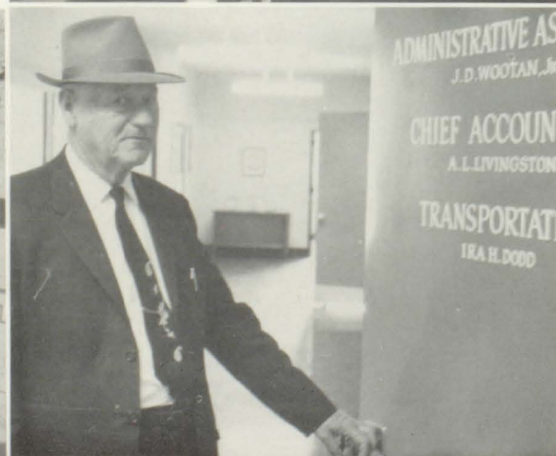


FOREWORD

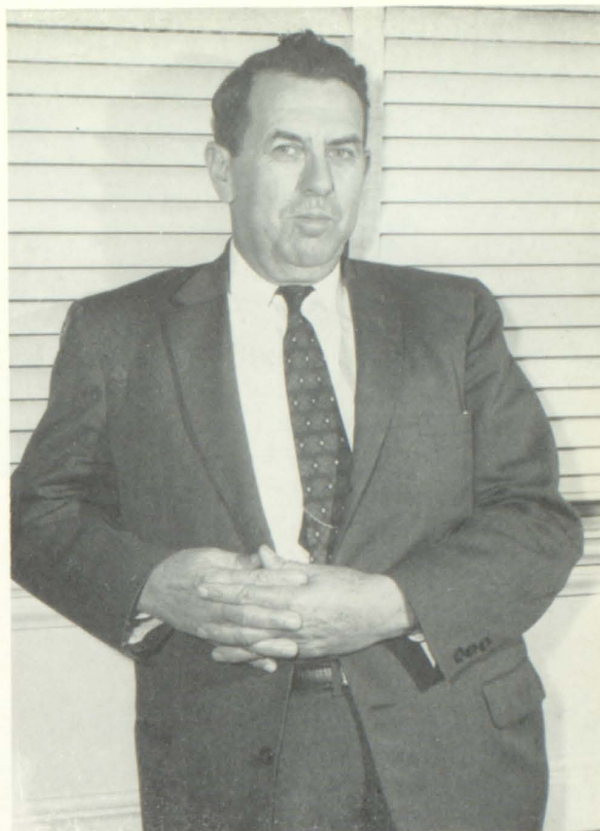

Students appreciate the counseling Miss Frances offers and the guidance in steering Student Council affairs. Achievement and ideals are her requisites for Hapeville High School.



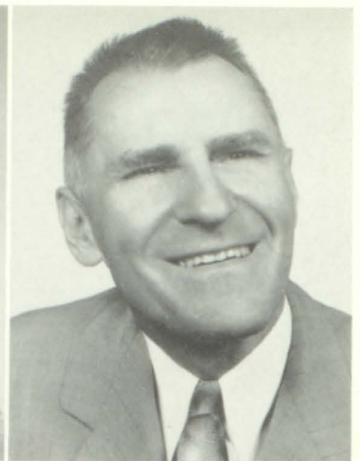

Calibre of the Folks on the Hilltop.

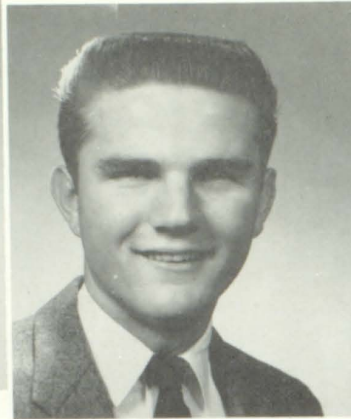

From the Top of the Hill we look back down over a high school career well spent and think, “Oh, it's a *good day!*”



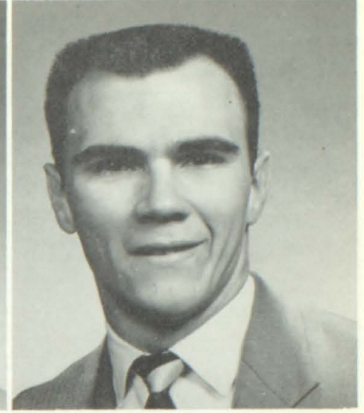

COURSES OF STUDY

The course of Study for the eight senior high schools of Fulton County is designed to satisfy student needs and interest in rural sections of the County, for industrial areas, and for urban centers, a unique geographical situation necessitating a versatile and flexible program of studies.

At Hapeville, student interests are primarily academic with an unusually high degree of interest in music and art, and in the military training program.

are a "must" for better understanding in the closeness of peoples of the world today.

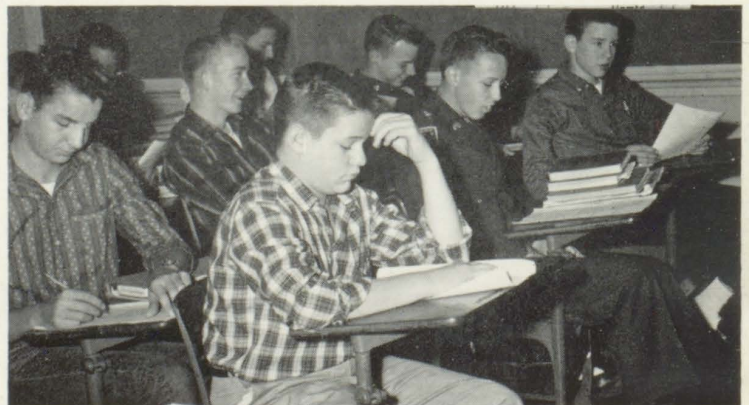

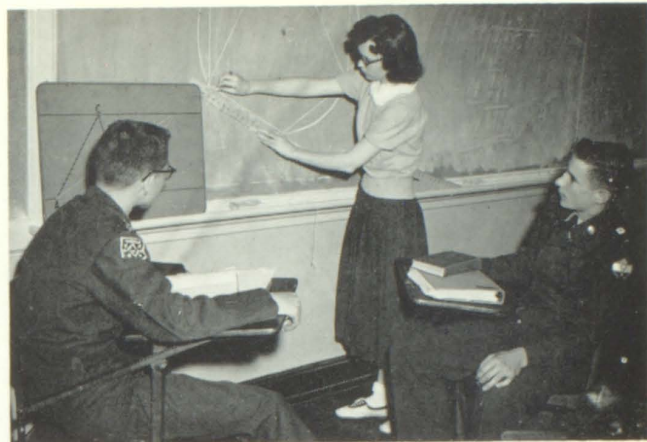

The Course of Study includes a General Course for those students who have irregularities to occur in pursuing the academic or the commercial requirements; and for those students whose formal education is terminal upon graduation.

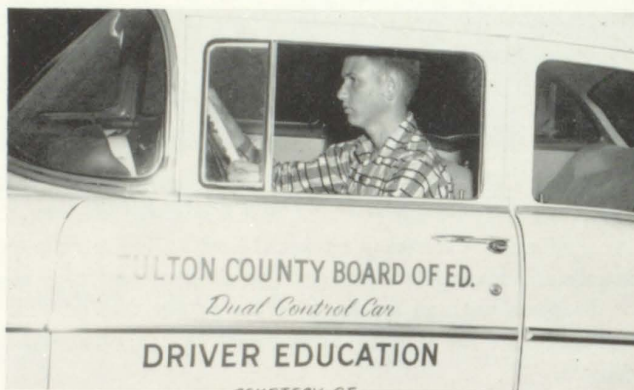

R.O.T.C. History at H.H.S.

In September, 1948, the first cadet ROTC Unit was established at Hapeville High. Holding as its object to lay the foundation of intelligent citizenship and respect for constituted authority, the Junior Division ROTC does not attempt to make soldiers out of high school students but does use military methods to achieve its aims.

The unit has received and maintained an Honor School rating from 1948 through 1956. Hapeville has participated in Fulton County Competition every year and has the honor of having won annually practically every year.

In Georgia Military District Inspection, Hapeville has received a rating of "Excellence." The rifle team of '57-'58 is rated as having "expert riflemen."

Because of changes in extending military training to the twelfth grade, the year, 1958, marks the end of ninth grade participation in ROTC. Senior participation will begin within the next two years.

The success of the ROTC Unit at HHS speaks for the excellence of its instructors and army personnel. In this respect, Hapeville has had the best.

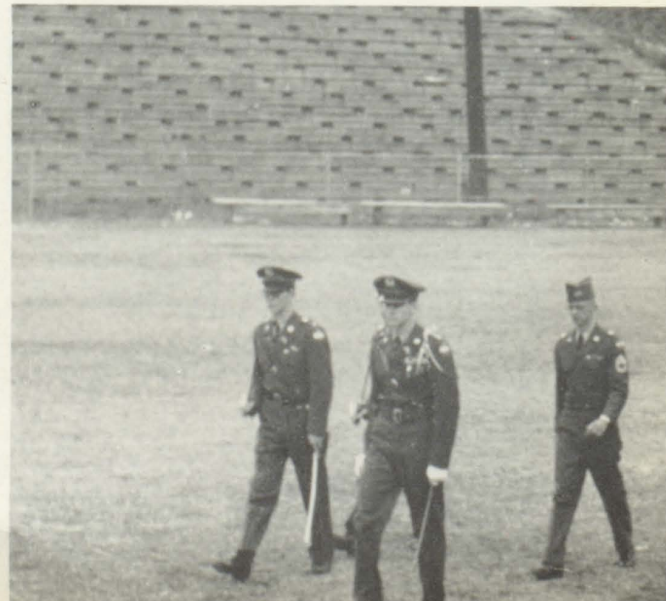

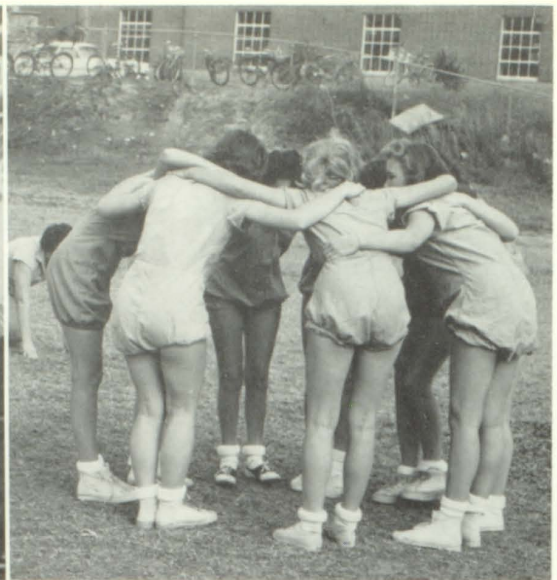

Physical Education

Physical Education is designed to meet the needs of every girl. Individual sports as well as team sports are included. Badminton, tennis, golf, ping pong, bowling, horsehoes, and shuffle board are popular with all girls. Tournaments are conducted to find the school champion in each sport. Swimming in the municipal, outdoor pool is reserved for the spring quarter. Diving and life saving are a part of the swimming course.

Development of skills is not the only goal of the program. Posture and body mechanics give each girl a chance to develop personality. Folk and square dancing as well as modern dancing provide an outlet for emotional needs and social growth. Character building through good sportsmanship, leadership, and responsibility are also important basic aims. Cleanliness and personal responsibility in keeping gym uniforms and shoes clean are another part of the program. Seniors who elect Physical Education serve as "helper," often filling in as referees or managers of equipment.

Physical Education aims to provide each girl with a variety of leisure time activities, to help her become skillful in various team sports, and to master techniques of individual sports for her own physical benefit.

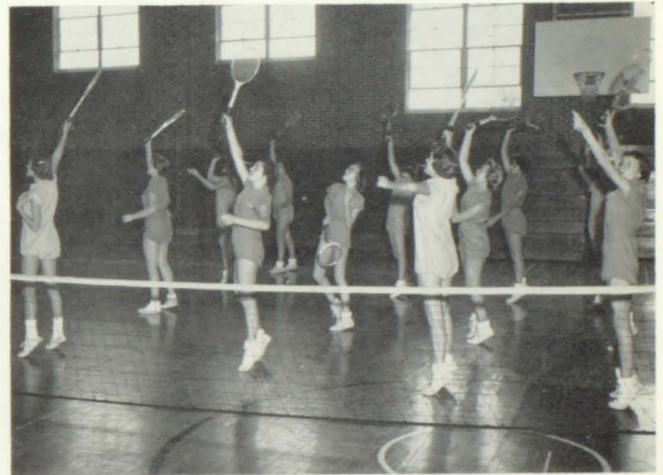

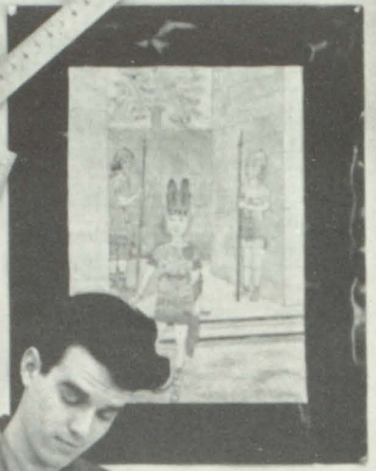
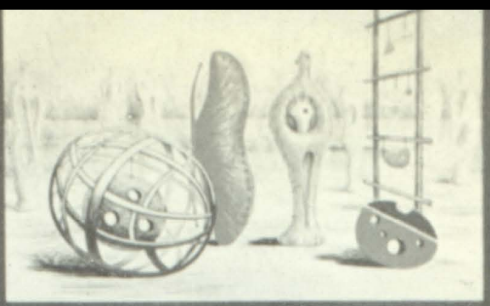

For any student's aspirations or creativity, there is a club activity.

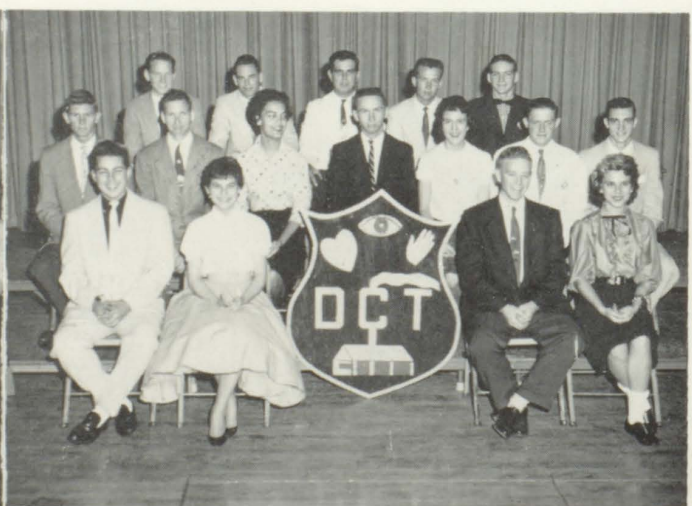

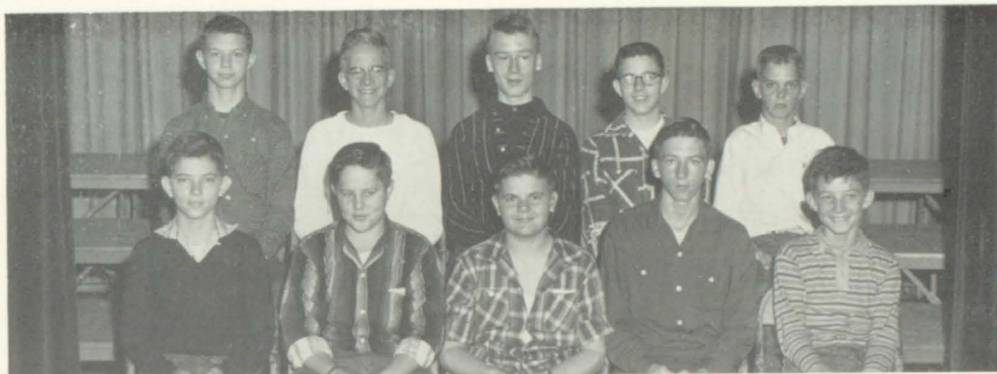


Chem-Club

The Staff has published the usual ten issues, tri-weekly and has attempted to maintain a quality newspaper.



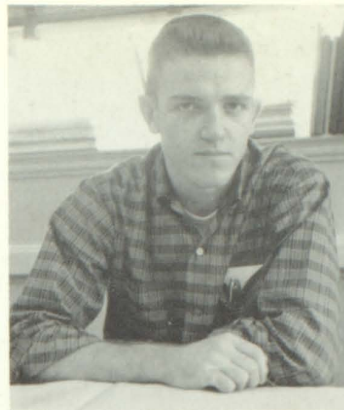

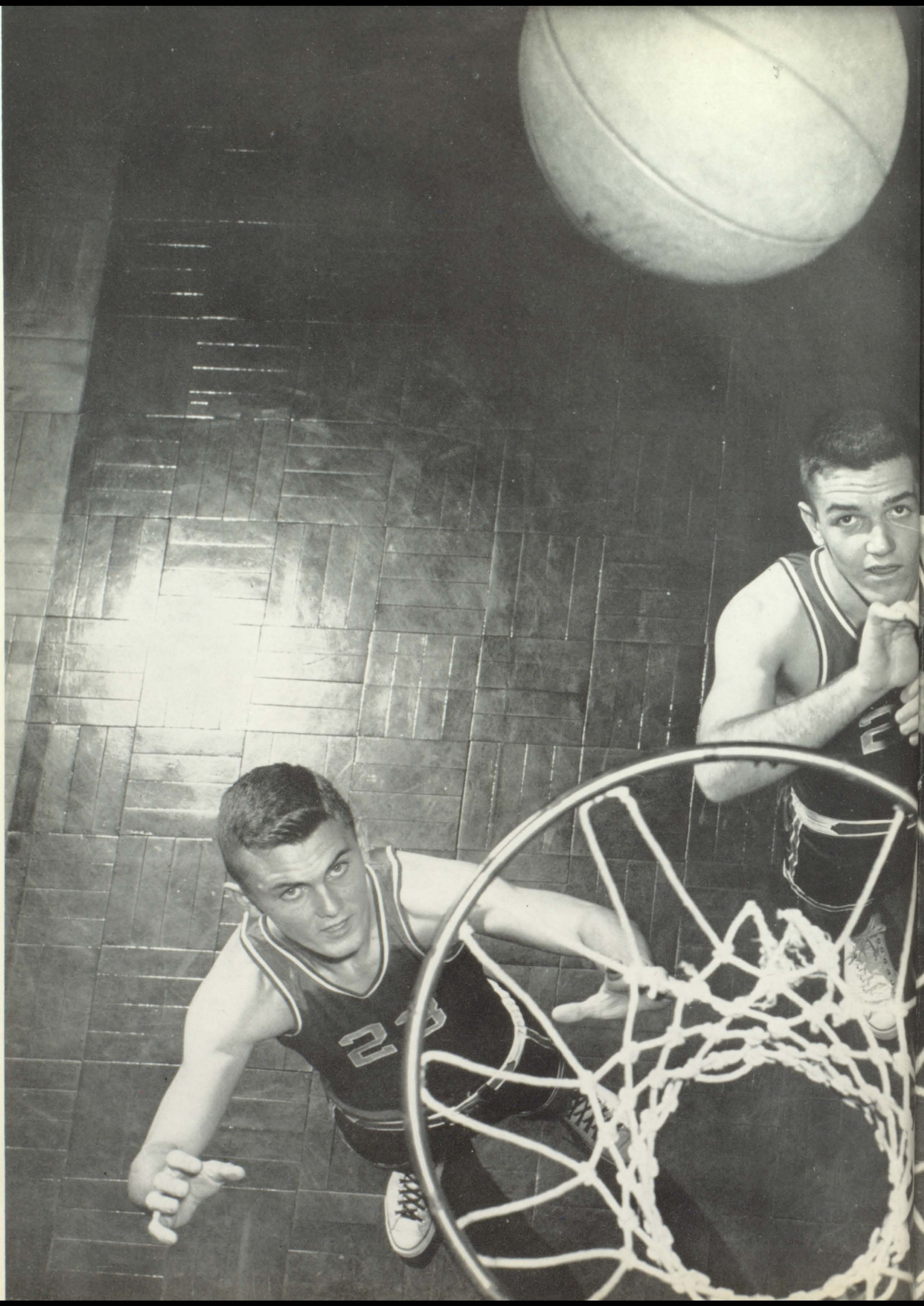



At present, Coach Brewer supervises the entire Sports program and concentrates his coaching only with Varsity football.

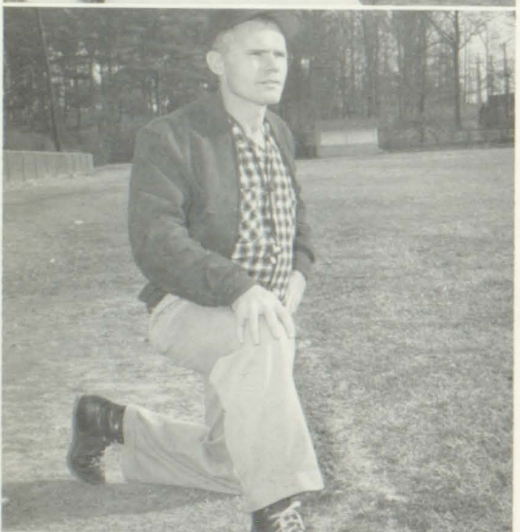
Classroom interests are chiefly chemistry, physics, and general science. His hobbies include his "ham" radio and Uncle Sam's Navy.

In the classroom he is strictly social science. His hobbies are his family and his cabin in the mountains.



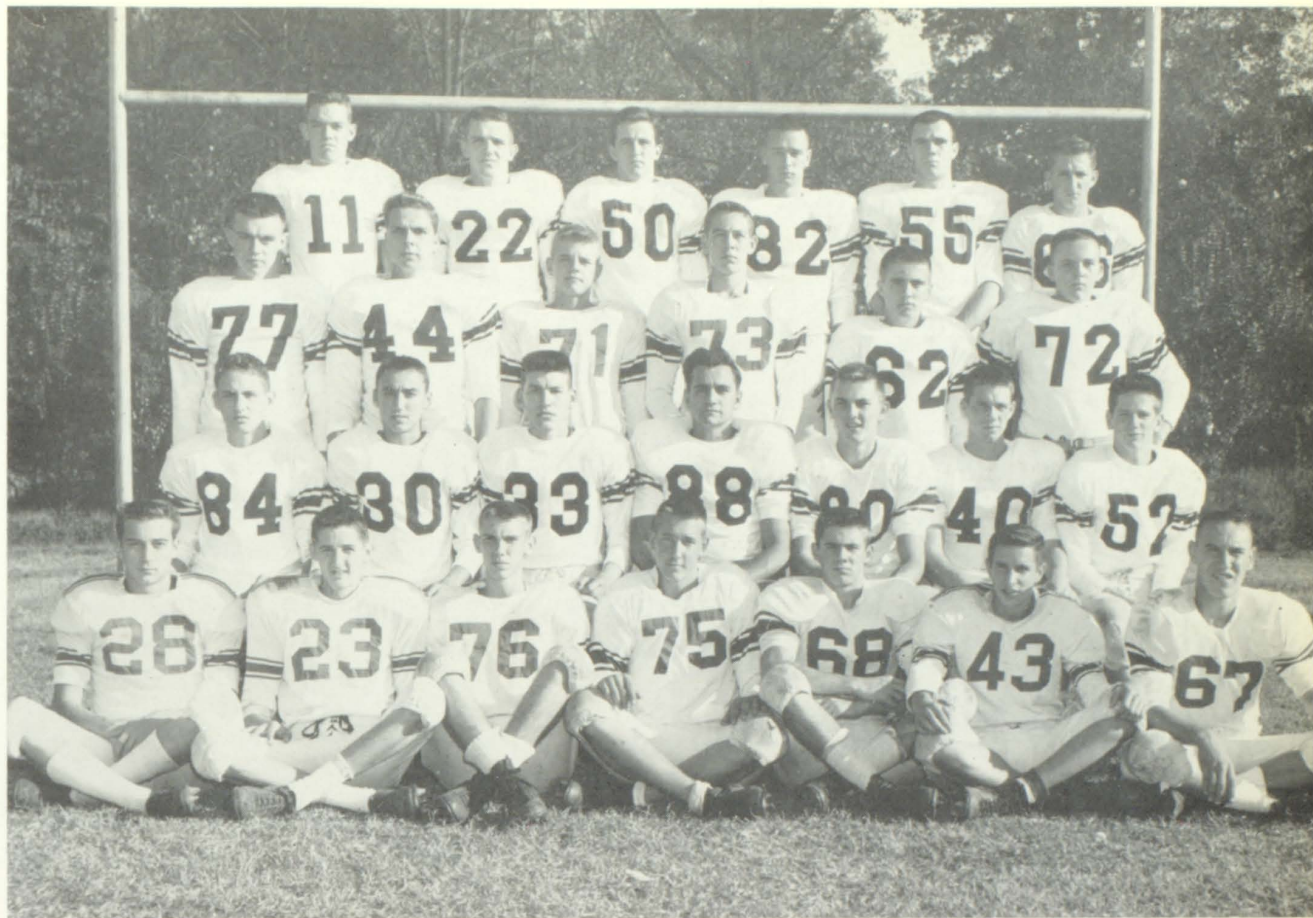

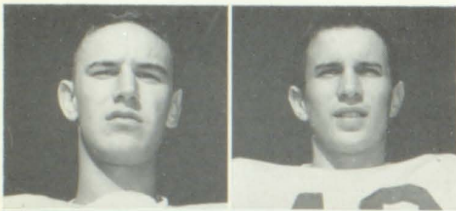

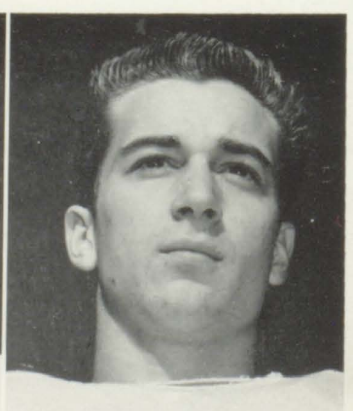

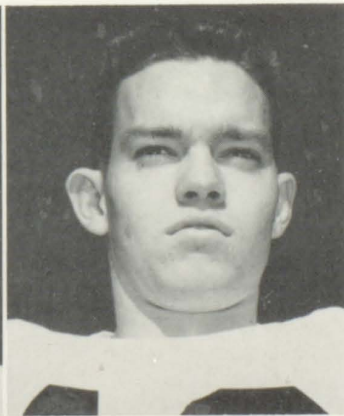
Owls Drop Hornets 42-6

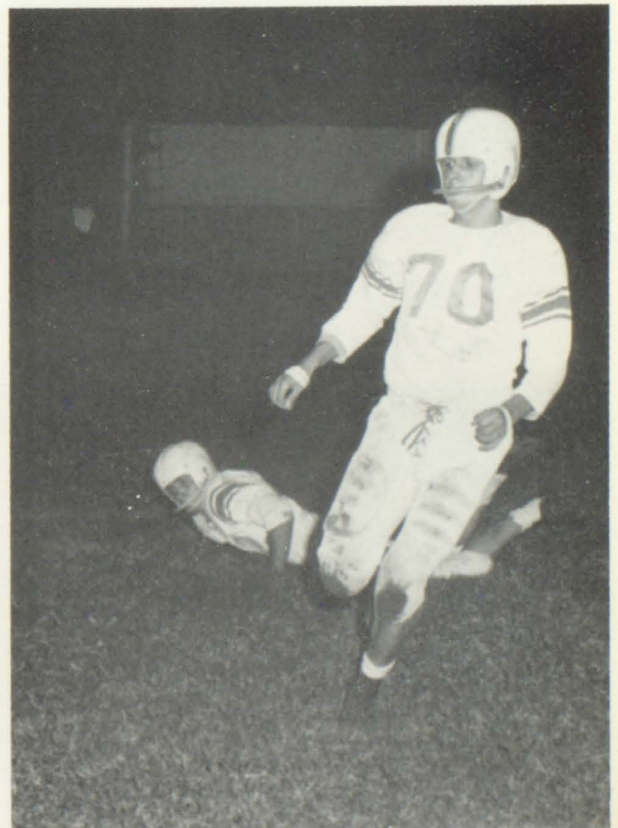

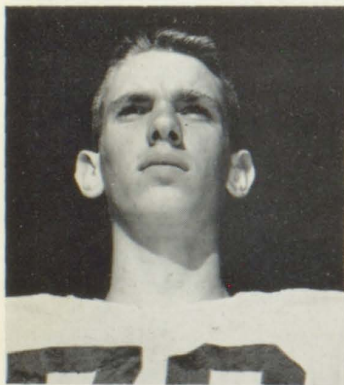
Forest Park Mud Fest Ends In 0-0 Tie

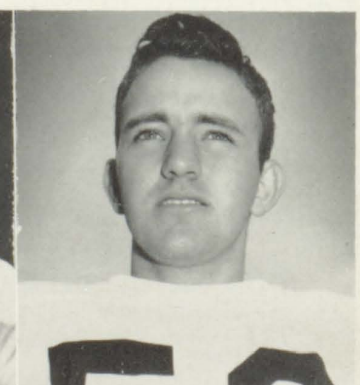

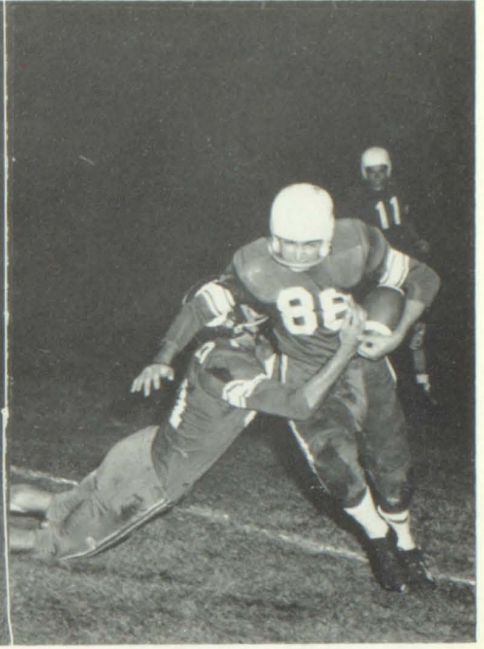

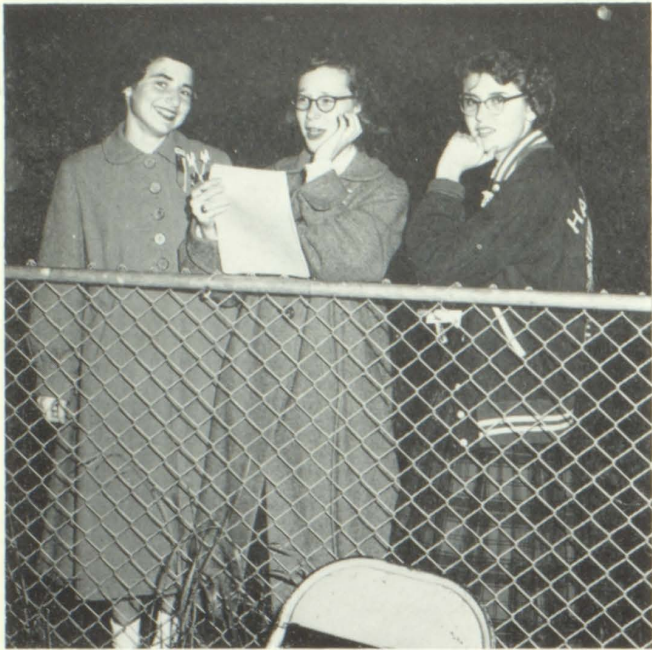

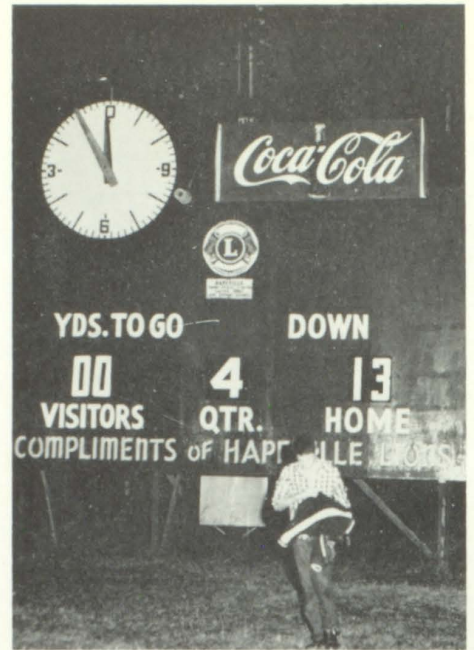
WAITING to gather in pigskin are Hapeville's Joe Bigham and College Park defender. Joe won the catch.

Half-time is also a good time for old grads to "howdy-do" and remember-when.

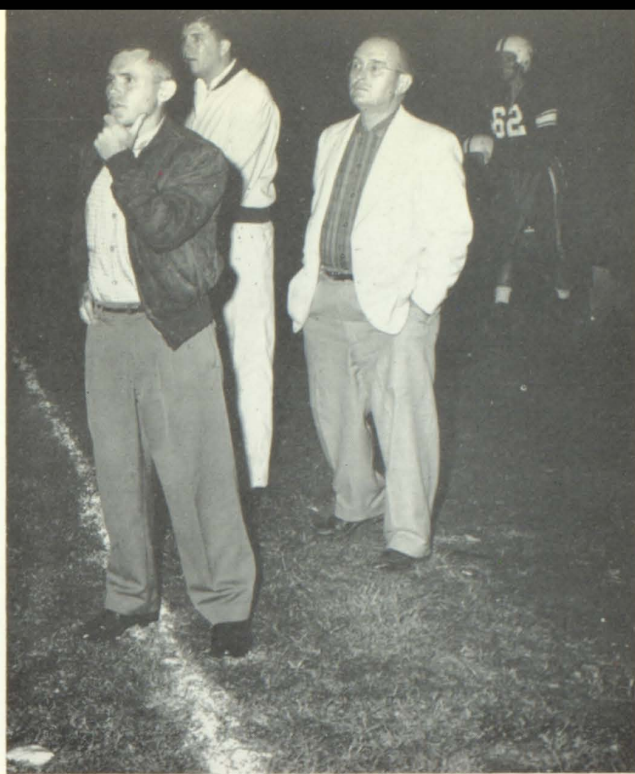

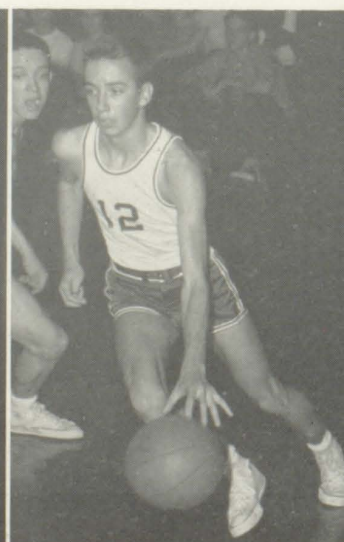

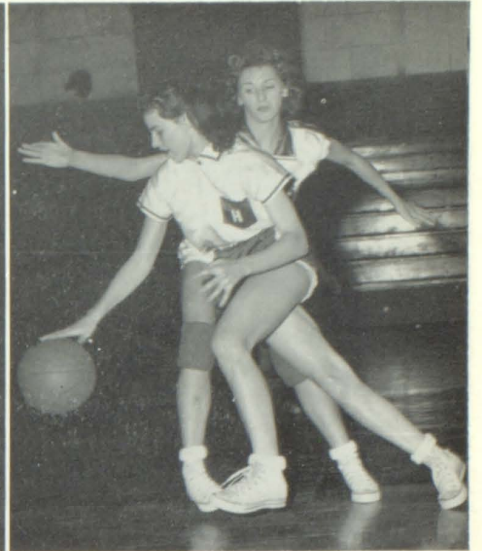
