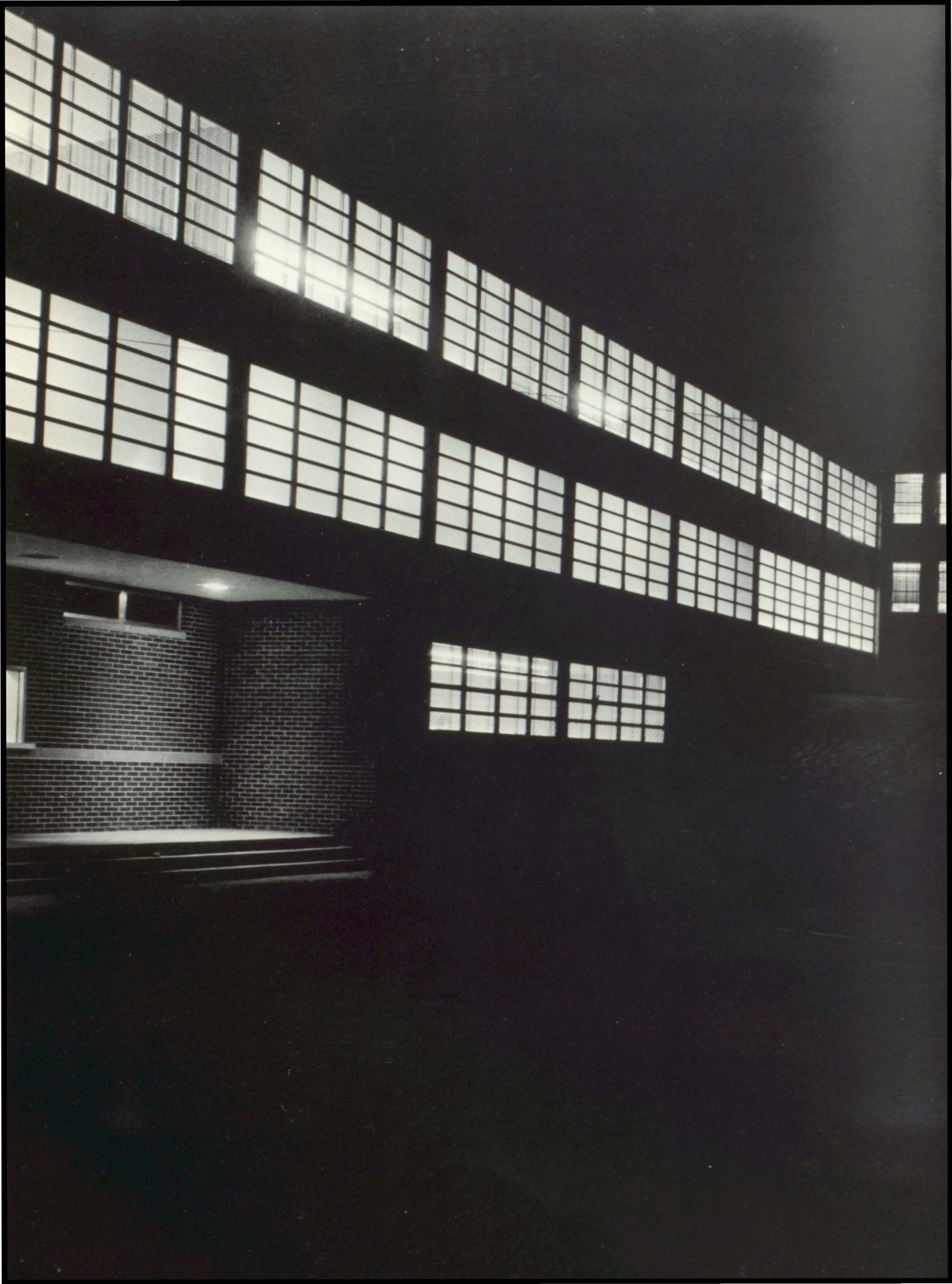
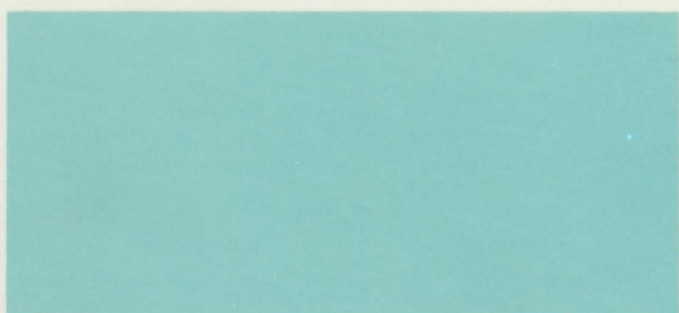




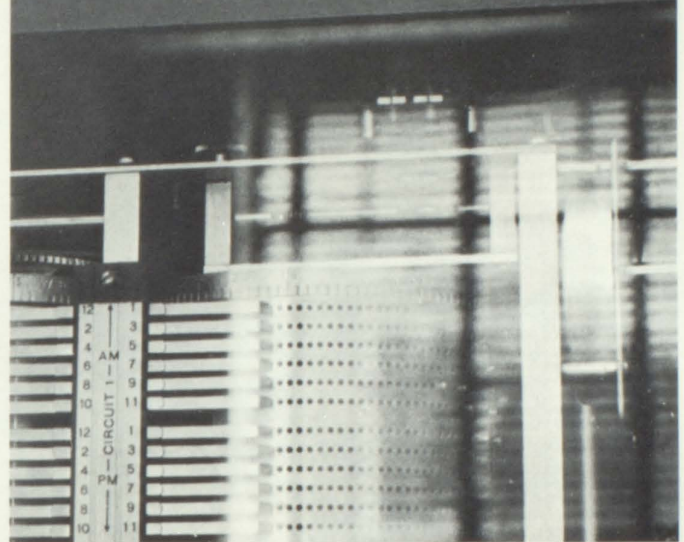
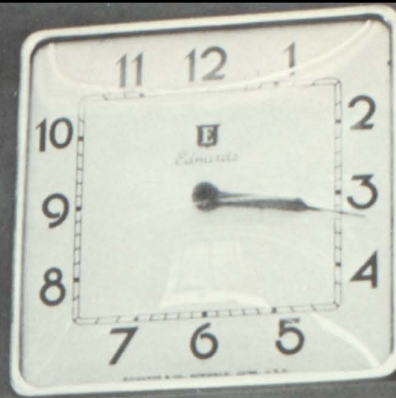
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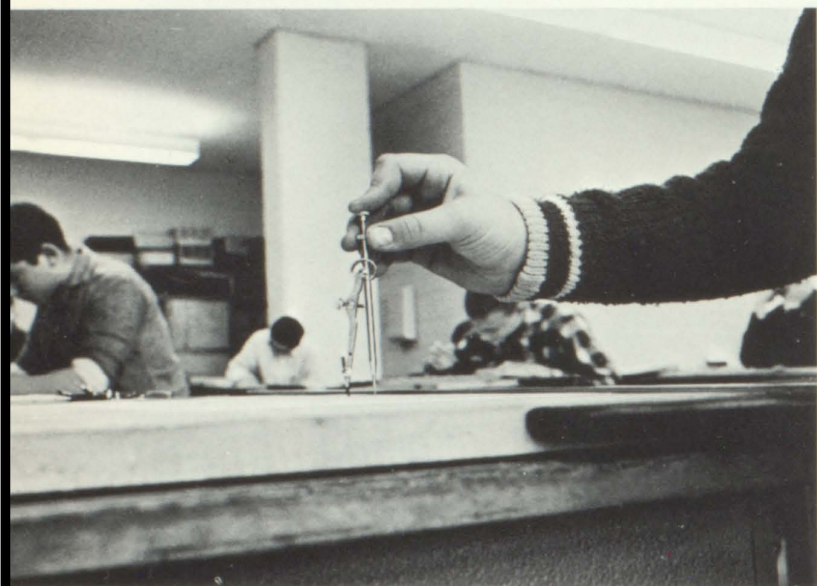
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A Place In Flux ...

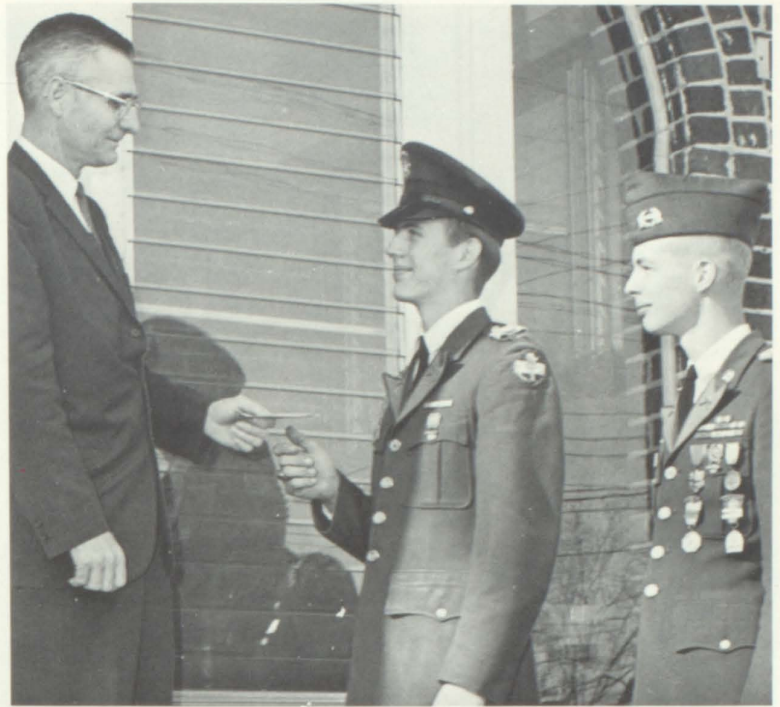

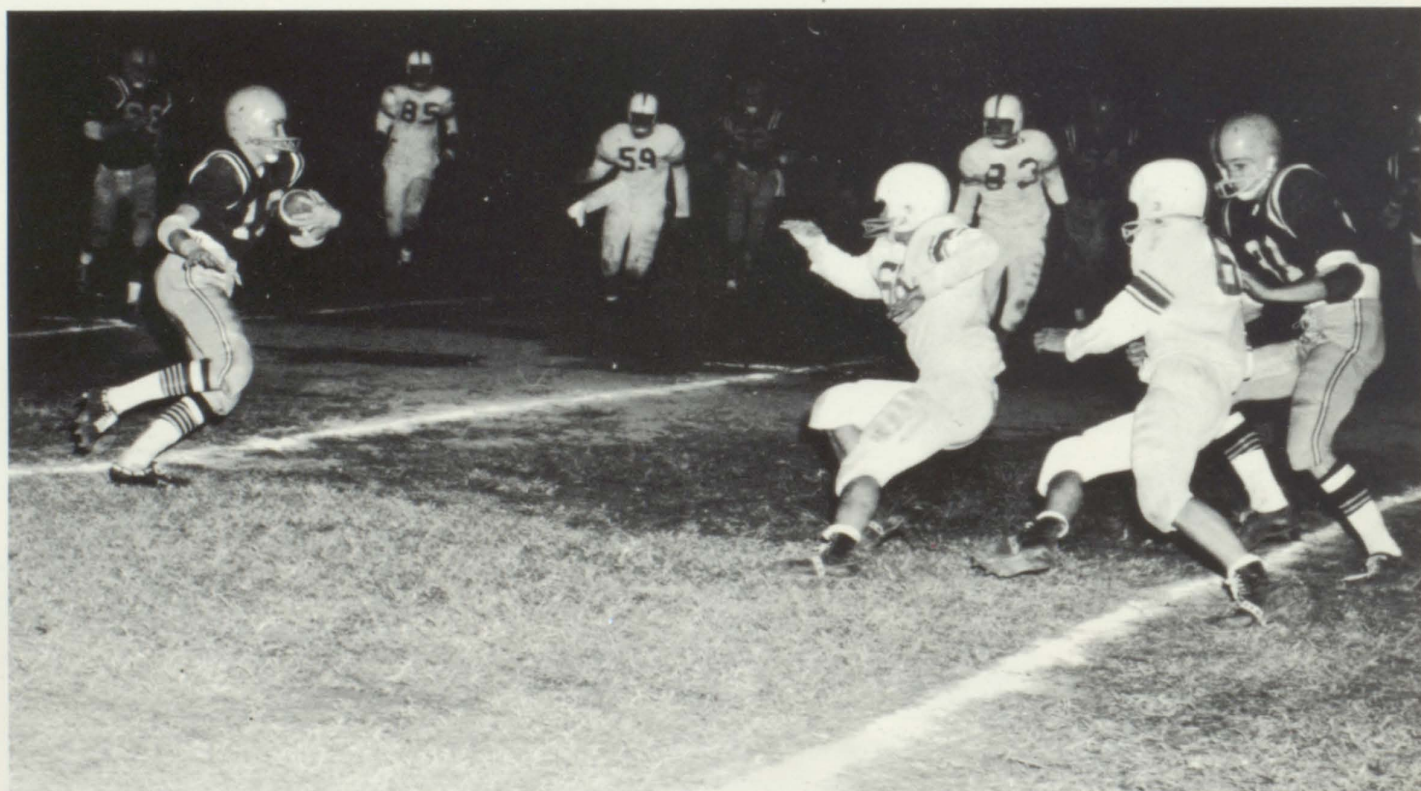
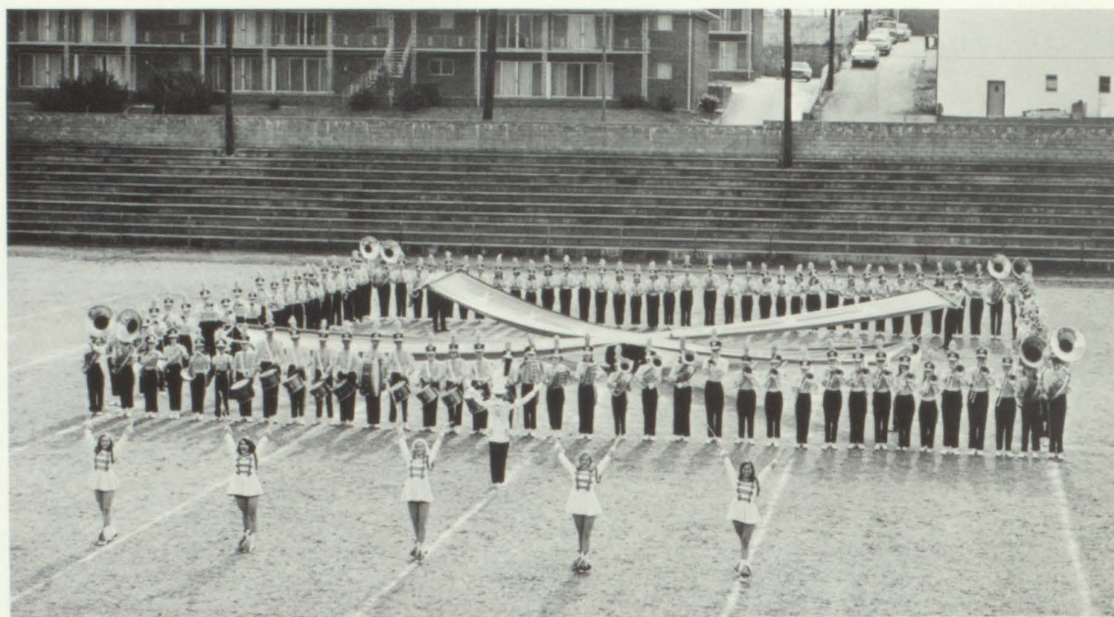


Is Charity.”

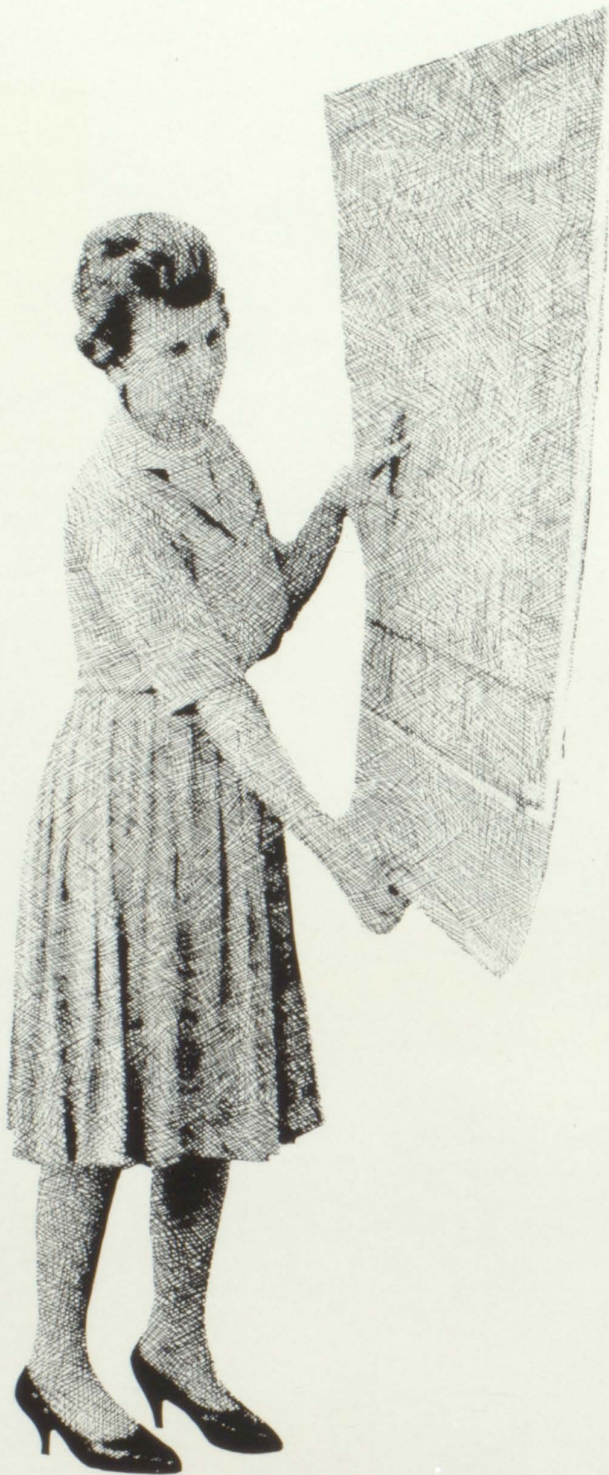


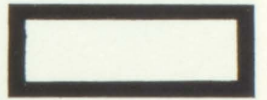

Administration Assures Promising Future

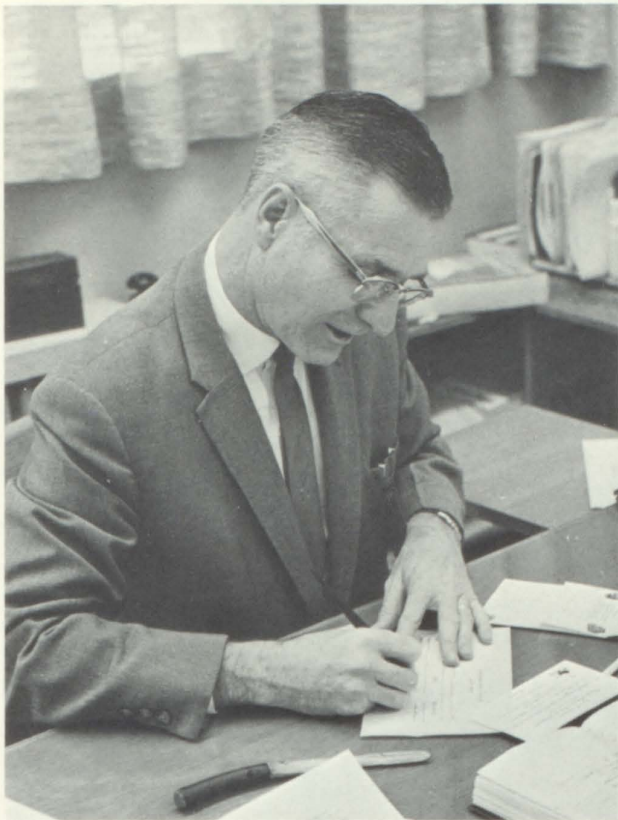

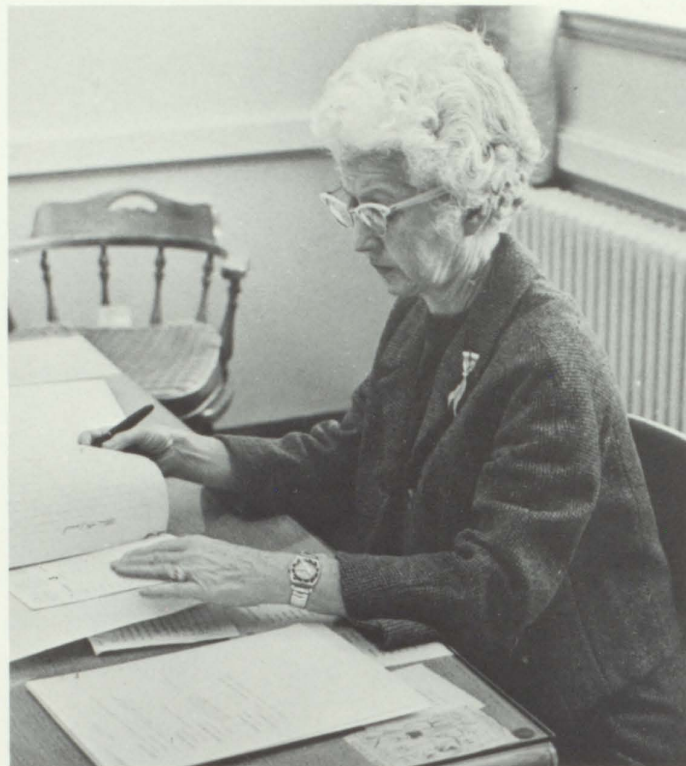

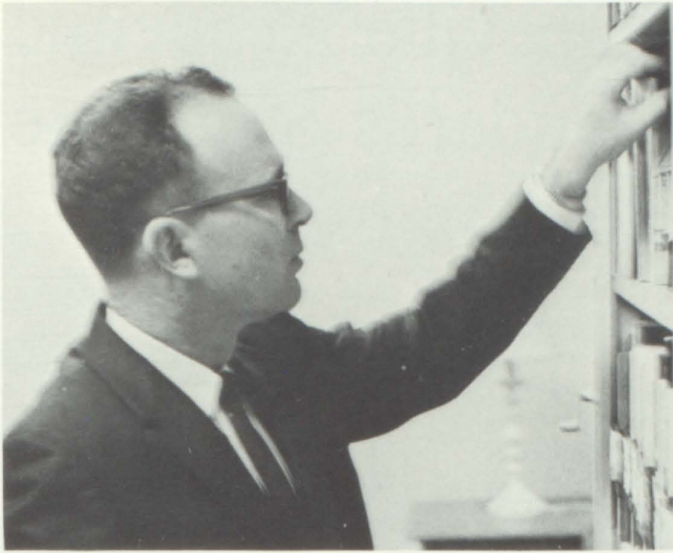

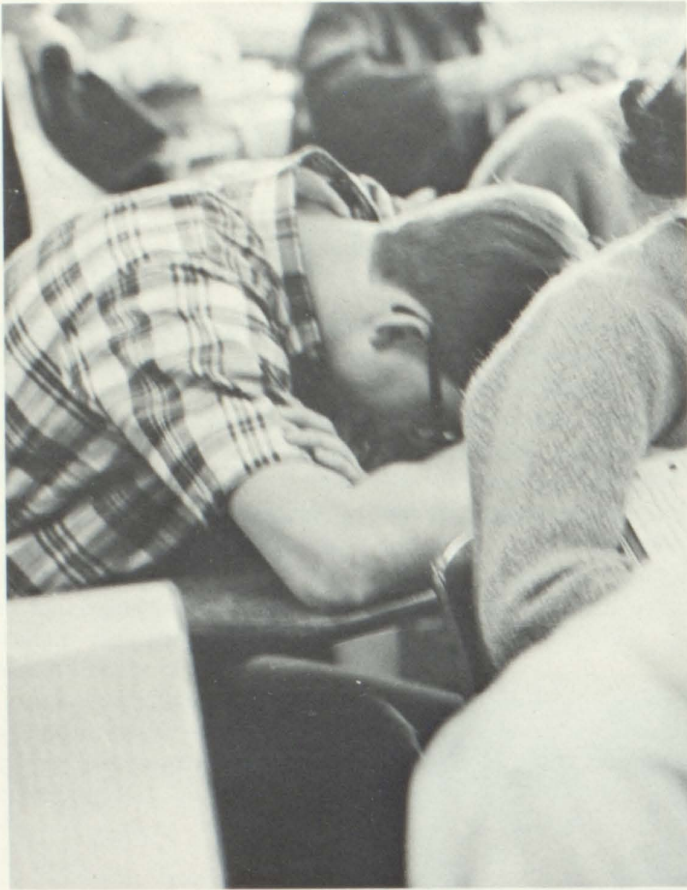

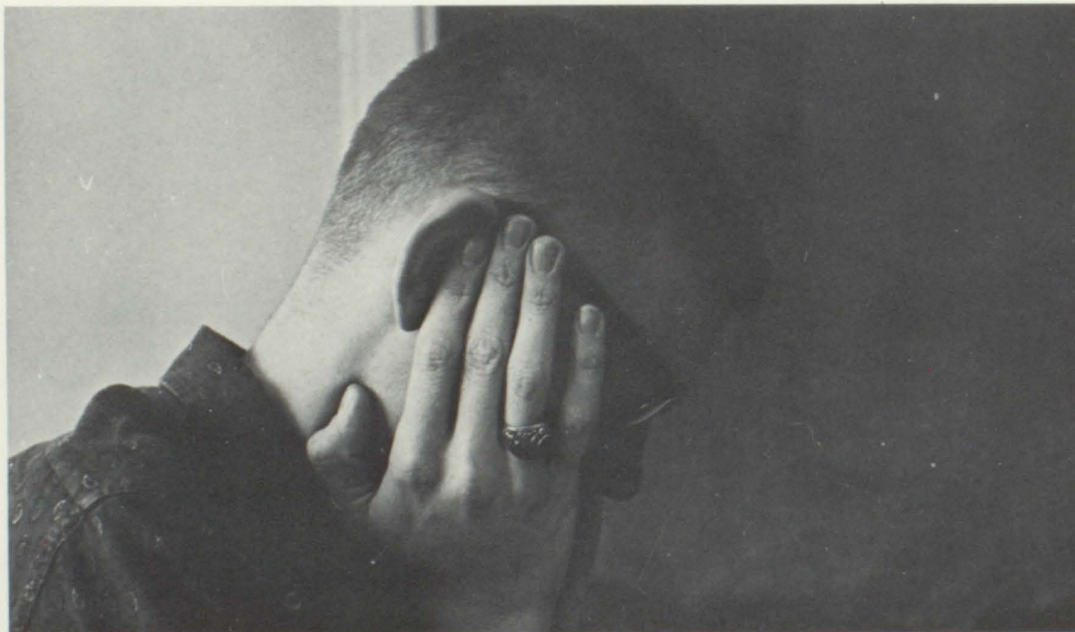
Hapeville Academic Standards Stimulate Thinking

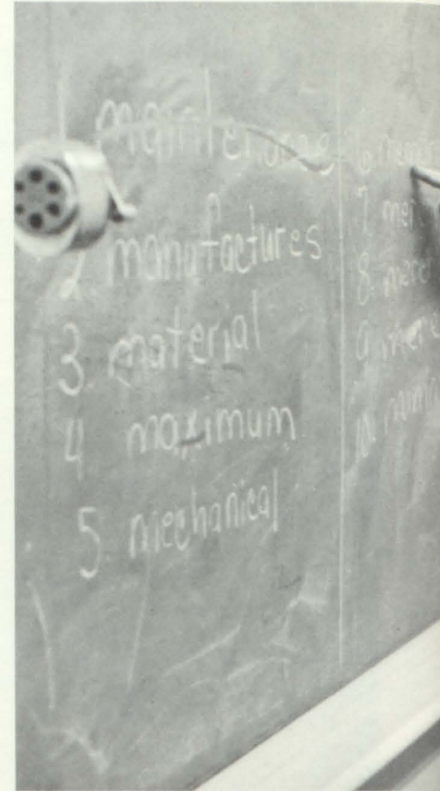


Languages Form The Basis Of Learning

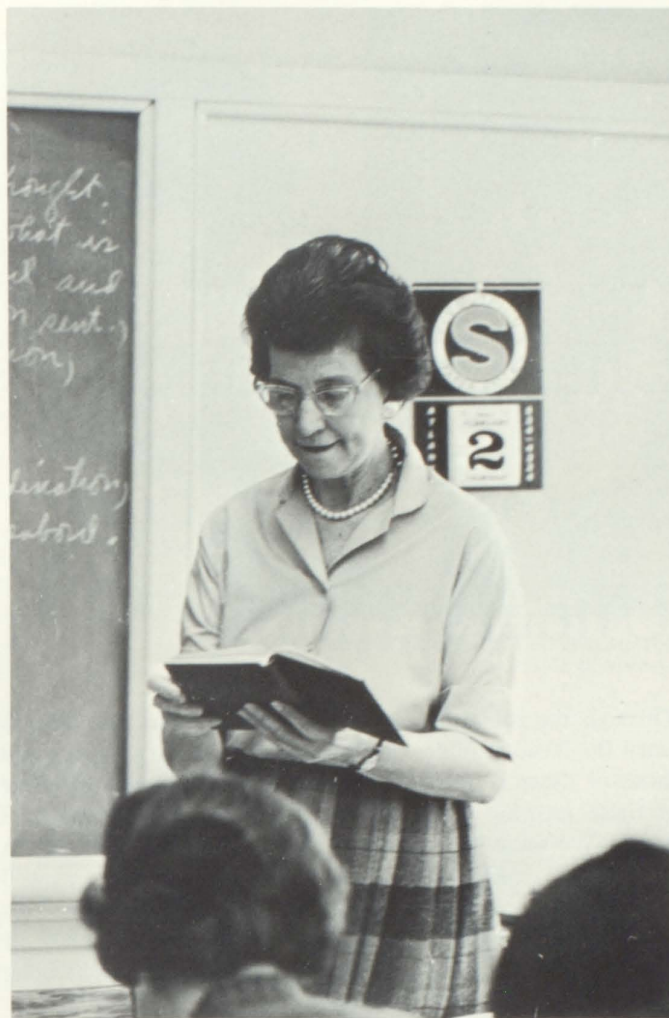

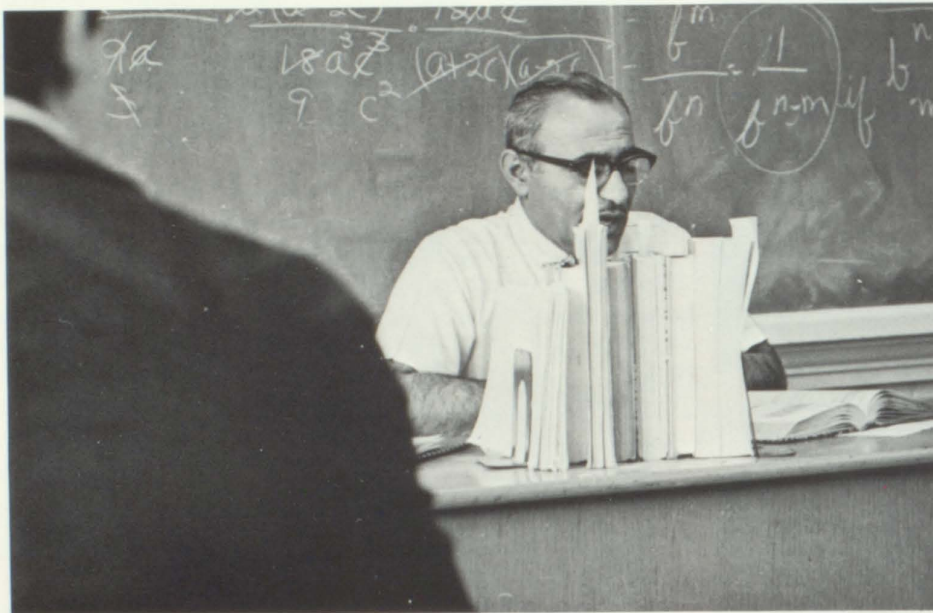


H. H. S. Promotes Advanced Math

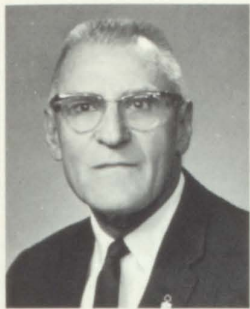

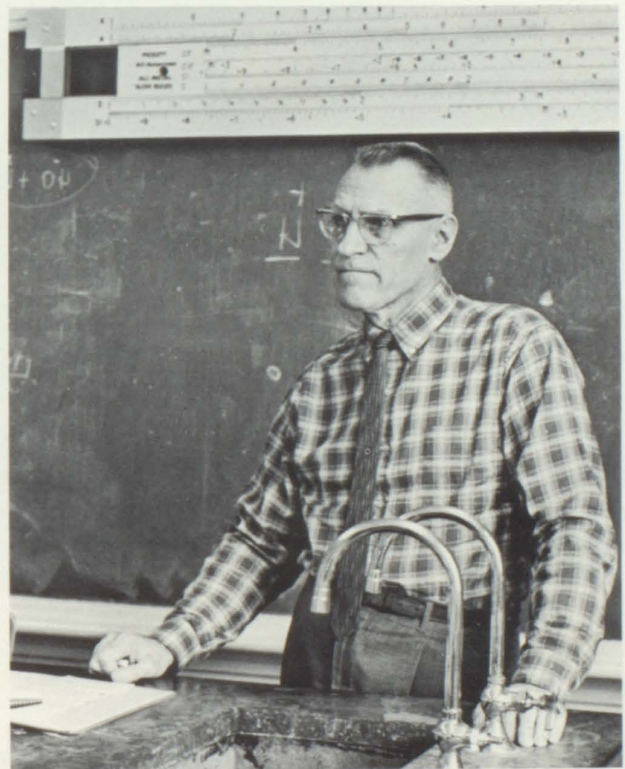

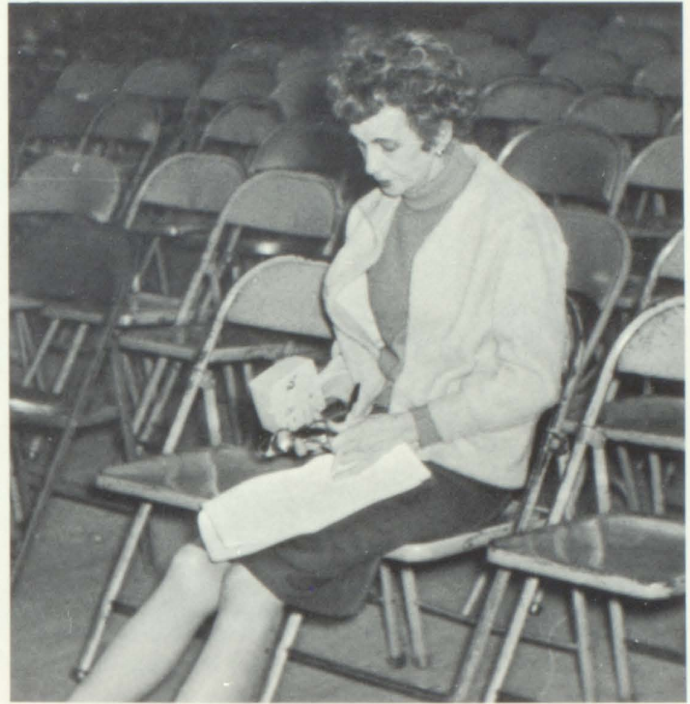

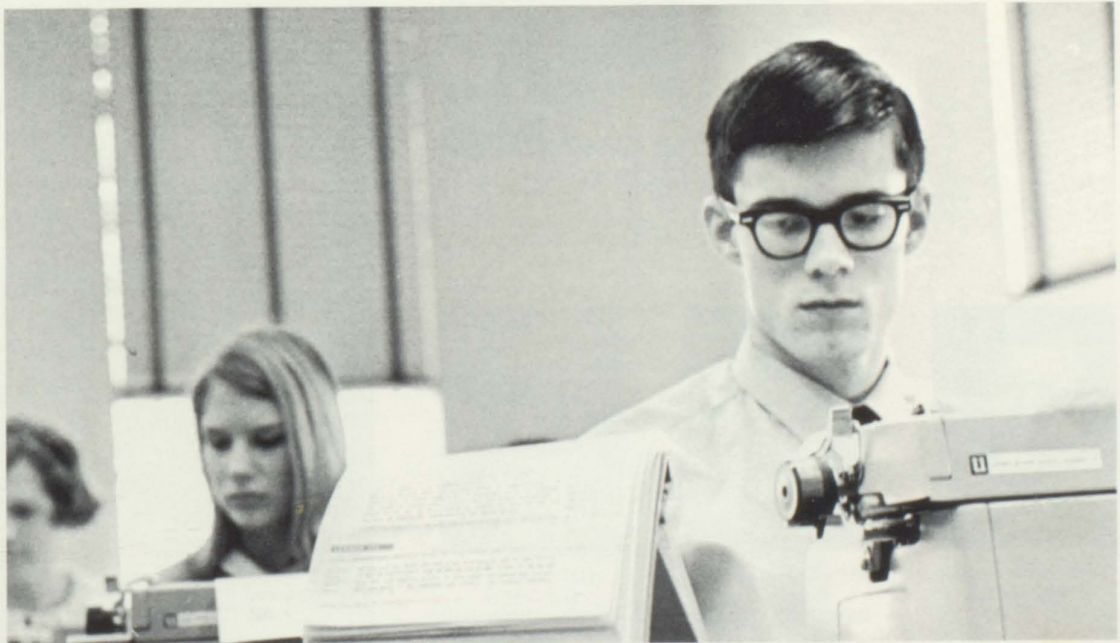

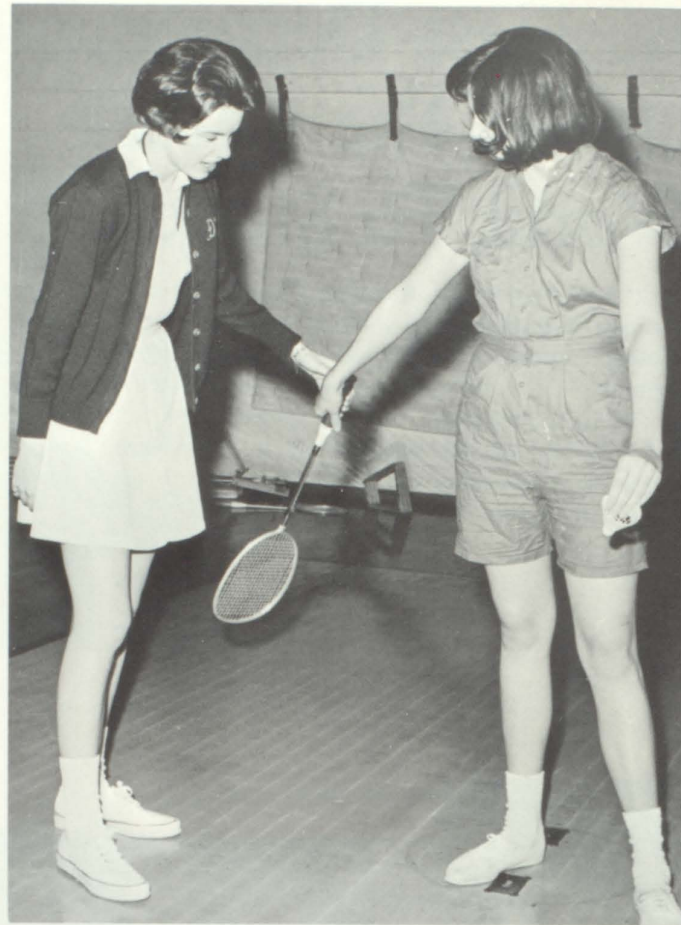

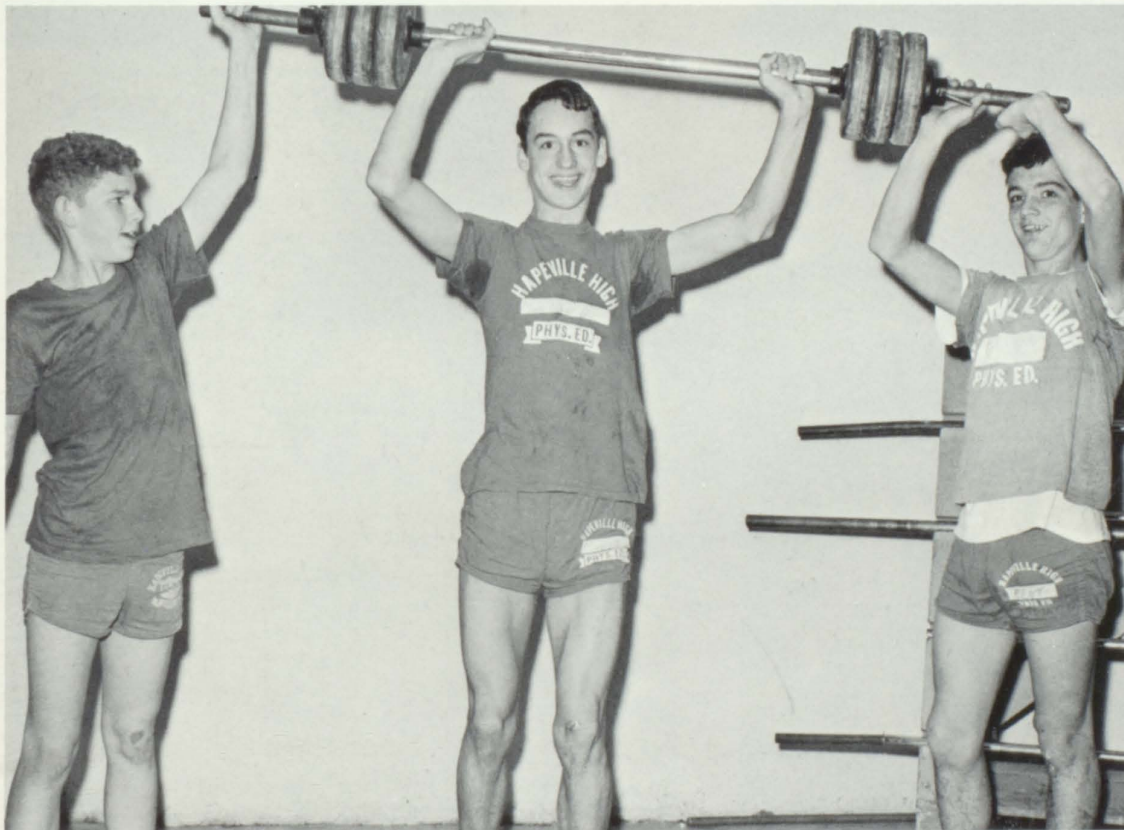

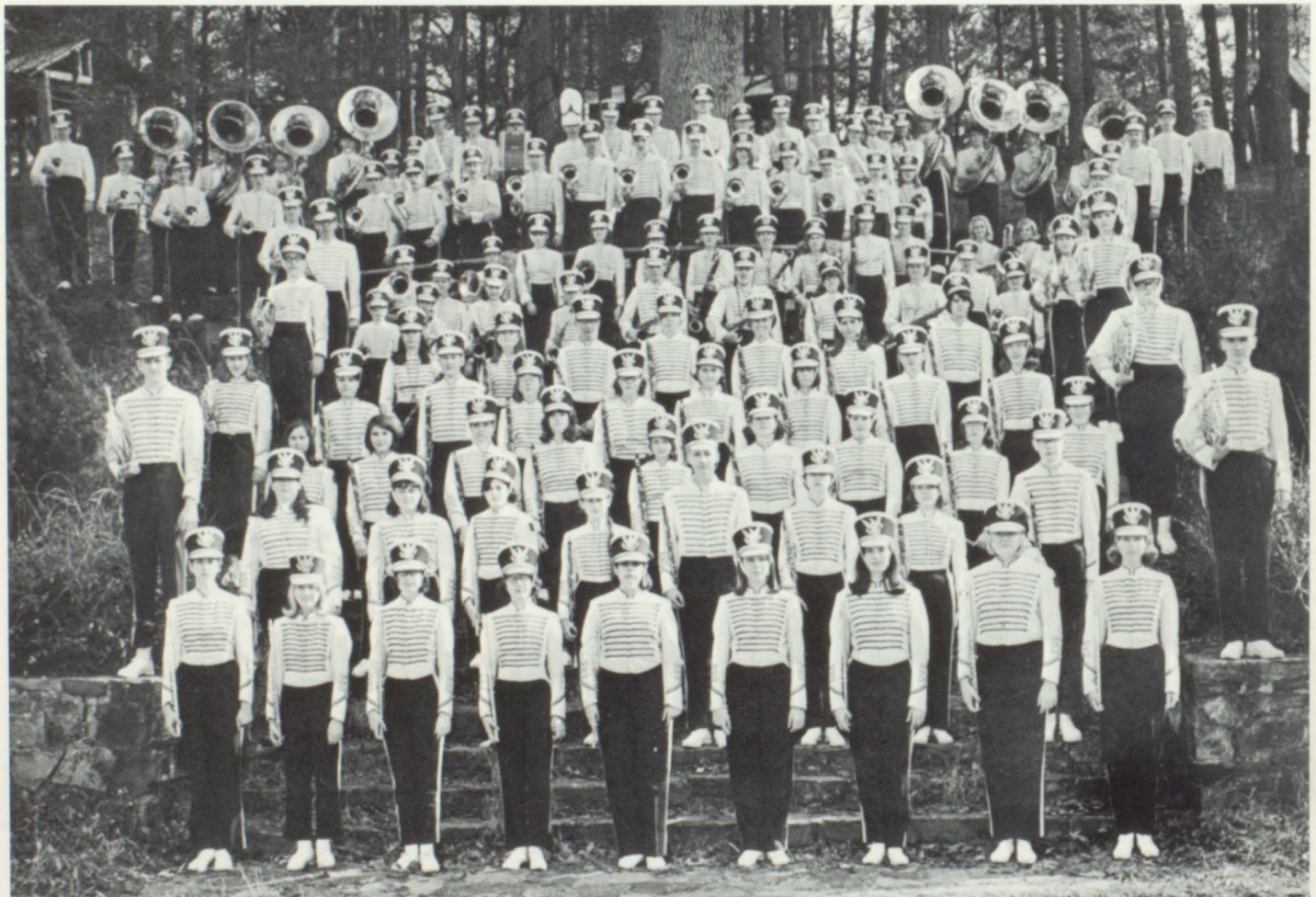
H. H. S. Band Represents Outstanding Unit

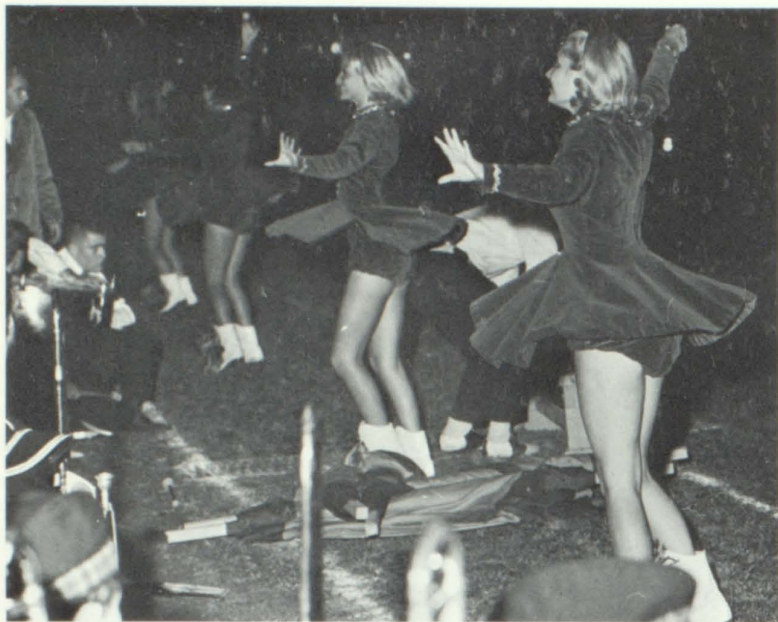

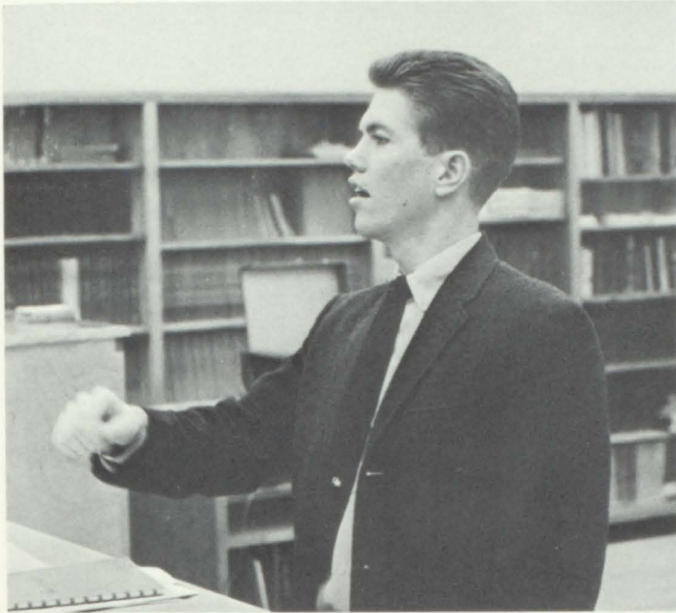

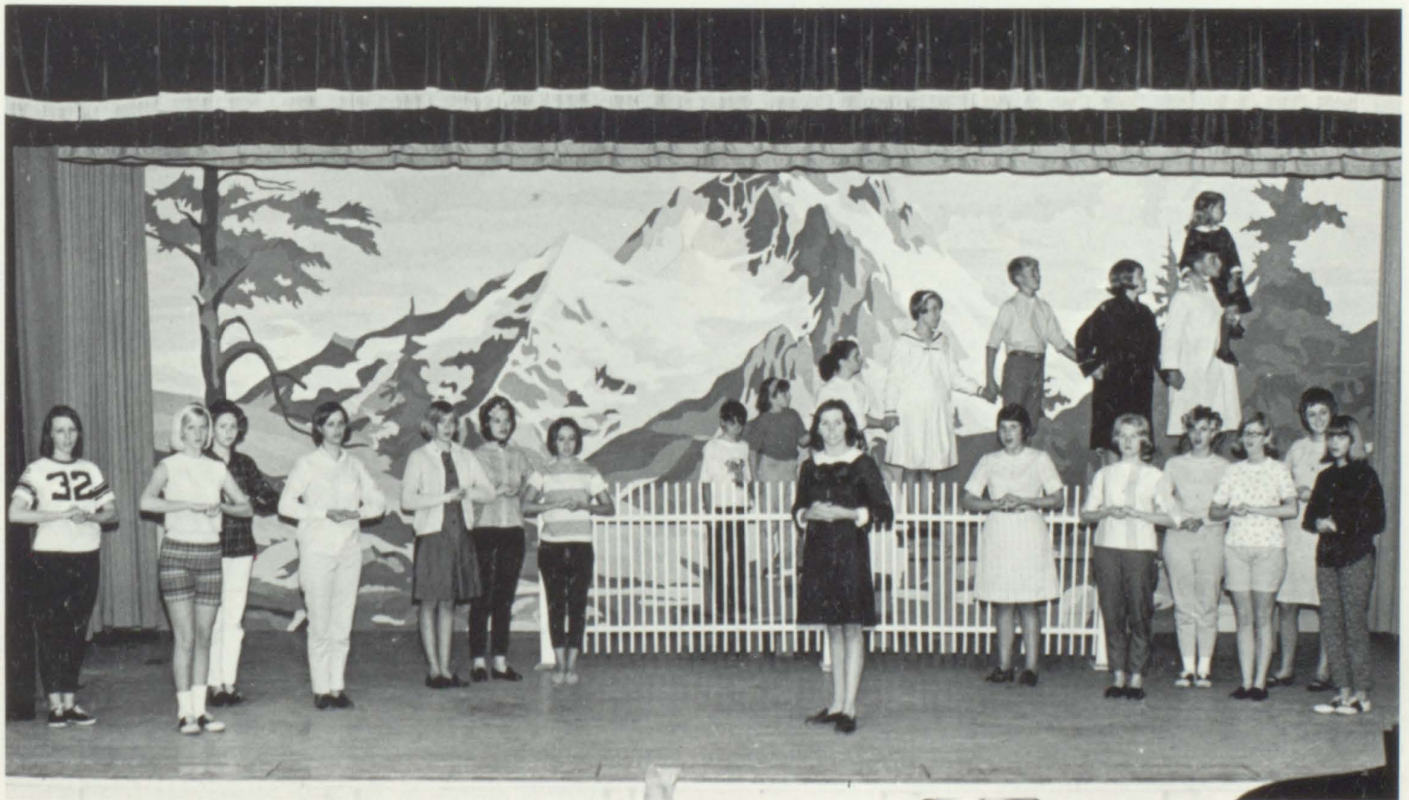

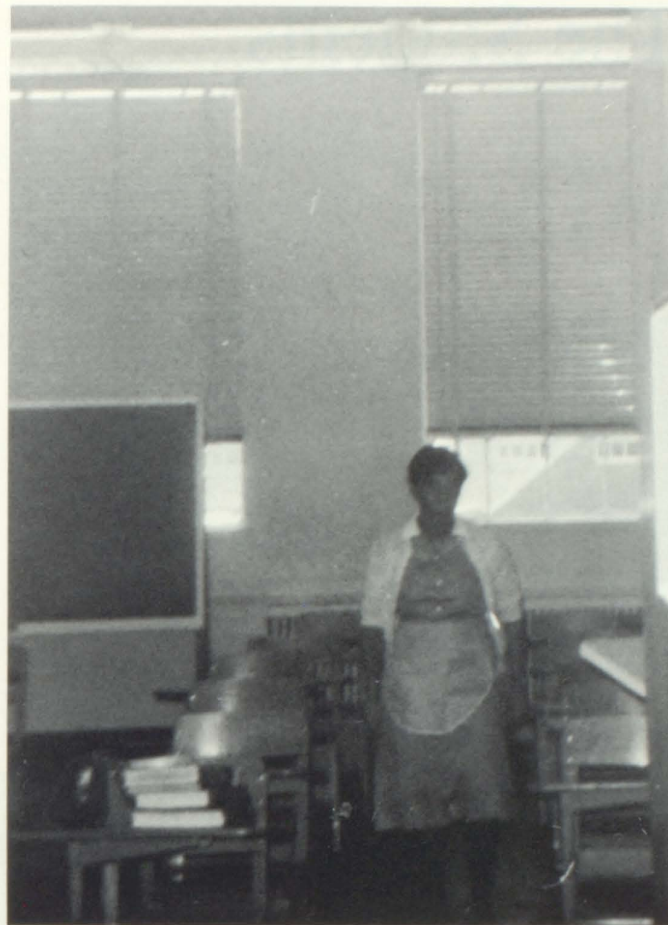

All in all, seniors of '67 have been in the thick of things on and off campus.

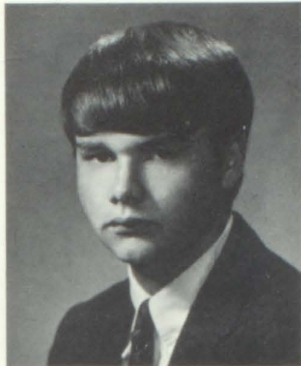

Juniors this year have made outstanding individual accomplishments: DeLong set a school record in the high hurdle and high jump; Oxford participated in the Governor's Honors Program.

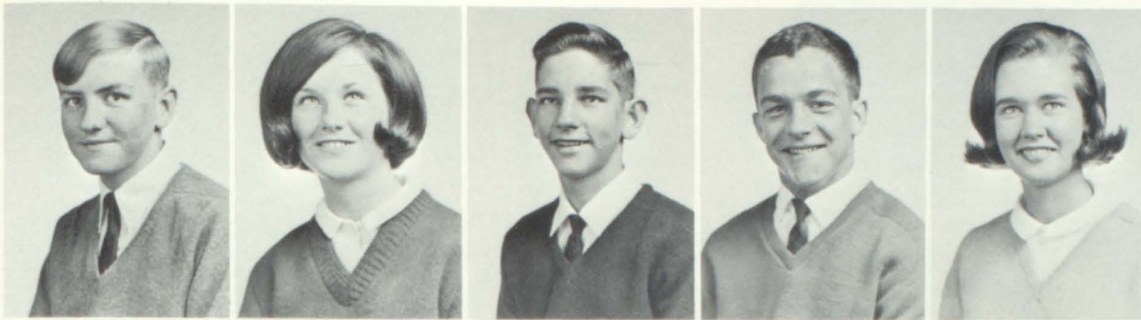

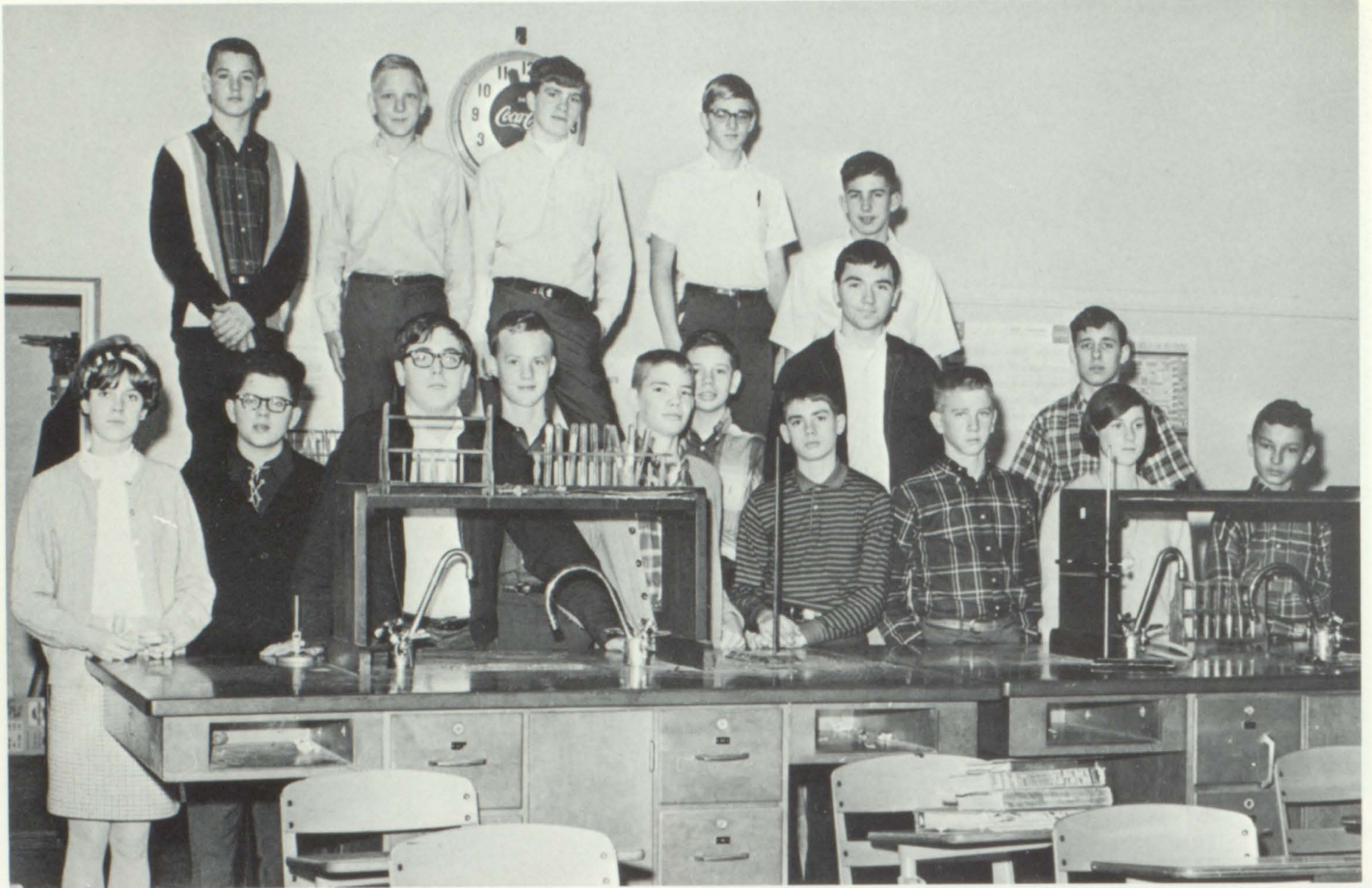

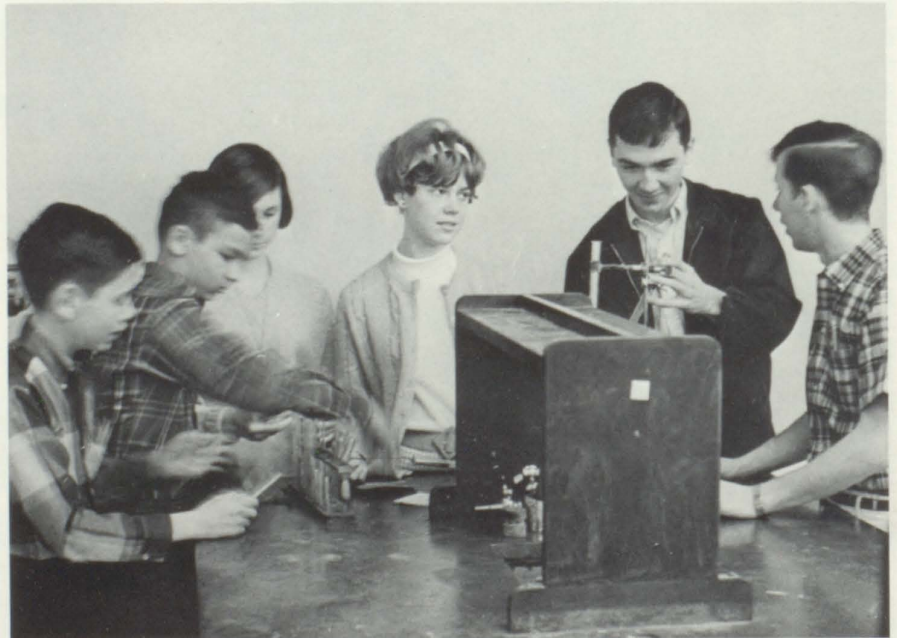

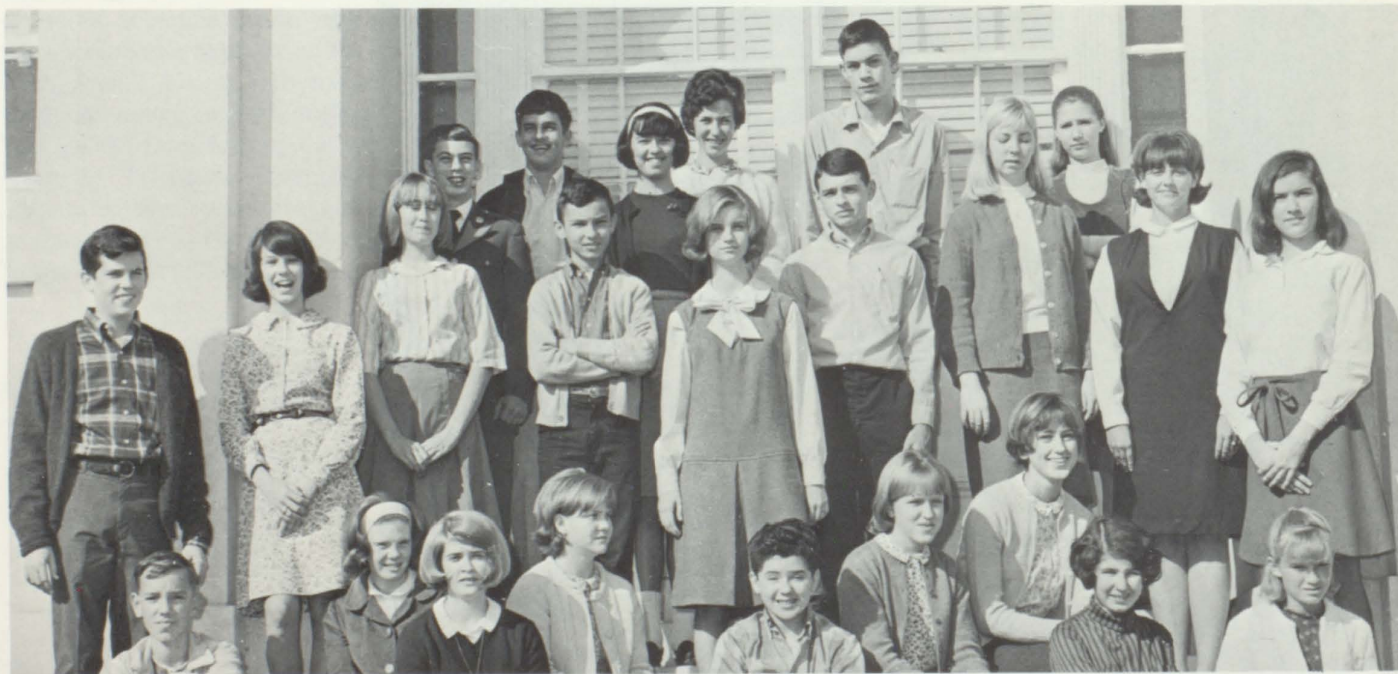

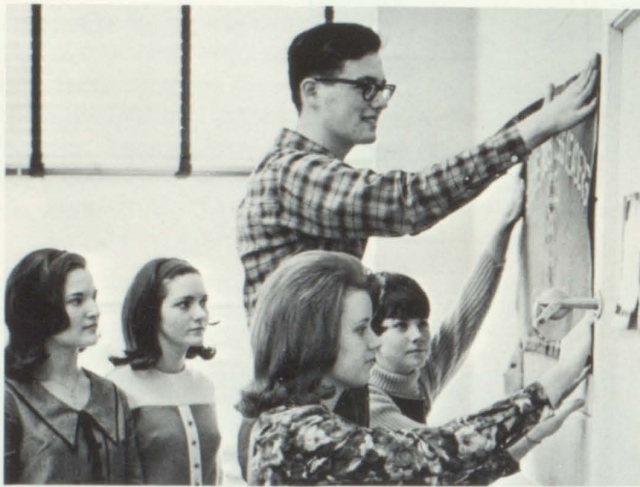


F.B.L.A. Links Students To The Community

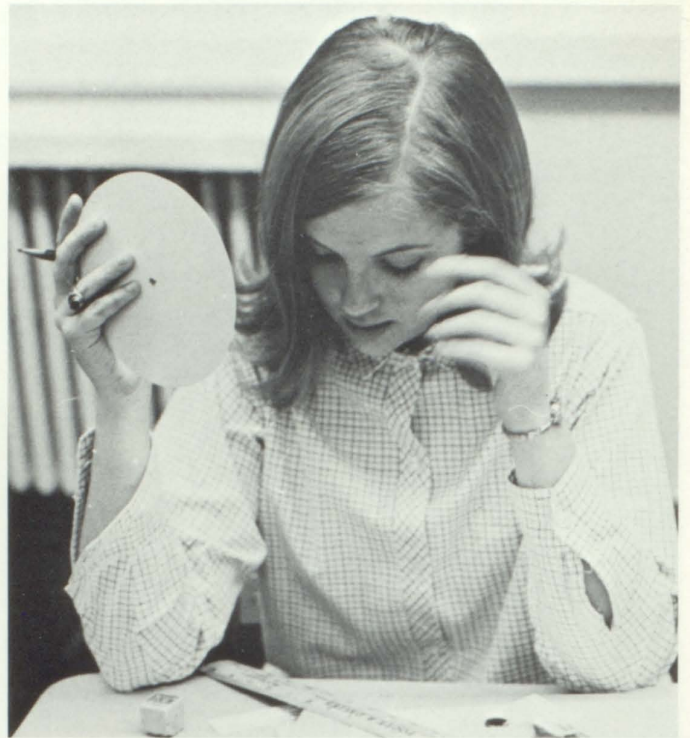

Charles Wilkes' interception of a Highlander pass proved to be one of the key plays of the game.

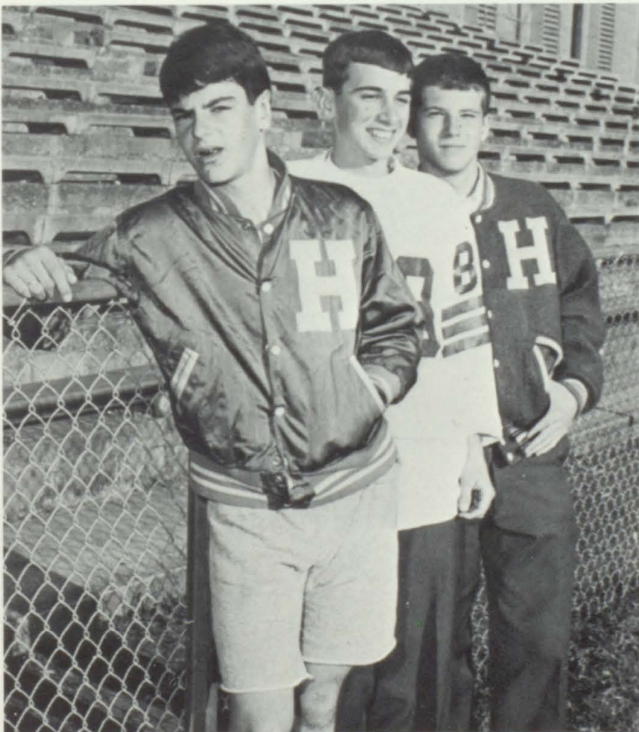

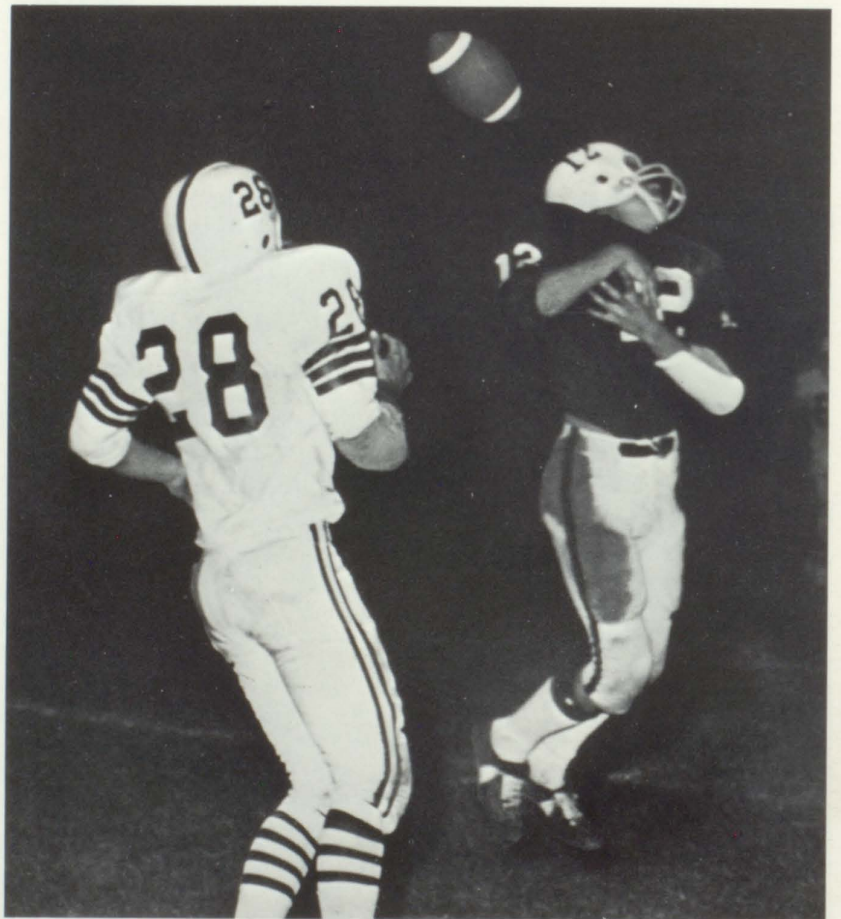

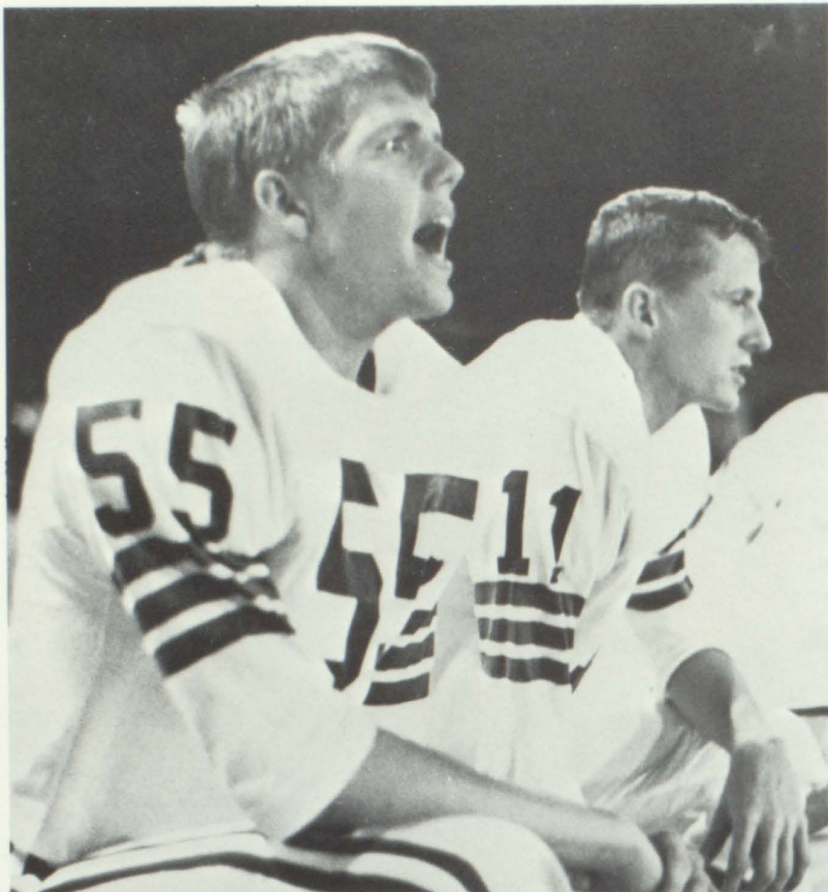

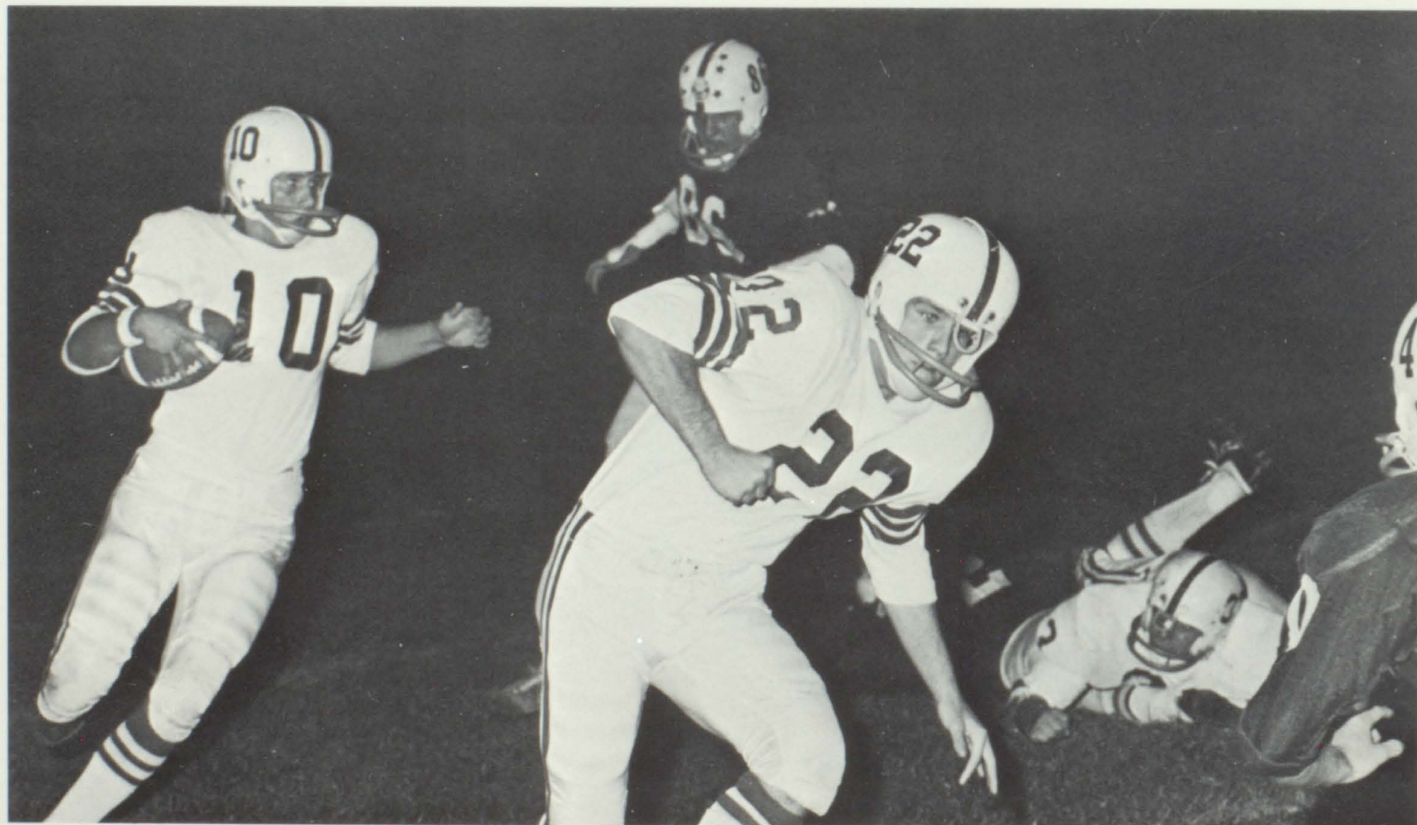

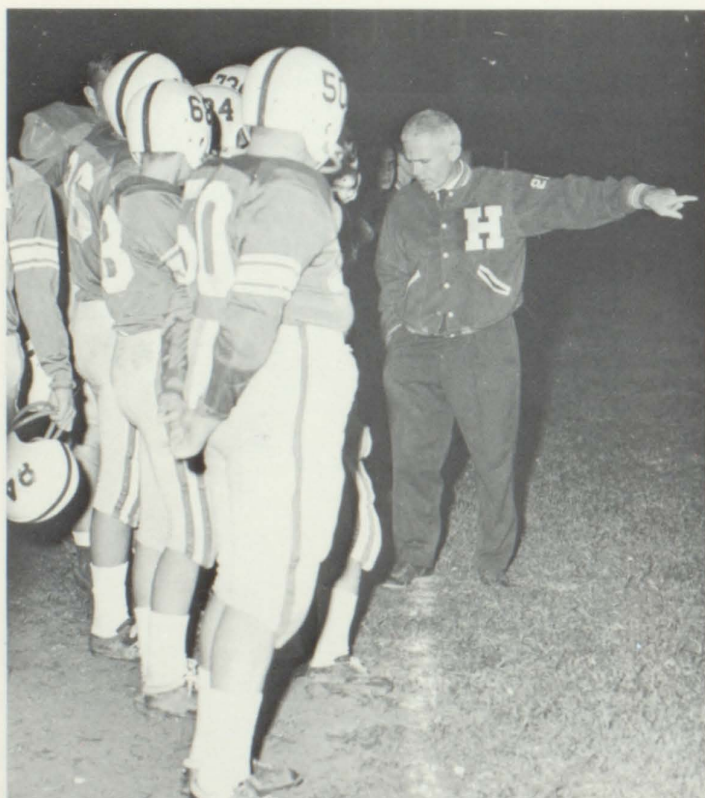




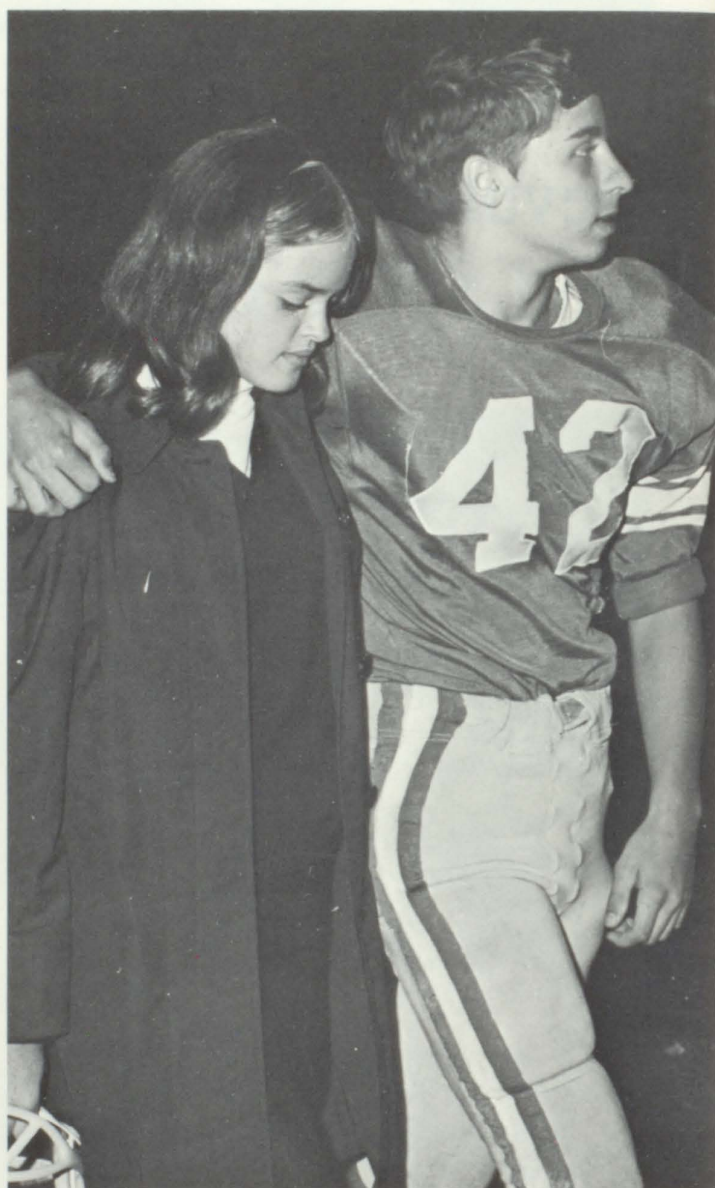

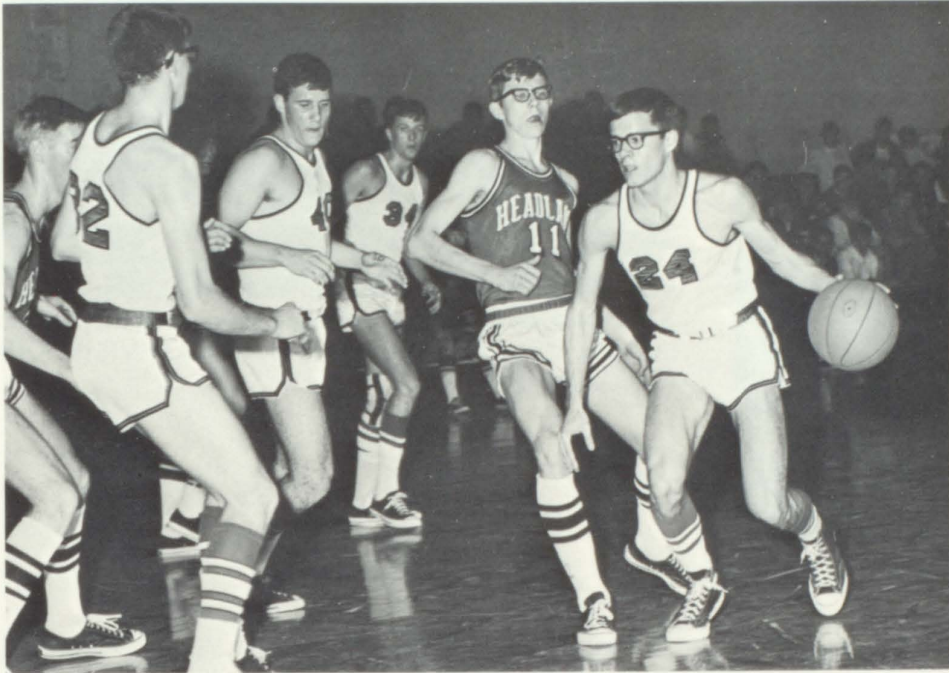

With a new school record of 36 points, Edward Goss posed the biggest threat against Headland. Anthony Kirkland also led his team to victory with 16 points.

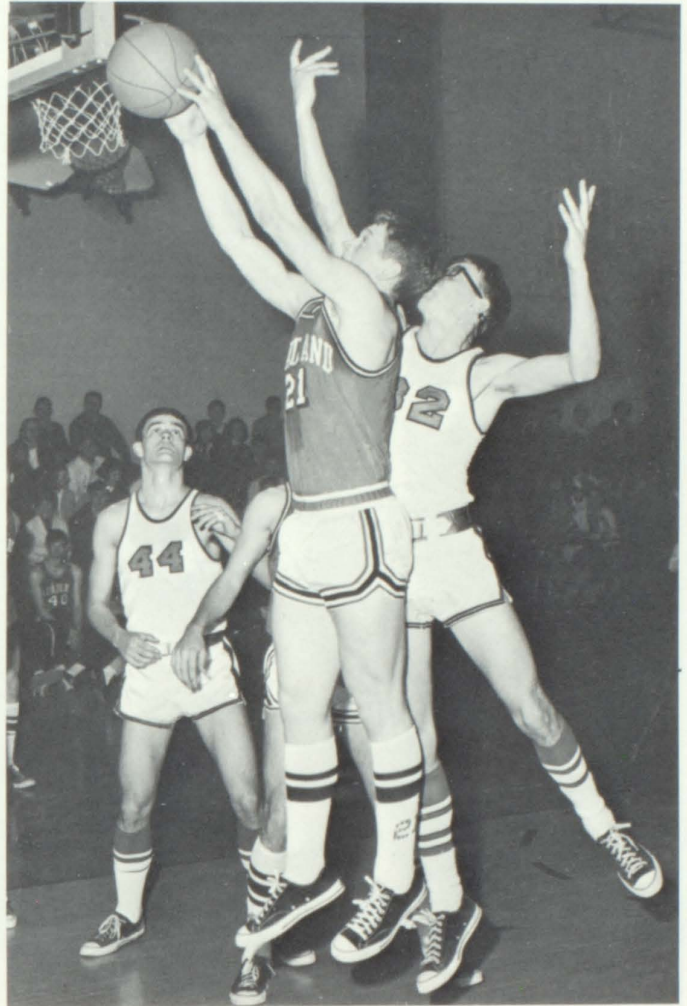
As the buzzer rang, to note the end of a hard-fought game, the Hapeville crowd victoriously yelled, “HAPEVILLE DID IT AGAIN.”

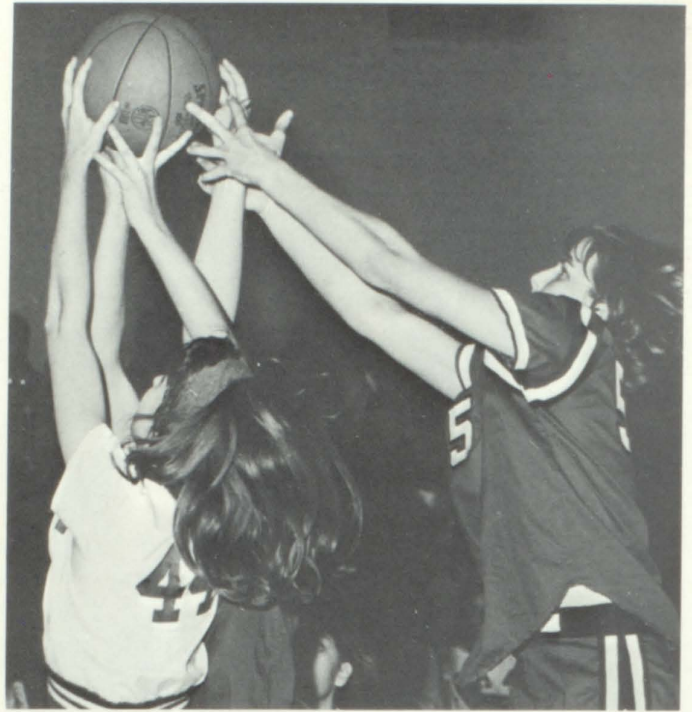

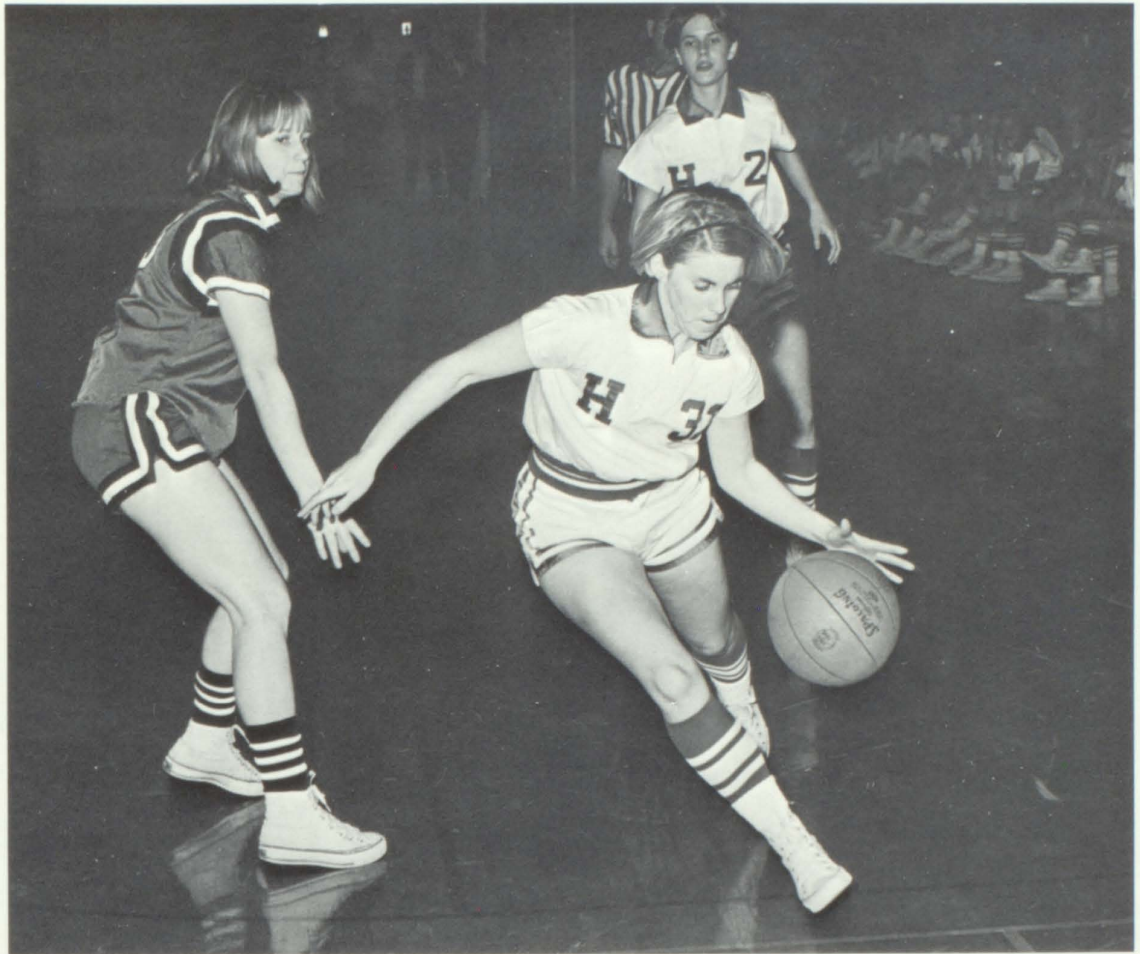

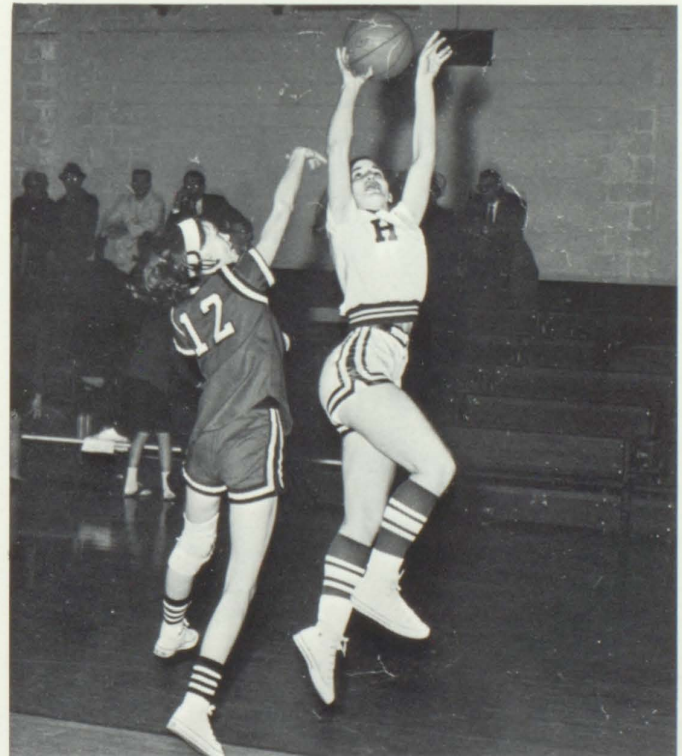

B-Team Ranks "No. One"

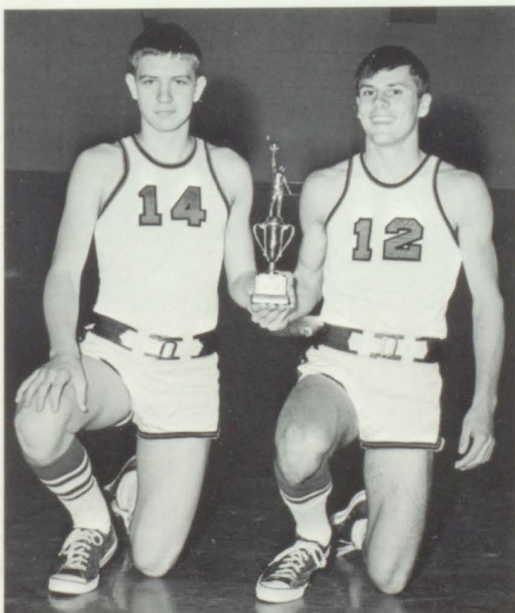

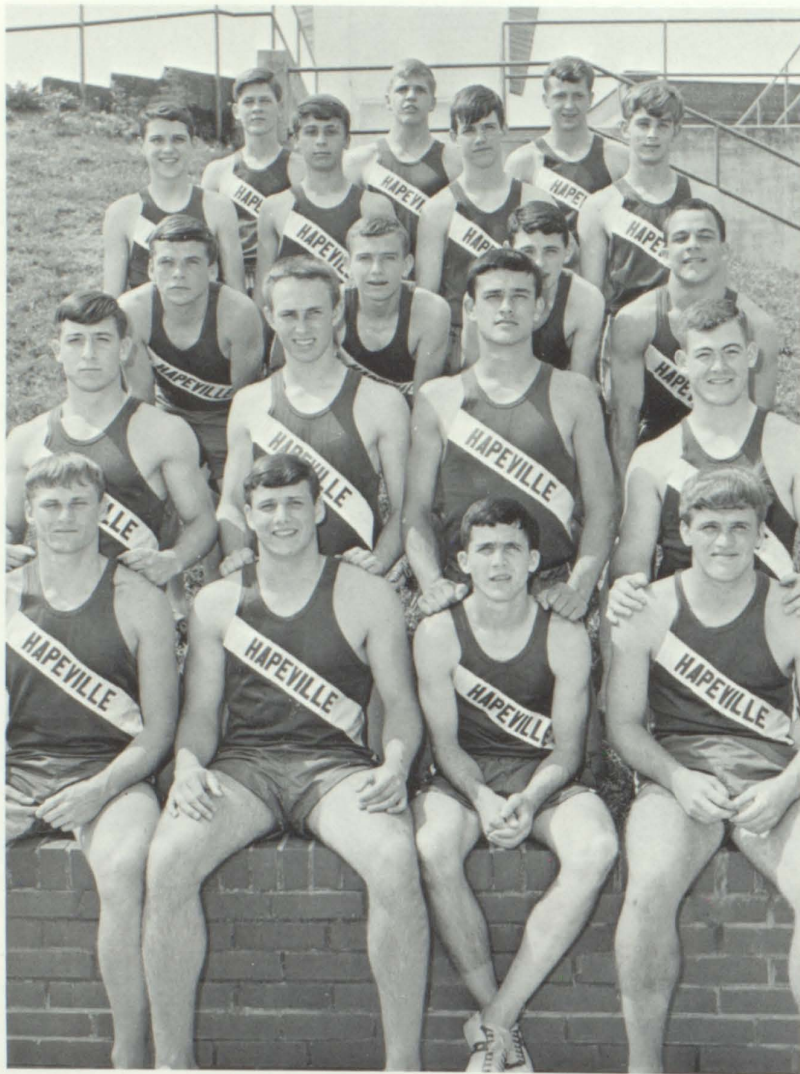

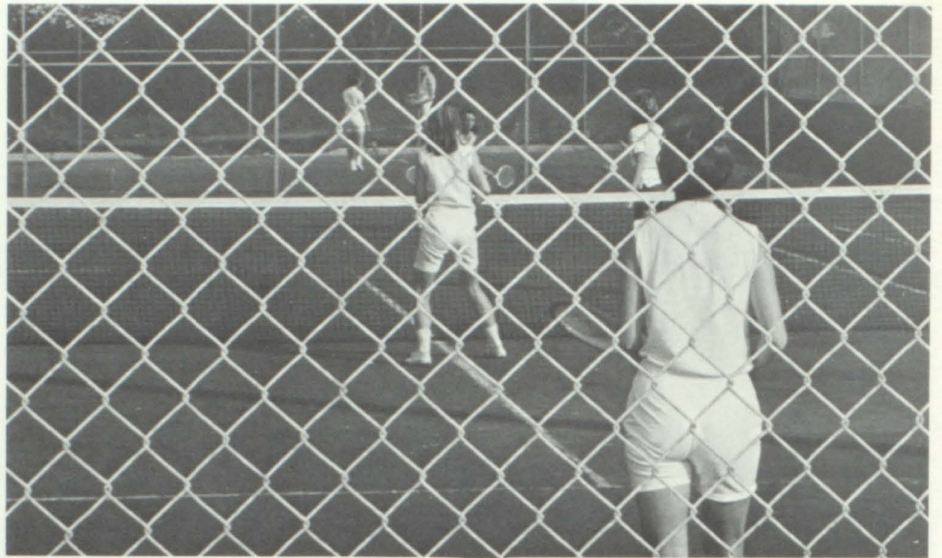

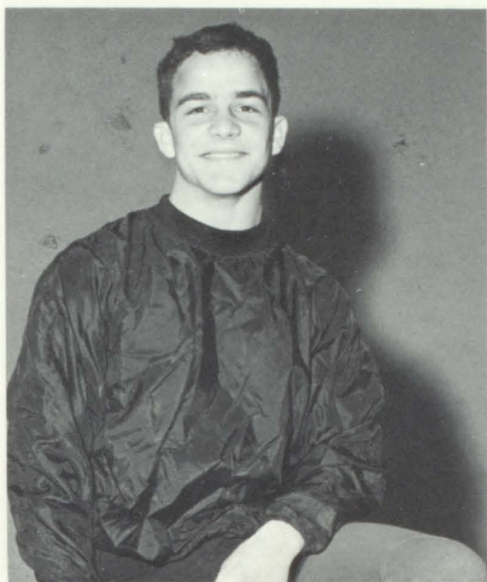

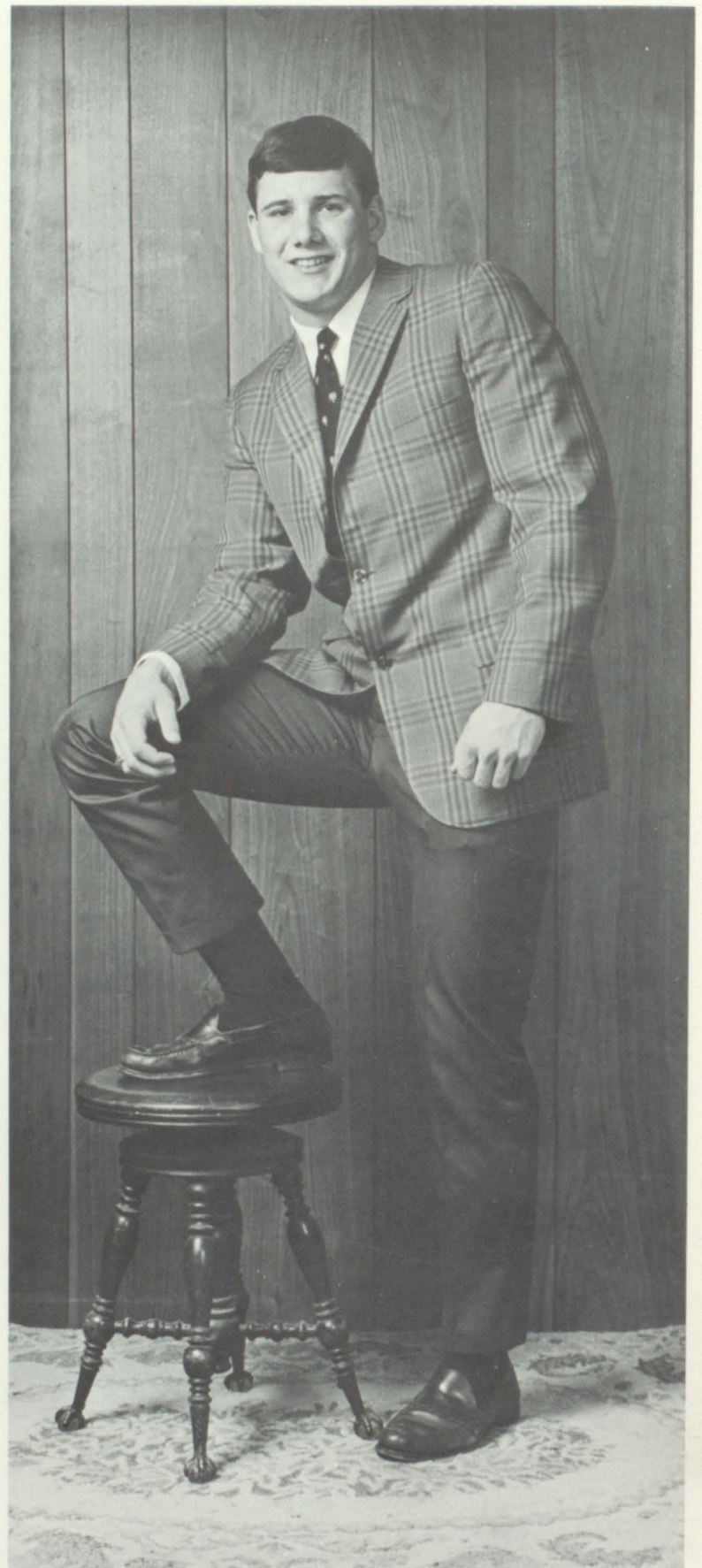
