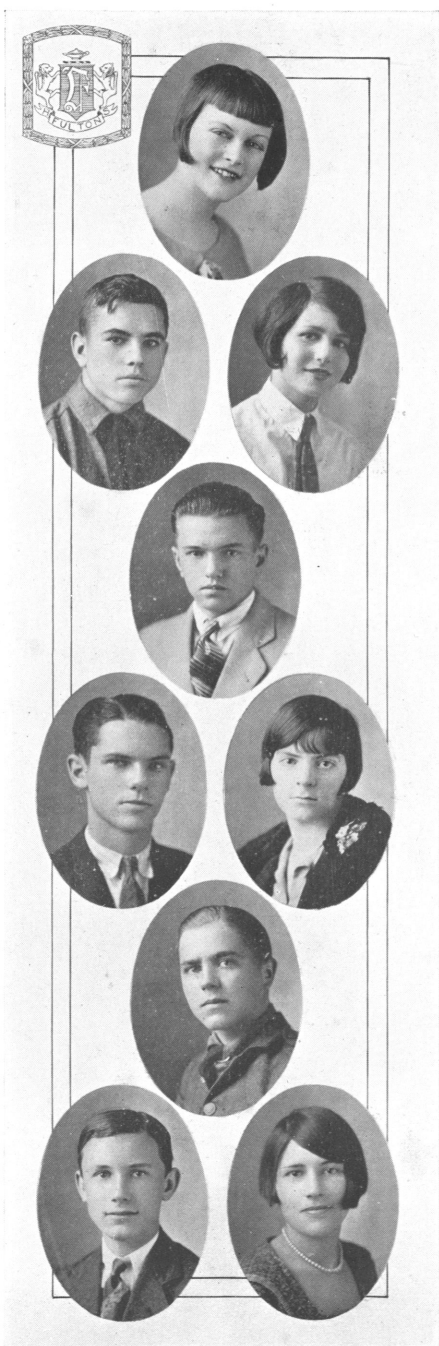

The Senior Class includes three sections, D-1, D-2, and D-3, our home class teachers being Mr. White, Miss Shannon, and Miss Dew. We are the first Senior Class to have a graduate in the Home Economics course. The president of the Girl Reserves is a Senior. We also have in our class, Leola Smith, who composed Fulton's song and Howell Dodd, who designed the Fulton seal.

During our four years at Fulton High we have tried to put that "good ole Fulton spirit" into motion and be real sports. We have had a large percentage of Honor Roll students in our class. In closing this history, the class of 1927 wishes to challenge the class of 1928 to make a better Senior Class than we have made.

# MILITARY



## Military Department



THE MILITARY DEPARTMENT of this school was organized in the fall of 1918 without any encouragement from the War Department. In the fall of 1919, it was officially recognized by the War Department as a Junior Unit of the Reserve Officers Training Corps. Since that time it has grown from one small company to a Battalion, consisting of Battalion Headquarters, Staff, Band, and four large companies.

We have successfully competed with schools having a much larger enrollment. During the seven years that this unit has been in existence, we have won first honor in company competitive drills four times, and second place three times. We have never been defeated for first place in the Individual Drill. Boys from all the senior high schools of Atlanta compete for this honor.

We are very fortunate in having Colonel Wm. R. Dashiell, United States Army, Retired, as Professor of Military Science and Tactics. Colonel Dashiell graduated from the United States Military Academy with the class of '88. During his forty years as an officer, he has seen foreign service in the Philippines and France. During the World War he commanded a brigade in actual fighting.

This department is in direct charge of Sergeant Robert L. Campbell. Sergeant Campbell came to this school in 1919 when our unit was first recognized by the War Department. He is ideally fitted for his position of Instructor, for he is not only a very efficient drill master, but he knows and understands boys as well. So long as Sergeant Campbell remains in charge at Fulton, rest assured that this unit will enjoy continued success.

Company "A" has perfected a silent drill which, we believe, has never been attempted by any other school in the South. The movements of this drill consist of Manual of Arms while at a stationary position and while marching; also various drill movements executed in quick and double time totalling nearly one thousand counts. This has required much concentration and effort, and is only possible when cadets are well trained, therefore "A" Company should be proud of their accomplishment.

The Freshman class is to be especially commended for their interest and efforts. This class is not recognized by the War Department as being eligible for membership in the Reserve Officers Training Corps. Incidentally, no uniforms or equipment are available for these boys. Their good conduct and willingness to learn prove they have the real "Fulton Spirit," and we are sure they will make splendid upperclassmen in the years to come.

The Military Department is very proud of the interest shown by the girls of our school in all the activities we undertake. Our sponsors, all Fultonites, are always very attractive and popular. The boys appreciate to a great extent the loyal support given them by their girl classmates, and this encourages them to do better work.

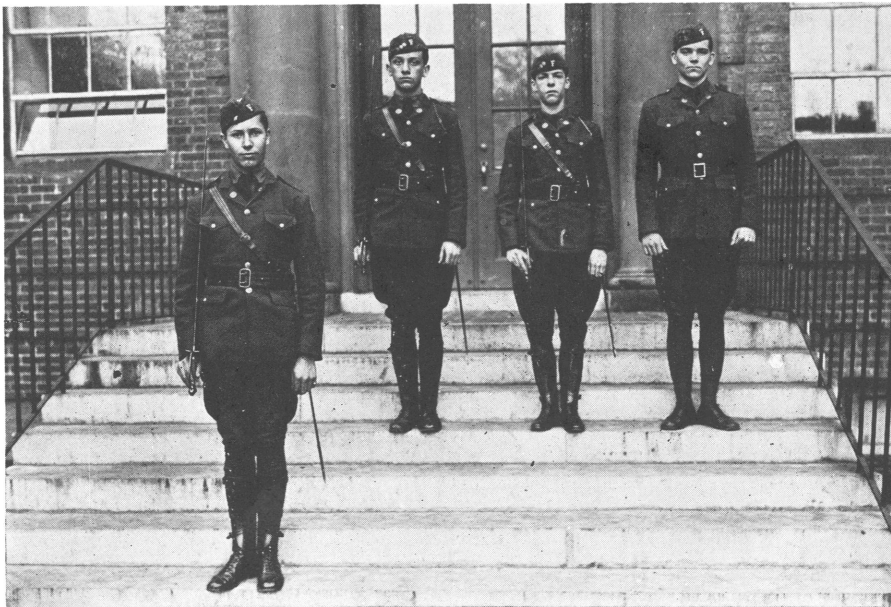

## Athletics



GOOD definition of athletics is: A sport or pastime that exercises some part of the body and develops a coordination of mind and muscle. Athletics is therefore any form of exercise whether it be baseball, football, hiking, chopping wood, or setting up exercises. An athlete is one who takes part in some exercise.

All countries of the world and all persons are interested in athletics. Games of various sorts and kinds have been invented to make athletics more interesting. A majority of the people consider an athlete as one who takes part or is a player in some of the major games. The major games of our country are baseball, football, track, golf, tennis, la crosse, and innumerable others.

Although many games and contests are embodied in athletics, all are divided into two classes—the professional and the amateur. The professional who plays for the money he may realize from the sport serves his purpose in the amusement of the “fans,” but neglects the principles on which athletics is based. On the other hand, the amateur plays for the honor and pleasure he gets in clean competition. I am interested chiefly in the amateur athletics, especially in high school competition. It is interesting to study the purpose, practice, and results of high school.

The chief purpose of athletics is to make strong, healthy men and boys. Those who are athletes and want to receive the greatest benefit from it improve their health by constantly training. There are many forms of training for different forms of sports, but generally all athletes cut out pastry, soft drinks, cigarettes, have regular hours for eating and sleeping. In this way athletics give its “children” an advantage over others who do not care about their condition.

The second purpose of athletics is to teach boys and girls the principle of fair play. A greater majority of coaches are the type that teach fair play. The players are continually associated with these coaches and absorb their ideals. Athletics is the spirit of the school. A pride in the school is developed when a winning team is produced and students are proud that their school is on top.

The third purpose of athletics is to develop the brain to work in coordination with the muscles. Here is where school studies and athletics go hand in hand. A good sound brain and muscles are formed on the field. These come together in the game and when a quick decision can win a game the athlete is ready.

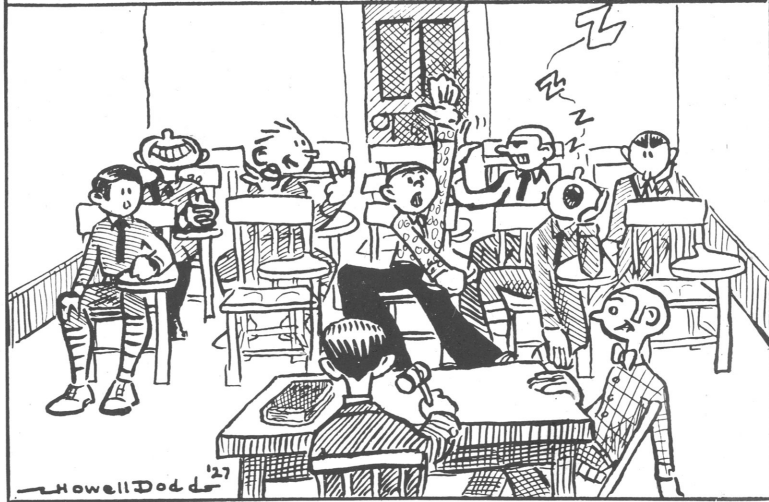

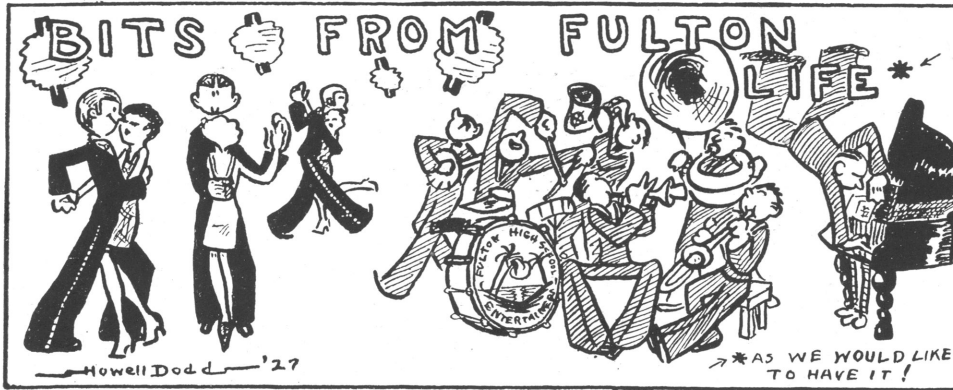
The bookkeeping team was composed of Irene McCoy, Frank Gray, and Fred Taylor. Even though the team was not victorious, Frank Gray won fourth place.
