Guests and students then spent the rest of the evening attending three sessions being held by colleges they were most interested in.

Dramatizing the scope of careers open to tomorrow's blue and white collar workers was a Career Carnival, on October 27. Sponsored by the Junior Engineering Technical Search program, the Carnival hosted 30 industries and their displays. A festival of career films, job displays and exhibits, and explanations by business representatives about specific careers were among the features of the day, which began with an address by Dr. Beverly Johnson. Dr. Johnson, director of the Occupational Information Center for Education-Industry for the Metropolitan Atlanta area, cautioned students to give considerable thought to their career choices because their decisions will have such long lasting consequences. HHS Students Explore Social Studies


Six areas of study about man's behavior are offered in Hapeville's social studies department: history, anthropology, sociology, economics, political science, and geography. Taken by students in grades eight through twelve, these courses are often enlivened with audio visual aids from the school or county library. Projects also play an important part in helping the students to get a better grasp of the material being taught. A helpful option offered by the department to seniors is that they can specialize, during their final year, in one of the six areas which make up the social studies curriculum.

While not every student enjoys his high school math classes, few would dispute the importance of being able to work with numbers. Among the courses offered in Hornet country to develop students' mathematical skills are pre-algebra, algebra, geometry, and analysis. To insure that the needs of all students can be met, the department offers programs geared to three different achievement levels: the college-bound, the job-oriented, and the weaker math students. A major overall objective of the department, headed by Emanuel J. Ellinas, is to encourage pupils to sharpen their ability to reason soundly and accurately.

Eighth grade science and general science are a must for students at Hapeville. For further knowledge in science, biology, chemistry, or physics may be taken. Chemistry should be taken by students who plan to enter college. Study of chemistry gives a fundamental knowledge of basic chemistry and math and also provides laboratory know-how for advanced courses.

Biology includes the study of the structure of the body and the study of plants and animals. Modern physics is the basic course in the form of electronics. It also deals with the fundamentals of laboratory experiments.

Among the new developments in the science department this year was the addition of a wave making machine and audio oscillators that go with the oscilloscope. A new stock room was set up for the electronic equipment, which the students found very interesting.

## PVT Fosters Creative Leadership

Pre-vocational training is a project designed to assist public schools in meeting major educational needs of slow learners. The curriculum provides a flexible structure upon which the school can construct experience based upon each pupil's needs and demands.

The main objectives of P.V.T. students are learning to maintain a state of physical well being, learning to live safely, learning to earn a living, and learning to be a responsible citizen. Students in P.V.T. are required to take math, English, and science. A number of students are involved in a "work-out" station program in which they attend three classes a day and then work at a job in the afternoon or evening.
This program began at Russell High School and is now in its second year at Hapeville.

CVE Developes Vocational And Industrial Skills.

The term "Cooperative Vocational Academic Education Program" refers to a program of vocational education designed to correlate cooperative classroom instruction with academic instruction. The program is flexible enough to offer unemployable individuals the same type of work-experience opportunities in relationship to cooperative and classroom activities as those that are employable.

The main objectives of CVE are to prepare the student for full time employment, to enable the student to know some of the methods and functions of business and industry, to aid the student in making social adjustments, and to create a normal, healthy, and sincere attitude on the part of students toward work.
