
Sharing, Growing Mark 1970-71









Daily Routines Mean Both Familiar And New



Cathy Welch, with escort Harry Mobley, gracefully steps onto the field as she is announced as the eighth-grade representative.







Mr. Purdie, Emily George, Mrs. Betty Drukenmiller and Dr. Douglas MacRae officiated at the opening assembly. Guests and students then spent the rest of the evening attending three sessions being held by colleges they were most interested in.

Dramatizing the scope of careers open to tomorrow's blue and white collar workers was a Career Carnival, on October 27. Sponsored by the Junior Engineering Technical Search program, the Carnival hosted 30 industries and their displays. A festival of career films, job displays and exhibits, and explanations by business representatives about specific careers were among the features of the day, which began with an address by Dr. Beverly Johnson. 



Six areas of study about man's behavior are offered in Hapeville's social studies department: history, anthropology, sociology, economics, political science, and geography. Taken by students in grades eight through twelve, these courses are often enlivened with audio visual aids from the school or county library. A helpful option offered by the department to seniors is that they can specialize, during their final year, in one of the six areas which make up the social studies curriculum.






Math Stresses Reasoning

While not every student enjoys his high school math classes, few would dispute the importance of being able to work with numbers. Among the courses offered in Hornet country to develop students' mathematical skills are pre-algebra, algebra, geometry, and analysis. To insure that the needs of all students can be met, the department offers programs geared to three different achievement levels: the college-bound, the job-oriented, and the weaker math students. A major overall objective of the department, headed by Emanuel J. Ellinas, is to encourage pupils to sharpen their ability to reason soundly and accurately.



HHS Scientists Probe Mysteries Of Life


Eighth grade science and general science are a must for students at Hapeville. For further knowledge in science, biology, chemistry, or physics may be taken. Chemistry should be taken by students who plan to enter college. Study of chemistry gives a fundamental knowledge of basic chemistry and math and also provides laboratory know-how for advanced courses.

Biology includes the study of the structure of the body and the study of plants and animals. Modern physics is the basic course in the form of electronics. It also deals with the fundamentals of laboratory experiments.

Among the new developments in the science department this year was the addition of a wave making machine and audio oscillators that go with the oscilloscope. A new stock room was set up for the electronic equipment, which the students found very interesting.











PVT Fosters Creative Leadership

Pre-vocational training is a project designed to assist public schools in meeting major educational needs of slow learners. The curriculum provides a flexible structure upon which the school can construct experience based upon each pupil's needs and demands.

The main objectives of P.V.T. students are learning to maintain a state of physical well being, learning to live safely, learning to earn a living, and learning to be a responsible citizen. Students in P.V.T. are required to take math, English, and science. A number of students are involved in a "work-out" station program in which they attend three classes a day and then work at a job in the afternoon or evening.


CVE Developes Vocational And Industrial Skills.










Hilltop Staff Aims At Perfection














The all important front four on the prevent defense prepare to rush the opposing quarterback in the closing seconds of the St. Joe game.




Rodney Davenport falls on a key fumble in the fourth quarter of the Homecoming game.

"Green Machine" Finishes 10th in State






Hornets rush onto the field after the pregame warmup before the M.D. Collins game.



Line blocking opens up a gap in Lovette defense.




Hank Rast pulls in a touchdown pass with seven seconds remaining, to sink the hopes of St. Joe.



B-Team Wins Region 7-B










Randy Thomas' drive toward the goal hinges on ball control.











New Style Homecoming Features Basketball Royalty




B-Team Strides After Success








Grapplers Rise To #2 Slot In State














Following Mr. Purdie's farewell announcement, he was saluted by a standing ovation from Hapeville students and teachers.


New Teachers Receive New Education




Seniors' Actions Reflect
